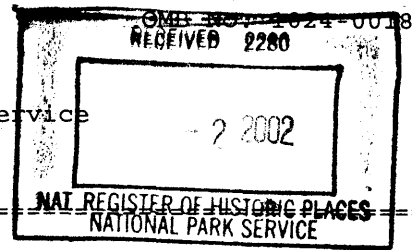

Sheffield Residential Historic District Description

The Sheffield Residential Historic District is situated on the south bank of the Tennessee River. The residential historic district occupies most of a large grid system of streets (the Sheffield Downtown Commercial Historic District accounts for the rest of the grid area) that extends from First Street just north of the Southern Railroad to Fourteenth Street and from Dover Avenue to Wood Street. The district encompasses a triangular shaped area of streets bounded by Dover Avenue, Twenty-Seventh Street, and Fifteenth Avenue and several areas featuring curvilinear streets along the river's edge. It also includes an area bounded by Tenth Street, Montgomery Avenue, Park Boulevard, and the Tennessee River that forms Riverside Park (Resource 802). This area has always been undeveloped, planned as a park in the 1886 city design. The district contains 675 contributing resources, 124 non contributing resources, 1 contributing site, and 1 contributing structure.

As designed by Civil Engineer Charles Boeckh in 1886, the grid system was intended to extend south of First Street; east of Dover Avenue; and west of Wood Avenue. In 1890, the streets in these areas were aligned at a forty-five degree angle to the master grid so that the houses on them would be closer to the town core. In general, avenues are oriented in a north/south direction; streets intersect avenues at ninety degree angles. The Sheffield town site grid consists of sixteen avenues and sixteen streets. Montgomery Avenue with its superior width of 100 feet is designated as the main thoroughfare in town (Sanborn Map Company 1889). The other avenues and streets measure sixty feet in width. The blocks north of Sixth Street and east of Columbia Avenue are bisected by a north/south alley and subdivided into twelve parcels; blocks south of Sixth Street and west of Columbia Avenue are cut into four sections consisting of six parcels by the intersection of two alleys, one oriented in a north/south direction, the other perpendicular to it.

In several intriguing instances, Boeckh deviated from strict adherence to the rigid geometry of the straight line and 90 degree angle and standardized parcel divisions. The engineer created a series of serpentine avenues along the river bluff. Hugging the edge of the bluff, the roads conform to the undulating topography of this section of Sheffield, especially the area bounded by Montgomery and Alabama Avenues north of Tenth Street. Alabama Avenue follows a natural ravine that descends from bluff top to river level. The lambent roadways function in symphony with River Side Park, providing mystery, frames of pleasing foliage and dramatic vistas of the Tennessee River for the amusement and recreation of Sheffield's denizens.

The Sheffield Residential Historic District is subdivided into several neighborhoods. The area of Sheffield bounded by the Southern Railroad, Sixth Street, Wood Street, and Montgomery Avenue constitutes a transitional zone, mixing small industry with working class residences and commerce. Sheffield's upper crust society occupies premium lots near the river, especially along Montgomery Avenue north of Sixth Street. The middle and upper middle classes have respectable domiciles in the section bounded by the Tennessee River, Austin Avenue, Sixth Street west of Montgomery Avenue, First Street east of Montgomery Avenue, and Dover Avenue.

The historic resources contained within the Sheffield Residential Historic District can be grouped into the following fields: Residences, Religious Buildings, Public Works, Educational Facility, Commerce, Transportation, and Recreation. Within the residential field there are the following categories: Victorian, Victorian Cottage, T Cottage, Bungalow, Craftsman, Four Square, Tudor Revival, Neoclassical Revival, Colonial Revival, I House, Central Passage Cottage, Pyramidal Roof Cottage, L Cottage, Spanish Eclectic, Mission Revival, Pueblo Revival, Shotgun, Carriage House, Massed Plan Cottage, and Minimal Traditional Cottage, Fourplex, and Apartment Building.

Victorian

A typical Sheffield Victorian house features an irregular shaped roof, often composed of a combination of a hip roof and several gable roofs, multiple stories, asymmetrical floor plan, a front-facing bay window, wrap around porch, and decorative detailing such as patterned shingles, spindlework, and corner brackets. The historic district features 86 Victorians.

Victorian residences or houses are distinguished from cottages by having at least two full stories whereas the cottage has no more than a story and a half. The Victorian cottage also features a distinctive roof form: a hip roof with one or more connecting gable roof(s). Often, the connecting gable roof(s) create(s) a front and/or side-projecting bay window(s), lending the dwelling a more fashionable appearance. In addition to its picturesque roof form and projecting bays, the Victorian cottage typically features a three bay facade with an entry bay placed in between a front projecting bay window and another bay. It is often embellished with shinglework, decorative brackets, spindlework, and/or other detailing associated with the Victorian era. There are 84 Victorian cottages in the historic district.

Craftsman House and Bungalow

Arts and Crafts dwellings feature stone, brick, stucco, or timber construction, low-pitched roofs, exposed rafters and timberwork, wide eaves, and a prominent porch supported by posts resting on brick or stone piers. Arts and Crafts houses can be divided into two categories: Craftsman houses which feature two or more stories and Craftsman bungalows which feature one to one and a half stories. The Sheffield Residential Historic District has 24 Craftsman Houses and 306 bungalows.

Foursquare

The basis of this two to two and a half story house is a block form consisting of two floors with two sets of two rooms arranged side by side. This arrangement is commonly referred to as a foursquare floor plan. A hip roof, which may or may not feature dormers, caps the structure. Usually, a full-width, one story porch with a hip, shed, or gable roof shades the front of these houses. Foursquare houses may lack stylistic embellishment or feature detailing from either the Italianate or Craftsman styles. There is one foursquare in the district.

Neoclassical Revival

Neoclassical Revival architecture represents a liberal borrowing of Georgian, Adam, Early Classical Revival, and Greek Revival characteristics. Salient features of the Neoclassical Revival style include a colonnaded porch with Doric, Ionic, Corinthian, Tuscan, or classical-like columns, symmetric bay arrangement, pediments used as either porch roofs or window and door caps, fanlight transoms, and cornices. There are 3 Neoclassical Revival residences within the National Register boundaries of the historic district.

Tudor Revival

Tudor Revival characteristics include multi-gable roofs which are often steeply pitched, end porches, arch spans above doors windows, porch supports, and interior passage ways, an entry vestibule, and faux half-timbering. Tudor Revival architecture came into vogue in the late nineteenth century and continued to be popular into the mid 1930s. Tudor Revival mansions and cottages, which share the same distinction as Victorian and Craftsman houses and cottages, were popular during the 1920s and on into the 1930s. Tudor Revival cottages total thirteen in all. There is one English Tudor manor house in the district

Colonial Revival

Colonial Revival architecture liberally borrowed elements from seventeenth century Dutch and English Colonial buildings. Consequently, Colonial Revival houses may feature such elements as gambrel and side gable roofs with dormers, second story overhangs, Georgian door surrounds, and in some instances, classical porticos. There are two generally recognized Colonial Revival time frames. The first roughly dates from the early 1900s to WWII; the second began after WWII and continues on to the present. The Colonial Revival category accounts for 22 residences.

I-House

The I house is easily identifiable from its profile: two stories high, two rooms wide, and one room deep. Variations of the I house floor plan include hall and parlor, side hall, and central hall plan, the latter being the most common floor plan. Very few I houses without front and/or rear additions remain; most received additions during their evolution. Additions take the form of front and rear shed rooms or cabinets and rear ells. I houses may or may not feature stylistic detailing. I Houses total 3 in number.

Pyramidal Roof Form

While pyramidal roof houses are a very common manufactured form, they actually have their origin in the pre-manufacturing era. In *Alabama Folk Houses* (1975) Eugene M. Wilson states that the pyramidal roof house was introduced to Alabama in the mid nineteenth century. By the later quarter of the nineteenth century this form became a staple of both industrial and agricultural housing. Quite prevalent in Birmingham industrial company towns (White 1981), the walls and floor plan of a pyramidal roof house form a square or rectangular block. Covering this block is a steeply-pitched hip roof, resembling a pyramid. There are four pyramidal roof cottages in the historic district.

Central Passage Cottage

The central passage cottage is one room deep and three rooms wide; the floor plan of the cottage consists of a central hallway flanked on either side by a room. Coinciding with these three rooms are a central door and flanking windows. A full or partial-width porch fronts the cottage. That an ell or shed addition is attached to the rear of the domicile is not uncommon. Central passage cottages total four in number.

T Cottage

Another cross gabled Victorian form is the T cottage. The plan of the T cottage when viewed from above forms a T shape. The typical T cottage features a three bay facade with a central entry bay placed next to a front projecting bay window. T cottages may or may not have Victorian detailing. The historic district features 21 T cottages.

Shotgun

The form of a shotgun is simple: it is one room in width and several rooms deep with a front gable roof, and may feature a shed or gable roof porch. There are typically no hallways in shotguns; rather, doors permit access from one room to the next, and are aligned in a straight line so that a shotgun could be fired straight through the house. It is from this door arrangement that this house derives its name. There are 13 shotguns in the historic district.

Mission Revival Cottage

Such cottages feature stucco covered walls, a ceramic tile covered roof, and a large open porch or vestibule. Curvilinear shaped dormers and parapets represent the quintessential characteristics of Mission Revival architecture. These architectural elements derive from 18th-century California and southwest missions. There is one such cottage in the Sheffield Residential Historic District.

Spanish Eclectic Cottage

Such cottages feature a liberal borrowing of Spanish and Mediterranean elements such as a red tile roof, stucco wall surfaces, and prominent arches above doors and windows. There is one such cottage in the Sheffield Residential Historic District.

Apartment Building

One apartment building is of the Pueblo Revival vein. Pueblo Revival architecture derives its inspiration from the shelters of prehistoric and historic Indians of the North American southwest. Pueblo Revival residences feature simplified rectangular forms with flat roofs and flat parapets. Exterior surfaces are covered with smooth, earth toned stucco. Two apartment buildings feature Craftsman detailing. One has Neoclassical embellishments. The other four apartments, all of which are of recent construction, are devoid of stylistic appointments.

Massed Plan Cottages

Massed plan cottages feature a side gable roof and a rectangular form. Such dwellings are several rooms wide by two deep. There are thirteen such dwellings in the Sheffield Residential Historic District.

Ranch

The most popular, post World War II, residential type is the ranch house. It features a low pitched gable or hip roof, wide eaves, an open floor plan, and large picture windows or a sliding glass door. The historic district contains 82 ranches.

Education Buildings

There are two schools in the Sheffield Residential Historic District. Built in 1892, the Alabama Avenue School (Resource 707, CR) features Richardsonian Romanesque details, such as rusticated stone and arch top windows and doors. The building now serves as the headquarters for the Sheffield City Board of Education. Due to its date of construction - 1968 - the Threadgill Elementary School (Resource 83) is considered a non contributing resource. It features brick veneering over concrete block construction.

Commercial Building

Two commercial buildings are located in the Sheffield Residential Historic District. Built circa 1920 of wood frame construction, Resource 37 (CR) is a free-standing commercial building. It once served as a corner neighborhood store, but is now vacant. Built circa 1947 of concrete block construction, Resource 312 (CR) is a free-standing commercial building. It once served as a corner neighborhood store, but is now used as personal storage.

Public Works

There are three public utility works that date to the early twentieth-century. Considered a contributing structure, Resource 507, a cylindrical, metal, water tower, has stood at the head of Montgomery Avenue since 1905. The Sheffield Water Works Filtration Plant (Resource 16, CR) has stood at the head of Alabama Avenue since 1925. Built in 1903, the Sheffield Company Power House-Naval Reserve-Muscle Shoals Sound Studios (Resource 17, CR) served the early power needs of Sheffield. Since the late 1950s, the building has served as the Muscle Shoals Sound Studio. Such musicians as Bob Seger, The Oak Ridge Boys, Bob Dylan, Paul Simon, Willie Nelson, Joan Baez, Linda Ronstandt, Lionel Ritchie, and the Rolling Stones have recorded at the studio. Numerous gold records are featured in the lobby, attesting to the importance of the studio in the music industry. It stands adjacent to the Sheffield Water Works Filtration Plant on Alabama Avenue.

Religious Buildings

Religious buildings count seven in all: the Methodist Church-Christian Science Society, First United Methodist Church, Grace Episcopal Church-Immanuel Missionary Baptist Church, B'Nai Israel Temple-Freewill Baptist Church, Church of Christ, and Cumberland Presbyterian Church. The Church of Christ (Resource 62, CR) on Annapolis Avenue, which was built circa 1920, features some residual Victorian Gothic elements, such as diamond-shaped, round top, and segmental arch top stained glass windows. Built 1995 of brick, the First Baptist Church (Resource 127, NCR) is classified as a temple front church with a partial width portico and columns. Due to its age, the church is considered a non contributing resource. Resource 169 (CR), the erstwhile B'Nai Israel Temple, was built circa 1908. It is a brick Neo-Classical religious building with decorative molding, center double wooden doors with rounded arch stained glass panel and multiple stained glass panes, temple front, entry portico with pediment, entablature, Doric columns, brick foundation, and four buttresses across the facade. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church (Resource 247, CR) is among the oldest churches in Sheffield. Built circa 1891, the church features such High Victorian Gothic elements as rusticated stone construction, decorative brickwork, rose windows with rusticated stone surrounds, corbeled cornices, two stained glass windows with pointed arch heads, rusticated stone lintels, stone sills, and a corner tower with tent roof. The First United Methodist Church (Resource 473, CR), which was built circa 1915, is yet another High Victorian Gothic building. It has a side steeple, pedimented and crenelated parapets, and openings fitted with stained glass windows topped by ogee arches. Built circa 1940, Resource 606 (CR) is a plain church with stucco cladding, a gable roof of asphalt shingies, central double wood and glass panel doors, and flanking metal frame windows. Resource 675 (CR), the Methodist Church-Seventh Day Adventist Church-Christian Science Society built in 1887, features High Victorian Gothic architecture with parapets with stone coping, corbeled

brickwork, a covered rose window, a center double wood panel door with covered transom and Gothic arch top, and flanking 2/2 lights with Gothic arch tops.

Ranch houses, massed plan cottages, and minimal traditional houses account for the majority of the 124 non contributing resources in the Sheffield Residential Historic District. These residences were built between the 1950s and the present. There are several concentrations of these houses, including nine on Annapolis Avenue, eight on Nashville Avenue, and seven on Columbia Avenue.

Inventory

The following is both a description of the present status of the resources in the Sheffield Downtown Commercial District. Each of the resources is assigned a number from 1 to 802, with #801 removed from the inventory. The resources are organized by street and number hierarchy. The buildings are divided into two classifications: those that contribute to the significance of the historic district and those that do not contribute to the significance. There are 675 contributing resources, 124 non contributing resources, one contributing site, and one contributing structure in the historic district.

Significance, Criterion A: Community Planning and Development, Transportation, Education

Community Planning and Development

The Sheffield Residential Historic District is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places based on Criterion A in the area of community planning and development. The Sheffield Residential Historic District is a locally significant example of a typical, high density, grid iron pattern, town plan. Civil Engineer Charles Boeckh's grid plan for Sheffield, which was conceived in 1886 and is still intact except for one slight modification in 1890, strategically located industrial, commercial, residential, educational, and recreational zones so as to optimize the use of the available land and to establish an efficient interaction between the various zones. Boeckh's placement of upper class residences at the north end of Montgomery Avenue, the major north/south axis of the town, so as to afford the wealthy superior views of the Tennessee River, remove them some what from the lower class neighborhoods and the unpleasant aspects of the labor sectors, and still enable them to remain near their businesses and offices on the south end of Montgomery Avenue, illustrates the fundamental spatial benefits of the grid plan.

The Sheffield Residential Historic District also contains a locally-significant example of late nineteenth-century landscape planning reminiscent of the landscape theories and designs of America's leading nineteenth-century park proponents Alexander Jackson Downing and Frederick Law Olmstead. In several intriguing instances, Boeckh deviated from strict adherence to the rigid geometry of the straight line and 90 degree angle and standardized parcel divisions. The engineer created a series of serpentine avenues along the river bluff. Hugging the edge of the bluff, the roads conform to the undulating topography of this section of Sheffield, especially the area bounded by Montgomery and Alabama Avenues north of Tenth Street known as River Side Park (#802). Alabama Avenue follows a natural ravine that descends from bluff top to river level. The lambent roadways functioned in symphony with River Side Park, providing mystery, frames of pleasing foliage and dramatic vistas of the Tennessee River for the amusement and recreation of Sheffield's denizens. Several public utility resources were located at the northern end of the city plan, near their focus, the Tennessee River: 1903 Sheffield Company Power House, 1905 water tower, and 1925 Water Works Filtration Plant.

The Sheffield Residential Historic District also contains a number of dwellings built by real estate development and industrial companies. These dwellings represent planned, institutional efforts to provide shelter for the working and middle classes who would come to reside in Sheffield in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Resources 39, 45, 50, 53, 64, 65, 66, 69, 70, 71, 78, 79, and 80, two story, stylistically restrained versions of the Victorians on upper Montgomery Avenue, are believed to have been built by the Mobile Real Estate Company for Sheffield's middle classes in the late nineteenth century. A number of cookie cutter designed Victorian cottages were built for lower-middle class residents on 26th Street by a development company. These include Resources 763, 764, 765, 768, 770, 771, 773, 774, 775, 776, 779, 780, 781, 782, 784, and 785. Twelve, brick, hip roof cottages (#613, 614, 615, 616, 617, 618, 619, 623, 624, 625, 626, and 627) on Pittsburgh Avenue represent the last vestiges of worker housing built by Sheffield's long gone steel, coal, and iron industries.

Transportation

The Sheffield Residential Historic District is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places based on Criterion A in the area of transportation as it contains one of the last vestiges of the Sheffield Railway Corporation's street car system that connected Tusculumbia, Sheffield, and Florence: the street car barn. Completed in 1904, the electric street car line extended 12 miles from Tusculumbia to Florence and crossed the Tennessee River via the Southern Railway bridge. The line facilitated local intra and inter travel before the days of the automobile. Built in 1904, the street car barn (Resource 454, CR) in Sheffield was designed to house street cars as well as offices and maintenance shops. The street car line operated until 1933 when the franchise expired.

Education

The Sheffield Residential Historic District is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A in the area of education as it contains one of Sheffield's last historic school buildings, one that served the community for nearly 80 years. One of the first items the newly-established town of Sheffield acted upon in 1886 was to build a small, four-room frame school on Atlanta Avenue between 9th and 10th Streets. The city foresaw the need for a larger facility and soon voted to construct a 12-room school, estimated to cost around \$30,000, on Alabama Avenue. Construction was slow and not completed until 1892. The Alabama Avenue School was built as a large two-story brick and stone building with then-modern conveniences such as electric lights and indoor running water. This building served as the city's sole source for elementary education for white students until the 1960s. Today this building houses the Colbert County Board of Education. The original 1886 frame school became the high school after the Alabama Avenue School was constructed in 1892, was replaced in the early 1920s by an adjacent school, and torn down in 1924. The site of the 1886 and 1920s schools now contain a circa 1961 elementary school (Resource 83).

Architecture

The Sheffield Residential Historic District is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places based on Criterion C in the area of architecture for its collection of late nineteenth to mid twentieth-century residential architecture. Contained within the historic district are locally-significant examples of high style and vernacular houses. Victorians, Craftsmans, English manors, and Colonials are prevalent as are bungalows, industrial village housing types, and minimal traditional cottages. These houses feature such stylistic embellishments as brackets, spindlework friezes, turned posts, oriel and bay windows, turrets, towers, exposed timberwork, wood posts on stone or brick piers, and classical columns. These houses of the middle and upper classes reflect a conscious effort on their builders and owners to capture the essence of nationwide architectural trends from the latter part of the previous century to the middle of the present one. The grand and resplendent Chambers-Nathan Home (Resource 579) is as fine a Victorian as there is in the state. The same can be said for a baronial Tudor Revival mansion (Resource 659) on River Bluff Drive and its representative genre. Of no less importance, hip roof, cross gable, and massed plan cottages document the efforts made by Sheffield's industries and real estate developers to provide basic shelter for the working classes. Twelve, brick, hip roof cottages (Resources 613, 614, 615, 616, 617, 618, 619, 623, 624, 625, 626, and 627) on Pittsburgh Avenue represent the last vestiges of worker housing built by Sheffield's long gone steel, coal, and iron industries.

Once a dominant part of Sheffield's residential stock, this housing began to disappear during World War I and II as it was relocated to other manufacturing sites and was all but obliterated save for the few surviving examples to make way for a federal housing project in the 1960s.

Additionally, the Sheffield Residential Historic District is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places based on Criterion C in the area of architecture for its collection of High Victorian Gothic and Neoclassical Revival religious buildings. Four churches, including the Church of Christ (Resource 62, CR), Cumberland Presbyterian Church (Resource 247, CR), First United Methodist Church (Resource 473, CR), and the Methodist Church (Resource 675, CR) feature such High Victorian Gothic details as towers, parapets, rose, pointed, segmental, rounded, and ogee arch top windows, and rusticated stone construction. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Methodist Church were built in the late nineteenth century. Featuring such details as a pedimented portico, entablature, and Doric columns, the B'Nai Israel Temple (Resource 169, CR) is an excellent representative of Neoclassical architecture.

Historical Summary

After the Cherokees and Chickasaws were forced to cede their lands in what is now known as the Tennessee River Valley in 1816, the territory was hastily surveyed, divided into lots and large tracts, and auctioned off at land sales, such as the one held in 1818. Thus, began the history of Florence, Tuscumbia, and York Bluff. The great Indian fighters General Andrew Jackson and General John Coffee, both of whom purchased hundreds of acres surrounding York Bluff, envisioned a magnificent future for their embryonic settlement on the south bank of the Tennessee River. Despite the settlement's ideal location, high profile, and hero status of its founding fathers, Jackson's and Coffee's aspirations came not to fruition, at least not in their lifetime. Jackson attempted to work the land for a time, but within several years he deemed his efforts futile and sold his York Bluff property. Several farmers remained in the area, but nothing more came of the town site until the late nineteenth century.

In 1883 a fateful meeting occurred on the York Bluff town site that overnight literally transformed the bucolic farming community into a major manufacturing center. Captain Alfred Moses, a Montgomery-based banker and real estate developer, had the blind good fortune to meet with Colonel Walter S. Gordon during a business trip in Florence. Gordon convinced Moses to examine a several thousand acre site on the south side of the Tennessee River and thus was born Sheffield, which took its name from manufacturing giant Sheffield, England (Armes 1910).

Together, Moses, his brother, and Gordon formed the Sheffield Land, Iron and Coal Company in November, 1883. By February, 1884, plans were underway to give shape to an actual townsite on the river bluff (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1885). The executive committee of the Sheffield Land, Iron and Coal Company debated the location of industrial, commercial, and residential sectors as well as the layout of transportation and utility infrastructures and the placement of schools and houses of worship. The task of realizing these plans became the domain of Civil Engineer Charles Boeckh.

Engineer Boeckh translated the specifications of the land company into two dimensional form, using, for the most part, a grid system. Avenues were oriented in a north/south direction; streets intersected avenues at 90 degree angles. The Sheffield town site grid consisted of sixteen avenues and sixteen streets. Montgomery Avenue with its superior width of 100 feet was designated as the main thoroughfare in town (Sanborn Map Company 1889). The other avenues and streets measured 60 feet in width. The blocks north of Sixth Street and east of Columbia Avenue were bisected by a north/south alley and subdivided into twelve parcels; blocks south of Sixth Street and west of Columbia Avenue were cut into four sections consisting of six parcels by the intersection of two alleys, one oriented in a north/south direction, the other perpendicular to it.

In several intriguing instances, Boeckh deviated from strict adherence to the rigid geometry of the straight line and 90 degree angle and standardized parcel divisions. The engineer created a series of serpentine avenues along the river bluff. Hugging the edge of the bluff, the roads conform to the undulating topography of this section of Sheffield, especially the area bounded by Montgomery and Alabama Avenues north of Tenth Street. Alabama Avenue follows a natural ravine that descends from bluff top to river level. The lambent roadways functioned in symphony with River Side Park, providing mystery, frames of pleasing foliage and dramatic vistas of the Tennessee River for the amusement and recreation of Sheffield's denizens. Boeckh's park aesthetic coincided with the landscape theories and designs of America's leading nineteenth-century park proponents Alexander Jackson Downing and Frederick Law Olmstead. However, research did not confirm Boeckh's direct link to Olmstead and Downing.

On May 8, 1884, the Sheffield Land, Iron and Coal Company held a land sale, auctioning off 500 lots (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). While the land company considered the sale a success, many lots were not sold, and many parcels remained undeveloped through the nineteenth century. A circa 1890s photograph of upper Montgomery Avenue, which depicts the Sam Keller-Bishop Residence (Resource 478) and another Victorian (Resource 488), reveals a sparsely built up residential sector. Nonetheless, town building was underway. Sheffield was incorporated in 1885.

After Sheffield was founded, five furnaces were established a short distance from the business district in the section of town reserved for industrial plants. Located between Alabama and Georgia Avenues, the industrial area was advantageously situated adjacent the Tennessee River. A landing with a series of docks was erected along the river, which facilitated the transportation of raw materials and manufactured goods via river to and from major markets. Additionally, the industrial sector was adjacent major rail lines. In 1886 the Alabama and Tennessee Coal and Iron Company moved its headquarters to Sheffield (Damsgard 1975). The company began operating two furnaces in 1888. A third was completed in 1895, but by then the three furnaces were the property of the Sheffield Coal, Iron and Steel Company. These three furnaces were predated by one built in 1887 by the Sheffield Furnace Company (Adams 1977). Colonel Enoch Ensley, a Memphis magnate, acquired it in 1889, renaming it the Hattie Ensley Furnace. Ensley built another, dubbing it the Lady Ensley Furnace (Nathan 1975). The five furnaces operated infrequently, and all were eventually shut down in the early twentieth century.

Sheffield's industrial zone, which expanded southwest of what was designated as Georgia Avenue in 1884, attracted other industries. An 1889 Sanborn map recorded the presence of a diverse range of plants. Among

the factories were the Enterprise Wood Working Company, C. H. Buchanan's Straw Hat plant, A. J. Fould's Shoe Factory, Henderson Flour Mill, Sheffield Ice Company, Globe Iron Works, Electric Light Works, Sheffield Stove Works, Standard Machine Works, Sheffield Agricultural Works, Sheffield Compress & Storage Company, and the Sheffield Manufacturing Company.

Concomitant with the rise of Sheffield's iron industry was the development of a transportation infrastructure. Under the aegis of the Sheffield and Tuscumbia Street Railway Company, a rail line was built from the south end of Montgomery Avenue to the Memphis and Charleston depot in Tuscumbia in the late 1880s (Leftwich 1935). The Alabama Improvement Company began construction of a railroad from Sheffield to the ore-rich fields in Franklin County in the early 1890s; but the project was halted when financing failed. This line was opened in 1887 as the Sheffield and Birmingham Railroad (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). The Southern Railway Company represented a major addition to Sheffield's rail system as well as the economy. The company located its shops and a depot just south of Montgomery Avenue and 1st Street in 1898 (Nathan 1975). The Louisville and Nashville line also came to town during this period.

The area bounded by the rail lines, Sixth Street, the industrial sector, and Montgomery Avenue evolved into a transitional zone, mixing small industry with working class residences and commerce. Sanborn maps from 1889 and 1894 depict a number of brick and wood frame dwellings, some of which were occupied by African Americans, in the area. Factories included a bottling works, harness and saddlery company, furniture factory, lumber and brick yard, sash and blind warehouse, and livery stables. Bakeries, laundries, grocery stores, and other goods shops also were established in the vicinity.

Sheffield's upper crust society selected premium lots near the river, especially along Montgomery Avenue north of Sixth Street, on which to build their palaces. Captain Moses built a resplendent Victorian (destroyed by fire) with a commanding view of the Tennessee River at the end of Montgomery. In the late 1880s, Moses was joined on Montgomery by such nabobs as Thos. R. Roulhac, an attorney who later became United States Attorney for the Northern District of Alabama (Resource 488); J. B. Lagomarsino, a real estate tycoon (Resource 471); Major George P. Keyes, a distinguished lawyer and editor (Resource 487, the oldest brick house in Sheffield); and Dr. Hugh W. Blair, one of Sheffield's leading physicians (Resource 479). W. L. Chambers, general manager of the Sheffield Land, Iron and Coal Company, built perhaps one of the most spectacular of the Victorian residences on nearby Park Boulevard.

In the late 1880s, the middle and upper middle classes built respectable domiciles in the section of Sheffield bounded by the Tennessee River, Austin Avenue, Sixth Street west of Montgomery Avenue, First Street east of Montgomery Avenue, and Dover Avenue. Although the incorporated limits of Sheffield extended beyond Dover Avenue, this area of town was not developed until 1890 when the streets were realigned at a 45 degree angle to Dover. The houses were scattered across the residential section with wide open spaces between many of them. Typical of the upper middle class housing of the era were the two story houses being built on Atlanta Avenue in 1890 (*Sheffield Enterprise* 1890). Erected by a Mobile syndicate (most likely the Mobile Real Estate Company, which had offices in the Mobile Block on Raleigh Avenue, the residences represented a stylistically restrained version of the Victorians on upper Montgomery Avenue. Resources 39, 45, 50, 53, 64, 65, 66, 69, 70, 71, 78, 79, and 80 bare a striking similarity to those featured in the *Enterprise*. According to an

article posted in the April 3, 1885 edition of *The Alabamian*, the Mobile Real Estate Company secured enough lumber to build 12 cottages. The article additionally relates that G. P. Humphreys, an architect, and W. A. Rolls, a contractor, were in the process of acquiring machinery to erect a brick works, lime kilns, a planing mill, and general wood working equipment with which to build houses for Sheffield's daily arriving citizens. Houses of worship erected in this era included: the Methodist Church (1887) on Seventh Street (Resource 675) and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church (1891) on Columbia Avenue (Resource 247).

Housing for employees of the furnaces was erected in the late 1880s in an area of Sheffield situated west of Little Rock Avenue and bounded by Georgia Avenue, Hill Street, 17th Street, and 20th Avenue. Known as Furnace Hill, the community, which consisted mostly of laborers and low level skilled workers and their families, was virtually an entity unto itself (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Historic photographs of the quarters depict stock housing types such as saddlebags and prototype front gable bungalows. The saddlebags featured one story, a side gable roof, central chimney with a flanking pen or room, facade bay arrangement composed of two interior doors and a flanking window, shed roof porch, and a rear shed addition. The bungalow prototypes had one story, a front gable roof, interior chimney, a front facade door and window, front shed porch, and a rear shed addition. A number of the dwellings were removed from Furnace Hill during the construction of a nitrate plant in 1917 (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). The last vestiges of the village were swept away by a public housing project erected in the 1970s.

For Sheffield, the 1880s represented the palmy days. Spurred by the rise of the iron industry and railroad system, mercantile magnates, development institutions, and independent entrepreneurs flocked to the boom town. The lower portion of Montgomery, Raleigh, and Austin Avenues between First and Sixth Streets evolved into the business district. A number of large, multistory commercial blocks were erected on Montgomery Avenue in the late 1880s, including the Sheffield Land, Iron and Coal Company (razed in 1979); the Montgomery Block; Ware Building (razed); Cleveland Hotel (razed); and the First National Bank-Blake Building (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). The Mobile Real Estate Company erected the Mobile Block, an edifice of equal stature and scale to those on Montgomery Avenue, on Raleigh Avenue and First Street in 1886. These commercial blocks housed numerous merchants and professional offices. Simultaneously small one and two story commercial buildings were erected in the business district.

Water facilities and education were an integral part of Sheffield's town building in the 1880s. An 80,000 gallon water tank was erected at the head of Montgomery Avenue and a waterline constructed along the length of Montgomery Avenue to provide water to the 2,547 who inhabited the emerging manufacturing town in 1888 (Nathan 1975). Considered au courant with electric lights and central heating, the Richardsonian Romanesque styled Alabama Avenue School (Resource 698) served well the educational needs of Sheffield's students.

Unfortunately, the optimism of the 1880s did not prevail throughout the 1890s. Fate, or more accurately the hard, cold facts of economic reality, dealt the up and coming town a cruel blow. Many of the industries recruited to relocate in Sheffield were unsound, relying on the Sheffield Land, Iron and Coal Company for support (Leftwich 1935). These industries were prime targets for failure in difficult times. Precipitated by a nationwide panic, the Moses Brothers, a major driving force in the Sheffield Land, Iron and Coal Company and

ultimately the economy of Sheffield, failed (Adams 1977). A domino effect ensued: the furnaces closed; many industries folded; residences and stores stood empty; people left town.

An 1894 Sanborn map documents the catastrophic impact of the economic collapse. The following industries closed during the five year interval between 1889 and 1894: C. H. Buchanan's Straw Hat Factory, Sheffield Stove Works, Standard Machine Works, Globe Iron Works, Sheffield Ice Company's factory, Henderson Flour Mill, Enterprise Wood Working Factory, Sheffield Manufacturing Company, Sheffield Harness and Saddlery Company, and the Eureka Brick Company. The furnaces were idle. According to the 1894 Sanborn map, a woolen mill, a promising enterprise in 1889, never opened. The business district was equally devastated. The Mobile Real Estate Company found itself as an occupant of an almost entirely empty commercial block. Five out of six of the first floor store spaces stood vacant. Likewise, the Sheffield Land, Iron and Coal Company Building was only partially occupied. Vacancy afflicted the adjacent Ware Building. Across Montgomery Avenue and one block north, the Habbler Block, an amalgamation of the Cleveland Hotel and the stores adjacent its south side, suffered from a serious lack of mercantile tenants as seven out of eleven stores were empty. Five out of six first floor retail spaces advertised "for rent" signs in the Montgomery Block.

Sheffield may very well have found itself on the list of Alabama's dead towns were it not for the Southern Railway Company. In 1898, Southern Railway officials decided to locate its headquarters in Sheffield, the culmination of which was the construction of a freight depot and offices at Montgomery Avenue and First Street and a freight yard southeast of Dover Avenue and First Street in a section of Sheffield that was opened for development in 1890, but had remained undeveloped until its use by the rail company (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Additionally, Southern built shops southwest of Montgomery Avenue and First Street in the industrial section. The rail company became the largest employer in town with a roster of nearly 500 employees (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Southern Railway provided a much needed stimulus for the Sheffield economy.

Following the example of the railroad, other businesses and industries chose to settle in Sheffield. Dormant for several years, the furnaces fired up, providing tons of pig iron. A New York based interest bought out the Sheffield Land, Iron and Coal Company and reorganized it as the Sheffield Company (Leftwich 1961). The Sheffield Company constructed a street railway from Sheffield to Tusculumbia and Florence in 1905 (Adams 1977). The Sheffield Car Barn (Resource 454) was built at this time. A *Sheffield Reaper* article of 1905 (a) boasted of a number of new recruits to the industrial roster, including the Colonial Column Company; S. L. Stansell & Sons, furniture factory; H. W. Berheiser, sawmill and lumber factory; V. Gibb & Son, brass foundry; Edgar Hopeman and W. H. Rodell, hub manufacturer and wood working plant; and Tuthill and Pettison, hardwood and lumber veneering. Additionally, a 1903 Sanborn map listed Lowman Stove Works, Sheffield Compress Company, Sheffield Iron Works, Sheffield Rolling Mill Company, Southern Cotton Oil Company, Richmond Cotton Oil Company, and Union Planing Mill among the industrial community. Triggered by the Southern Railway Company's move, a renaissance was underway in the town by the Tennessee River. The commercial district once again bustled with activity. On May 16, 1905 (b), the *Sheffield Reaper* reported that "More (Business) Buildings Going Up Than At Any Time In The City's History."

Sheffield's industry enjoyed continued growth in the interval between 1903 and 1908. The *Sheffield Reaper* announced the construction of a brewery and ice plant on November 23, 1905 e. Completion was slated for Spring of 1906. In 1907, the Sheffield Coal and Iron Company, formerly of Pennsylvania, declared its intention of locating its headquarters in Sheffield (*Sheffield Reaper* 1907 b). The Southern Cotton Oil Company stated that it would construct a fertilizer plant in 1907 (*Sheffield Reaper* 1907 c). A 1908 Sanborn map listed a number of newcomers to Sheffield's manufacturing scene. They include the Cudahy Packing Co., H. Marks Lumber Yard, Pratt Bottling Works, W. G. Richardson Coal Yard, Sheffield Boiler Works, Standard Hardwood Lumber Company, and Thomson and Smith Coal Yard.

While commercial and industrial construction moved at a brisk pace during the first decade of the twentieth century, new home starts lagged behind demand. Sheffield was a city on the move with a population that doubled from 2,500 in the early 1890s to 5,000 in 1905 (*Sheffield Reaper* 1907 a). Five hundred joined the census by 1907. Despite this influx, the *Sheffield Reaper* (1905 c) reported that "No appreciable effort is being made to provide homes for the many people who are to come... Every available house is occupied." Later in the same article, the *Reaper* urged those refusing to sale or develop lots to do so for "patriotic" reasons. For whatever reasons, patriotic or capitalistic, contractors began to meet the demand.

Contractor A. D. Thomson, an enterprising man, purchased between 40 and 50 small dwellings at Smiths mines in Lawrence, Tennessee with the intention of dismantling and rebuilding them in Sheffield (*Sheffield Reaper* 1905 d). In an article entitled "Building Activity", the *Sheffield Reaper* (1906 b) proclaimed the erection of many new houses throughout Sheffield. George Henderson was in the process of building two cottages near the car barn. W. S. Hatch had two cottages on Fifth Street on the rise. Max R. Block was in progress on a two story house on Eighth Street and Nashville Avenue. In October of 1906 c, the *Reaper* announced construction of four more homes near the car barn. A number of cottages on Dover Avenue and Twelfth Street were nearing completion (possibly Resources 353-355). The Sheffield Concrete and Tile Company was constructing two houses on Montgomery Avenue in October of 1906 (*Sheffield Reaper* 1906 c). These houses (Resources 482 and 483) featured rusticated concrete block construction. Other residences were in the works, especially in the vicinity of the car barn. Houses of worship built between 1903 and 1908 included the Grace Episcopal Church (1903) on Montgomery Avenue and Seventh Street (Resource 476) and B'Nai Israel Temple (1908) in the 800 Block of Atlanta Avenue (Resource 169).

The area roughly bounded by First and Sixth Streets and Frankfort and Little Rock Avenues witnessed some residential development between 1903 and 1908. A number of individual T shaped and rectangular dwellings were scattered about the area as documented by the 1908 Sanborn map. Flats, a series of connected, one story apartments, were developed. The Pittsburgh Flats occupied the southwest corner of Pittsburgh Avenue and Third Street. The southeast corner of the two streets featured the Frankfort Flats. On the northwest corner of Third Street and Frankfort Avenue stood the Iron Flats, so designated for their iron cladding. These dwellings may very well have been home to Sheffield's growing African American population as a black lodge and M. E. Church were located between Third and Fourth Streets on Pittsburgh Avenue.

The economic momentum generated by Southern Railroad carried on into the second decade of the twentieth century. From 1907 to 1920, the population of Sheffield climbed to 6,682 (Friends of the Sheffield Public

Library 1905). In order to meet the needs of the citizens, contractors continued to erect buildings. Between 1910 and 1915, two churches were built: the First Presbyterian Church (1911) on Fifth Street and the First United Methodist Church at 701 Montgomery Avenue (Resource 473). Eleven mercantile edifices rose during this period. Homes went up on vacant lots throughout Sheffield, including the areas bounded by 30th and 1st Streets and Dover Avenue in the eastern section and 16th and Montgomery Avenues in the southwestern corner, both of which were opened for development in 1890.

Despite the infrequent operation of the furnaces in the early twentieth century, Sheffield continued to bustle with activity. That activity greatly increased when it was learned that the Muscle Shoals area was selected as the site for a hydroelectric dam and two nitrate plants in 1916. Critical to the development of munitions, the nation's nitrate supply, which was supplied by South America, was threatened by Germany. Thus, it was deemed necessary to establish a domestic supply at the outbreak of World War I. A readily available source of hydroelectric power, i.e., the Tennessee River, a well developed river and rail infrastructure, and many industrial resources made the Muscle Shoals area an ideal choice for the dam and nitrate plants (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). In 1917 construction began on two nitrate plants; Nitrate Plant No. 1 was established on the west side of Sheffield; Nitrate Plant No. 2 on the east side of town. The two plants, dam, construction of which began in 1918, and support facilities attracted an additional 30,000 people to the area (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985).

Construction of the two nitrate plants began in late 1917. The undertaking necessitated the acquisition of thousands of acres of land. An article in the *Sheffield Standard* (1917 a) urged land owners to be reasonable in their negotiations with the federal government lest the project sour. For Plant No. 1, a total of 1900 acres was acquired; Plant No. 2 surpassed that with a total of 2306 acres (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Plant No. 1 opened on September 16, 1918 while Plant No. 2 opened at 20% capacity on October 26, 1918 (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985).

The two manufacturing centers required a large working force. Plant No. 1 employed nearly 800 men; Plant No. 2 had a larger force of 19,263 (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Sheffield was unprepared for the housing logistics of such a large force. To alleviate the housing crisis, the federal government committed to the construction of 1800 houses (*Sheffield Standard* 1918 a). Adjacent Plant No. 1 26 bunkhouses, a large mess hall, and 110 cottages, all of which were temporary, were erected (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). A more permanent village of 85 houses of stucco construction and tile roof was constructed. Known as the Liberty Village for its Liberty Bell configuration, the village is presently extant and is listed on the National Register. Temporary quarters went up at Nitrate Plant No. 2. A collection of more permanent dwellings was also fabricated. These homes were moved to the Highlands section of Sheffield after World War II (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Several tent cities were pitched in the vicinity of the two plants (*Sheffield Standard* 1918 b).

New construction starts escalated. The *Sheffield Standard* (1917 b) declared "The boom is on!" The article stated that it was near impossible to keep track of all the property transactions as certain choice parcels changed hands two to three times in one day. In January of 1918 plans were underway to build a number of apartment houses (*Sheffield Standard* 1918 c). Four apartment houses dating to this period were identified in the

residential survey, Resources 678, 298, 38, and 368. Residential construction associated with the nitrate plant boom is synonymous with the bungalow. Hundreds of these residences with their distinctive low pitched roofs, emphasis on craftsmanship, and ample porches were built in this era. The bungalow genre represents the largest classification of buildings identified in the residential survey with a total of 207 houses. Victorians, which are associated with the initial phase of development and Sheffield's turn-of-the-century renaissance, constitute the second largest classification with 146 houses. A June 7, 1918 c *Sheffield Standard* article announced the construction of many bungalows along the carline. According to the article, Mr. John W. Johnson was building a bungalow on Montgomery Avenue and Eighth Street (possibly Resource 480 or 484). Mr. John F. Funke was also building a bungalow next door to Mr. Johnson (possibly Resource 481 or 485).

The business district welcomed many new comers during the nitrate plant boom. The Sheffield Hotel planned an ambitious addition of 71 rooms (*Sheffield Standard* 1917 b). Judge Nathan indicated that he planned a two story, business house for the corner of Montgomery Avenue and Fourth Street (*Sheffield Standard* 1918 d). The building was completed circa 1920. The nitrate plant boom was short lived, lasting for only a two year period. The five furnaces, most of which had been rebuilt, continued to operate infrequently, and all would be closed permanently by the 1930s (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). In 1919 both nitrate plants were put on stand by status; construction of Wilson Dam, which picked up some of the slack from the nitrate plant closures, ceased in 1921. A March 28, 1919 b *Sheffield Standard* article declared that "The boom has passed." A short-lived recession, or what the *Standard* termed a lower business volume, prevailed in the early 1920s.

The 1921 Sanborn map documents several subdivisions in Sheffield. Developed around the time of the boom, the Oak Hills Subdivision featured stunning views of the Tennessee River. A number of bungalows (Resources 584, 587, 588, 589, 590, 591, and 596) and Colonial Revival houses (Resources 580, 581, 583, 586, 592, 593, and 595) were crafted on wooded lots on Park Boulevard. The River Bluff Subdivision was evidently in the planning stage in 1921 as no roads had been mapped out in the area contained within the borders of the Tennessee River and Alabama and Georgia Avenues.

The 1921 Sanborn map also establishes the presence of an African American community in southeast Sheffield. Bounded by Atlanta Avenue South and 21st Street S. E. , the "Colored Neighborhood," as it was designated by the Sanborn Map Company contained numerous L and rectangular shaped dwellings. A recent, cursory drive through the area revealed that many of the dwellings are of the bungalow typology. A small number of Victorian cottages are extant. The M. E., Baptist, and First Baptist Churches provided African Americans opportunities for organized worship services. A grade school and several stores were counted among the built environment of Sheffield's African American community.

News of the automobile manufacturing magnate Henry Ford's interest in utilizing the nitrate plants and dam in a scheme to build a 75 mile long city along the Tennessee River, the focus of which would be the production of cars. ignited a speculation frenzy in the Muscle Shoals area, which includes Florence, Sheffield, Tuscumbia, and Muscle Shoals. Real estate investors from Detroit, Chicago, New York, and other areas flocked to the area to buy and develop real estate (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). A boom ensued.

One of the biggest Sheffield real estate transactions during the 1920s involved Mr. John J. Nyhoff of Troy, New York. An entrepreneurial mogul, Nyhoff it seems made a career of capitalizing on Ford's and others' industrial plants. He created nine large developments in Troy, New York where Ford was in the process of building a \$15,000,000 tractor factory (*Sheffield Standard* 1922 a). Nyhoff also engineered large developments in Gary, Indiana, the Steel City, and Detroit, Michigan. Nyhoff, a March 3, 1922 (a) *Sheffield Standard* article asserted, was quite assured that Ford would get the Muscle Shoals properties, and Sheffield would become the largest city in the South. Toward that goal, Nyhoff purchased a fifteen acre site (east of the residential historic district) sandwiched between Nitrate Plant No. 2 and the Tennessee River at the eastern edge of Sheffield. With its proximity to Wilson Dam and Nitrate Plant No. 2 and the passage of the Jackson Highway and electric carline through it, the property was ideally situated.

Nyhoff developed a subdivision with a series of streets on the north and south sides of Jackson Highway. In 1924 (a), the *Sheffield Standard* carried the headline "Nyhoff Properties Steadily Improving." The article stated that waterline taps to 23 lots had been completed. Three residences stood ready for occupation. Twenty to thirty residences would follow in the next month. Nyhoff built two commercial buildings in his subdivision (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Upper floors of a three story, brick building housed apartments and offices for the Nyhoff Real Estate Company while the bottom floor housed retail space. A furniture store occupied this space for much of the building's history. Nyhoff built another building on the opposite side of the Jackson Highway. This two story, brick edifice originally served a Buick-Cadillac dealer. In the 1930s, it was a popular restaurant and night club (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Adjacent to Nyhoff's buildings, the Elks built a three story, brick lodge.

A spirit of economic optimism launched a serious residential construction campaign that spread throughout Sheffield. In May of 1923, 25 houses were under construction according to a *Sheffield Standard* (1923 a) article. The newspaper projected that 200 new homes would be required to accommodate the population increase. In 1924, Sheffield boasted of a population of approximately 10,000 (*Sheffield Standard* 1924 b). By 1925, it was estimated that 400 residences were built in the Muscle Shoals district (*Sheffield Standard* 1925 a). The River Bluff Subdivision was open for development in the late 1920s (Sanborn Map Company 1928). Resource 659, a two and a half story, brick and stone Tudor Revival mansion on Riverbluff Drive, was built circa 1925.

Commercial ventures abounded in this period too. In 1926, A. L. Howell purchased three lots on Montgomery Avenue adjoining the Sheffield Hotel (*Sheffield Standard* 1926 a). Construction of the Airdome Theatre, which would feature movies and Vaudeville shows, was in progress at the corner of Montgomery Avenue and Fifth Street in 1924 (*Sheffield Standard* 1924 c). The Ritz Theatre opened July 9, 1928 (*Tri Cities Daily* 1928). Dr. H. A. Griffith built an office building (Resource 74) on Nashville Avenue in 1928. Even the City of Sheffield found itself caught up in the boom. City officials had City Hall built in 1926.

Industry enjoyed gains during the 1920s. Dr. W. J. Galloway, a druggist, purchased property on Austin Avenue and First Street with the intention of constructing a factory in 1923 (*Sheffield Standard* 1923 b). Galloway planned to produce "Galloway's Embrocation" at his plant. A lead battery plate plant was slated for opening on March 1, 1923 (*Sheffield Standard* 1923 c). The King Company announced that it would build a plant in

Sheffield in 1926 (*Sheffield Standard* 1926 a). It manufactured white way standards and anticipated a pay roll of a half million dollars. In 1928, the Nehi Company was in the process of equipping a plant in Sheffield (*Sheffield Standard* 1928 a); however, postponed the opening for a number of years.

Ford's plans for the Muscle Shoals area were never realized. Senator George Norris of Nebraska opposed Ford's privatization of the Muscle Shoals properties, believing that the government facilities should remain in the public domain (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Norris attempted to thwart Ford's efforts to acquire Wilson Dam and the nitrate plants by authorizing the Norris Bill, which called for government operation of the facilities. Although President Hoover vetoed the bill, Ford tired of Norris' opposition and withdrew his proposal in 1924. Nonetheless, Sheffield capitalized on the auto maker's vision for the Muscle Shoals area.

Sheffield was not immune to the deleterious effects of the Great Depression. The banks closed; people lost their jobs; businesses closed; and college students were forced to withdraw from school and return home to find whatever jobs were available (Sepmeier 1977). Succor came to Sheffield in the way of the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA). Established in 1933, the TVA addressed a sixfold mission: improve manageability of the Tennessee River and provide flood control by the construction of dams; generate electrical power for the Tennessee River Valley; reforest denuded lands; provide for agricultural and industrial development; operate Muscle Shoals properties for national defense; and manufacture fertilizer (Headrick and Schafer 1993). The nitrate plants and Wilson Dam went into full production. Construction of Wheeler Dam several miles east of Wilson Dam began in earnest in 1933. TVA provided a boost to the Sheffield economy in the 1930s.

A 1936 TVA map provides compelling evidence as to the presence of the TVA in the Muscle Shoals area. Flanking the west and east sides of Sheffield were U.S. Nitrate Plants No. 1 and No. 2. Wilson Dam Village No. 2, a community of several hundred workers cottages, was situated just southeast of Nyhoff's Subdivision. Operated by the TVA and Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), the Muscle Shoals Nursery lay southeast of U. S. Nitrate Plant No. 2. CCC Camp No. 2426 - TVA No. 3 and CCC Camp No. 4499 - TVA No. 2 were stationed northeast of Nyhoff's Subdivision. TVA central offices were ensconced in a building north of the CCC-TVA camps.

Many in the Shoals district credited the New Deal with resuscitating the local economy. "Yesterday, depression, Today, a New Deal, and more business, more employment, and more money circulating," claimed a *Sheffield Standard* (1934 a) story after the newspaper conducted a survey of bankers, merchants, professional men, farmers, and laborers. The TVA employed 3,100 men on projects from Decatur to Tupelo, Mississippi. The CCC enlisted 1,000 boys in local conservation projects (*Sheffield Standard* 1934 a). In one pay period, the TVA accounted for a 3/4 million dollar payroll in the Shoals (*Sheffield Standard* 1935 a). Approximately 4,200 men were employed in the construction of Wheeler Dam with a monthly payroll of 450,000. Another 2,600 men worked on clearing the Wheeler Dam reservoir with an aggregate payroll of \$300,000 per month. The Public Works Administration (PWA) underwrote \$230,000 for Sheffield's municipal power plant (*Sheffield Standard* 1935 b). Sheffield's power company building was a result of this PWA project. Among other activities, the TVA's nursery produced 40,000,000 seedlings that were ultimately planted in the Tennessee Valley as part of the TVA CCC efforts to prevent soil erosion (*Sheffield Standard* 1935 c).

Sheffield was the first of Shoal's cities to provide its citizens with TVA produced power. Its white way system was flooded with light generated by TVA power for the first time on March 19, 1936 (*Sheffield Standard* 1936 a). Sheffield won first place in the Alabama League of Municipalities contest having accomplished the most good with WPA money for cities with populations 5,000 to 25,000. In 1936, the PWA sponsored a \$50,000 harbor project in Sheffield (*Sheffield Standard* 1936 b).

Through the 1930s, Sheffield attracted manufacturing enterprises. In 1932, the Robbins Tire and Rubber Company announced that it would acquire the erstwhile Rubber Products Corporation in Muscle Shoals City (*Sheffield Standard* 1932 a). The Robbins Tire and Rubber Company employed 100 men. The Union Carbide Company entertained plans to develop a plant in the Shoals district (*Sheffield Standard* 1938 a). Woburn Industries Farm Bureau planned a facility to process castor beans in Sheffield (*Sheffield Standard* 1939 a). Not missing a beat in the 1930s, the King Company rolled out white way standard after standard. In 1930, the manufacturer filled a government order for 1200 lamp posts (*Sheffield Standard* 1930 a). The company operated a six day, nine hour shift, employing many local men. In 1931, the King Company was awarded a contract to supply 219 white way standards for the George Washington Bridge in New York (*Sheffield Standard* 1931 a). The King Company's white ways were also featured on the Arthur Kill Bridge, Galveston Bridge, Texas Causeway Bridge, and Lake Pontchartrain Bridge in Louisiana.

Sheffield faced yet another housing shortage in the 1930s. "Quite a shortage of desirable houses and apartments" in the Muscle Shoals area was reported by the *Sheffield Standard* (1934 c). That reopening of the Nitrate Plant No. 1 and No. 2 villages would relieve the problem was hoped by many. The Sheffield City Commission established a Housing Authority in order to find solutions to the housing crisis in 1935 (*Sheffield Standard* 1935 e). A residential construction campaign was initiated in April of 1935 (*Sheffield Standard* 1935 f). In 1936, the Martin Home (Resource 593) was built on a Park Boulevard lot overlooking the Tennessee River (*Sheffield Standard* 1936 b).

In the absence of new construction, Colbert County's Better Housing Program initiated a campaign to repair and remodel the existing building stock. "Clean Up, Paint Up Week" was quite a success in Sheffield in April of 1935 (*Sheffield Standard* 1935 g). Unfortunately, Colbert County's Better Housing Program encouraged residents to give their homes a youthful makeover (*Sheffield Standard* 1935 h). A more up-to-date and streamlined appearance could be obtained by the removal of gingerbread ornaments or fancy trim and the application of modern cladding according to the housing authority. Thus it was that many Victorians were stripped of their quintessential stylistic details, a point that is not unnoticed by today's viewer. Many porches were streamlined during this period as well. For this reason, many Victorians have featured bungalow like porches for the last sixty years. Nonetheless, housing continued to be a problem throughout the remainder of the decade. In 1938, Judge Carmichael urged the construction of more homes (*Sheffield Standard* 1938).

A 1936 TVA map provides a sketch of Sheffield's development in the 1930s. The Nyhoff Subdivision appeared much as it did in 1928. Very little development occurred south of Jackson Highway between 1928 and 1936. The area bounded by Dover Avenue, 2nd Street, and 27th Street featured many residences which were constructed between 1890 and 1936. That bounded by 27th, 31st, and 2nd Streets was sparsely populated by houses and a few commercial buildings. These buildings were built between 1924 and 1936. On the south

side of 1st Street, the African American district was replete with residences, churches, stores, and industries. Several stores stood on Ashe Street south of the Southern Railway tracks. Commercial buildings abounded in the business district between Atlanta and Pittsburgh Avenues and Ashe and Sixth Street. Hundreds of dwellings occupied lots from Dover Avenue to Park Boulevard and 1st Street to the river. Sandwiched between U.S. Nitrate Plant No. 1 and Park Boulevard were dwellings and industry.

The direct link between TVA facilities and national defense kept life bustling in Sheffield during World War II. The Reynolds Metal Company built a plant in Sheffield in 1941 (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Additional chemical plants were constructed on TVA property. These plants and others in Muscle Shoals operated around the clock producing munitions and other wartime goods for the allied cause. With plentiful employment, the Sheffield population swelled from 7,933 in 1940 to 10,767 in 1950 (Friends of the Sheffield Public Library 1985). Housing was in great demand. People added on to their homes and converted garages in order to accommodate those requiring shelter. TVA built 250 prefabricated units throughout the area (Rosenbaum 1993). Sheffield contributed many resources to the war effort.

A calamity in 1938 led to development in the vicinity of 18th and 19th Avenues and 30th Street in the 1940s. On April 21, 1938, conflagration consumed the Sheffield High School on Atlanta and Annapolis Avenues and 9th and 10th Streets, which was built in 1923 (*Sheffield Standard* 1938 c). The City School Board issued a \$104,000 bond to match a PWA grant of \$123,000 grant with which to build a new high school (*Sheffield Standard* 1938 d). Hailed as modern in every detail, including its PWA Modern design, the new high school opened for classes in March of 1940. The school was situated between 28th and 30th Streets and 18th and 19th Avenues. The junior high was built on the previous high school site. Residential construction soon embraced the new high school.

In 1941, efforts were made to ameliorate the housing crunch. Sheffield Homes, Inc. built 65 homes in the High Point Subdivision (*Sheffield Standard* 1941 a). Constructed for defense workers, the houses were located in the vicinity of 30th Street and 17th Avenue near the high school. The Defense Homes Corporation bought 40 acres between 12th and 16th Avenues and 31st and 33rd Avenues in 1941. The corporation contracted the Rust Brothers of Birmingham to erect 160 dwellings in what came to be known as York Terrace (*Sheffield Standard* 1941 b). Featured in the subdivision were 120 Type A two bedroom models; 24 Type B two bedroom models; and 15 Type D three bedroom models. The houses came with an electric range, electric refrigerator, electric water heater, base cabinets in the kitchen, oil burning floor heater, and tub and shower (*Sheffield Standard* 1941 c). Opened as rental units for defense workers in 1943, the houses were sold to the public in 1944.

For many areas nation wide, the end of World War II meant the end of the war industries that fueled the economy. Such was not the case for the Muscle Shoals. In 1944, the U.S. Department of Labor predicted a roseate future for the Tri-Cities (*Sheffield Standard* 1944). Nitrates, phosphates, and aluminum, the Shoals contributions to the war cause, promised to be as vital in rebuilding the world as they had been in defeating the axis powers. "An expected age of light metal would bring with it brisk demand for the area's aluminum (*Sheffield Standard* 1944). TVA's fertilizer development facilities would be instrumental in helping feed the world's hungry.

Sheffield's bright future grew brighter when the industrial scene expanded. In 1946, the Union Aluminum Company (UALCO) opened for business. Located in a large plant that extended from Raleigh Avenue to Pittsburgh Avenue, the company manufactured aluminum casement windows (*Tri-Cities Daily* 1948). UALCO, which secured its raw materials from Muscle Shoals based Reynolds Aluminum, shipped its products nation wide as well as to Cuba, Canada, the Philippines, Brazil, Argentina, and Puerto Rico. UALCO locally distributed its products through its affiliate Southern Sash. Southern Sash operated out of a facility on the south side of First Street. Together, UALCO, the world's largest manufacturer of aluminum casement windows, and Southern Sash employed 150. The J. A. Jones Construction Company of Sheffield was awarded a contract to manufacture artillery shells in 1945 (*Tri-Cities Daily* 1945). The shell maker employed approximately 1,500 people. In 1945, TVA announced that it was moving the headquarters of its chemical operations to the Muscle Shoals (*Sheffield Standard* 1945 a). A Lime Cola plant was built at 703 South Montgomery Avenue in 1946 (*Sheffield Standard* 1946). Sheffield bustled with industrial activity in the late 1940s.

In response to the prevailing economic optimism, many applied for building permits in 1945. New homes popped up all over the High Point and York Terrace Subdivisions (*Sheffield Standard* 1945 b). A number of the homes were built of concrete blocks. At this time, Alabama Court was opened for development. Located near Park Boulevard and the Tennessee River, Alabama Court became the address of six, wood frame houses of the Colonial Revival genre (Resources 20, 25, 26, and 27) in the late 1940s. In 1949, Southern Sash marketed the Lustron House for distribution in the Shoals. Constructed of prefabricated metal parts, the Lustron House was hailed as a break through in house design. Only two were erected in Sheffield, one across from the Liberty Village and the second on the east side of town.

With a strong industrial foundation, Sheffield enjoyed relatively sound growth over the next five decades. Better late than never, the Ford Motor Company built a plant in the Shoals in the 1950s. The Rivermont Subdivision was developed west of Nitrate Plant Village No. 1 during this decade. While the African American section of town expanded southward, the open land between the Jackson Highway and the Tennessee River began to give way to development with each successive decade. Unfortunately, the construction of a shopping mall along South Montgomery Avenue in the 1960s and 1970s displaced a number of long time Montgomery Avenue businesses which sought more modern environs; but in the late 1980s that trend began reversing itself as the City of Sheffield began preserving its historic resources.
