7. Description

Built in a Western Commercial style, the Ringling Road Depot in Ardmore consists of a main, two-story section and a one-story extension used for freight storage. It is a rectangular building of red brick construction 185' by 32'. A concrete entablature encircles the building near the roofline. The north and south elevations have paired, double-hung, sash windows with connecting stone lintels and sills. The second story on the east side has three, double-hung sash windows with a continuous stone lintel.

The main two-story section has five bays on the north and south sides. This section has at the first floor level a bay-like projection on the north which served as a ticket window. The main entrance is located on the east end of the depot. Between the first and second stories is a deep wooden eave with massive supporting brackets, which extends around the perimeter of the building. This eave has asphalt shingles.

The single-story freight section has freight doors located on the north and south elevations. The building has a narrow concrete foundation. Decorative elements include tie-rod endings and a stone insert in the front of the building with the words Ringling Road Station.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Ringling Road Depot in Ardmore is significant because it is the only building in Oklahoma directly associated with John Ringling of Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus.

John Ringling's railroad building efforts led directly to the establishment of three towns in southern Oklahoma: Ringling, Wilson, and Healdton, as well as the Healdton oilfield.

Ringling and the city of Ardmore built this depot in 1915, with Ringling's Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Pacific Railroad Company. Construction of a line west from Ardmore had been begun in 1913 and was supposed to reach Lawton, Oklahoma. By the time builders finished the depot, the line extended 25 miles to the west, the present site of Ringling, Oklahoma. The depot built there no longer exists.

The Ringling Road never extended further west than Ringling because of the discovery of oil at Healdton, Oklahoma. The oilfield at Healdton was vital to the Allied effort in World War I. It supplied 50% of all the oil the Allied powers used during the war. The Ringling Road made this output possible.

The Santa Fe Railroad Company purchased the Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Pacific Railroad from Ringling in 1926. Santa Fe used the line until 1976, when they closed the 25-mile stretch. They sold the depot to the city of Ardmore, which leased it to the local American Legion.
