The boundary of the property includes the house and meat house, located in a rectangular yard area south of the farm buildings. The farm buildings are of recent construction or in poor condition and although located near or in the vicinity of historic locations, do not contribute to the overall integrity of the property. The property's significance is based on the architectural qualities of the farmhouse. The boundary is therefore justified as the 75' by 150' rectangular space of the domestic yard area that is conveniently isolated from the rest of the farm by a post and woven wire fence to the north and south sides. Beginning at point A on the west side of Burks Branch Road, which is the south yard fence, proceed 75' north to the north yard fence at point B; then north 150' along the fenceline to point C; then 75' south to the south fenceline; then 150' east along that fenceline to the point of origin.

#### 45. Description and House Plan:

The property consists of two frame buildings; the house and meat house of a turn-of-the-century farm complex. The two buildings are located near the west edge of the Burks Branch Road, surrounded by a yard with a post and woven wire fence. Mature sugar and water maple and locust trees and landscaped bushes and flowers define the yard boundaries. Out buildings (garage, milk house, tobacco barn, etc.), are not included in the site because of recent construction dates or loss of physical integrity. The farm's dairy barn burned in November of 1985 and was not replaced. The nominated property maintains good overall integrity.

The house is a two story, frame Princess Anne dwelling with multigabled roof; chevron patterned gable ends; two interior brick chimneys and one brick flue on the rear addition; boxed eave; elaborate gingerbread porch frieze with turned columns; double vertical light sash windows with bullseye block corner trim; a carved, half light entry door with bracketed hood; and stone foundation. The interior plan is asymmetrical with the front entry hall featuring an elaborate stairway with bullseye blocks on every riser end; window and door trim of pine with bullseye corner blocks and panel inserts beneath windows; and fireplaces in each room. built on farms in the closing decades of the 19th century were of either a center passage I-house plan or T-plan. Far less common is an asymmetrical plan with only one room opening off the formal entry hall. In addition, the decorative porch and window trim, applied to an otherwise plain Princess Anne exterior form indicates a desire to build in a style popularized in widely distributed pattern books with up-to-date ideas on late Victorian design. The house is an interesting vernacular adaptation of that national era, in the way the plain, almost homely form is embellished here and there (gable ends, window trim and porch frieze; all the logical places) with elaborate jigsaw and stock trim.

### 45. Description and House Plan

a one-story, gable roofed kitchen and a single story enclosed porch. These alterations are to the rear and do not compromise the building's integrity to a significant degree.

The meat house, located in the rear, domestic yard has vertical board walls, a gable roof with single entry beneath and stone foundation.

The property boundaries include two contributing buildings.
