DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This cobblestone house was built in 1851. A two story block stands to the right of a one-story wing. There is an inset porch. The walls of the entire house are of cobblestone facing of various sizes and colors. The cobblestones on the left side and the end wall of the wing are somewhat larger than the average, and the largest cobblestones of all are on the rear wall. The house faces the highway, toward the east. The corner quoins of the Loomis house are squared gray limestone blocks which have been left rather rough and are set almost flush against the plane of the cobblestone walls. Four square Doric columns, two of them engaged, support the porch. The low-pitched, gabled roof with its returned eaves and simple cornice suggests the Greek Revival style, but the overall effect is that of a simple, well-built dwelling without grand pretensions. The Loomis house is now in need of some minor repairs, for instance in the area of the porch, but it remains basically sound.

The Loomis house was built in 1851 by Horace Loomis, a farmer from Vermont who had emigrated to Wisconsin via New York State. (Both of Loomis' sons, Francis and Charles, had been born in New York State.)<sup>1</sup> The Loomis house is a fine example of the cobblestone architecture imported into Wisconsin mostly by settlers who, like the Loomises, came either from New England or New York. The beauty of the Loomis house comes from the fairly small oval stones used. These are set out rather prominently and create a strong texture. Richard W.E. Perrin calls the Loomis house "a cobblestone classic." <sup>2</sup>
