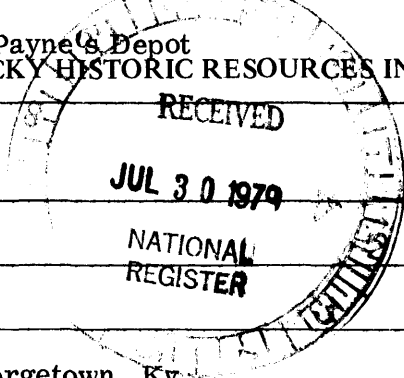

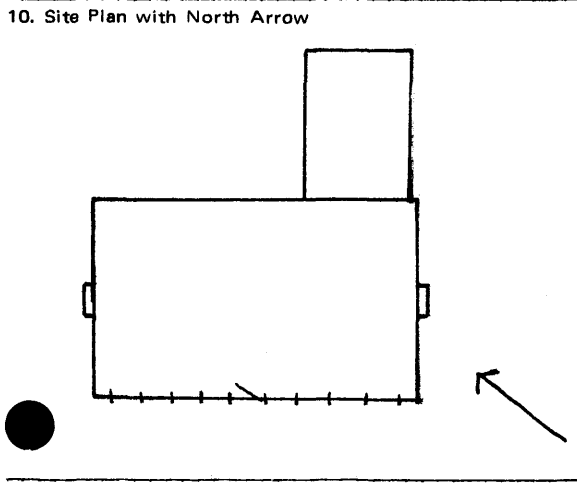

18. Description **The Asa Payne House is a two-story, five-bay structure laid in Flemish bond. Windows are nine-over-six on the first floor and six-over-six on the second. Square, gable windows flank the exterior, end chimneys. The one-story, front portico is a ca. 1900 addition. The one-story rear wing has round arched windows and was added after the original construction. The nominated acreage is sufficient to retain the visual setting of the house.**

19. History **The Paynes Depot area takes its name from Col. Asa Payne who built the house on 209 acres he purchased in 1806. Educated at West Point, Asa Payne served as an aide-de-camp to his father, Gen. John Payne, in the War of 1812. He devoted himself to farming after the war and became one of the first residents of the area to utilize the old Louisville, Lexington, Cincinnati Railroad as a means of exporting produce from the country.**

#### Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary begins at point A (see U.S.G.S. map) on the west side of U.S. 62 and runs northwest for approximately 1000 feet to point B. Turning southwest, the line runs for approximately 400 feet to point C and then turns southeast for approximately 1000 feet to point D, following the private drive to its junction with U.S. 62. At point D, the line turns northeast following the west side of U.S. 62 for approximately 400 feet to the point of origin.
