The brick church with its square tower and classic simple lines stands out in the skyline of Franklin, Tennessee. It was begun in 1831 and completed in 1834. The church was constructed of beautiful hand made brick and contains a crypt. Originally the sanctuary had slave galleries on either side and the altar was in the tower end or south end of the church. The sanctuary originally had windows imported from France and the interior was vaulted and stained.

The simplicity and beauty of the little church made little difference to the Union soldiers who used it for a hospital during and after the battle of Franklin, November 30, 1864. The pulpit and pews were cut up and burned where the communion table stood beneath the tower. From holes cut in the roof, smoke eddied around the bell and escaped through the steeple; niches chopped into the cedar posts in the interior for mounting bunks may still be seen. With no regard for the pipe organ which was the first west of the Appalachians, it was burned also.

In 1869 the Reverend Mr. Edward Bradley, then rector of St. Paul's began remodeling procedures. The altar at this time was moved to the north end of the church. Some twenty feet of the side walls were removed, lowering the roof and doing away with the slave These bricks were used to build the present Parish Commons Hall. When the altar was moved to the northern end of the building, the whole window structure of the church was changed. Two round side windows, three windows over the altar, and the large windows in the nave were reduced to their present size. A new altar was given to St. Paul's by the Church of the Advent in Nashville. The remodeled church was reconsecrated on January 25, 1871, by the Right Reverend Charles Quintard. About thirty years after the Civil War the government of the United States, petitioned by Franklin citizens, made amends for the damage which its troops had inflicted. An award of \$1,500.00 was granted.

Prior to 1917 Tiffany stained glass windows were placed in the nave, over the altar, and on the sides of the sanctuary. In 1915 the present paneling was installed in the sanctuary along with a new altar. The pews were installed between the years of 1882 and 1893. The iron fence around the building was purchased from the Presbyterians when they tore down an old church in 1887.

New church school rooms, parish offices and children's chapel have just been completed as an addition to the rear of the building but have been added in compatible size and materials.

St. Paul's Church in Franklin is significant because of its architecture as well as its history. The plain square tower of St. Paul's rises in dignified simplicity behind the ribs of iron gates and fencing wrought from Williamson County iron. facade of brick, handmade on the site, is unadorned except for lancet windows and a low parapet around the tower. buttress-like projections give a feeling of the Gothic period to the stately structure.

St. Paul's Episcopal Church is the "MotherChurch of the Diocese of Tennessee." At St. Paul's, James H. Otey, its first rector, was elected the first bishop of Tennessee. It is the oldest Episcopal Church and congregation in Tennessee, and the oldest Episcopal Church building in continual use west of the Appalachians.

St. Paul's located in the heart of Franklin, was in the shadows of the bloody battle of Franklin in November, 1864, and after the battle the church was used as a hospital for the wounded by the Federals. The building was greatly descorated by the troops but was restored after the war to its present condition. ses a seed it for



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
