DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

"The Old Stone Church" is of a simple rectangular plan, 56' long by 54' wide, three bays wide with a south facing entrance, typical of the early churches. Centered on the south front is a spire, approximately 100' in total height, and projecting from the front to create a pavilion. All of the exterior walls are of stone. The lower portion of the center spire is finely faced and coursed red sandstone, with the upper part of the spire of a more rusticated finish. Except for well cut and coursed quoins at all corners, the outer walls are of random sized, uncut and uncoursed field stone.

The original main entrance doors are extant; however, in 1898 the original windows in the side bays of the south front were replaced by doors. The arch keystones carry the date of the change. There is some uncertainty as to whether these pointed arches are original (18th Century), but no physical or documentary evidence exists suggesting an earlier window listed.

The restoration included replacing the "art glass" windows with small pane clear glass windows patterned after the early photo. Interior partitions, later stairways in the side bays, and later pews and pulpit were removed and replaced with reproductions to recreate the plan referred to above. Church records refer to the pulpit as being "massive" towering above the heads of the congregation, and having been imported from Holland. The pulpit installed is a "barrel" or "wineglass" design with a testor (sounding board), patterned after the original in the North Church in Albany, New York and similar to the Sleepy Hollow Reformed Church.

High backed square shaped pews were installed to create the feeling of the original, although lower for practical reasons. Doors are installed on the "elders' benches" to the sides of the pulpit. The original balcony or loft, which was used by the slaves to attend services, and later served as the first Sunday School, is intact, with only minor work required to restore its original appearance.

On the Church property remains one of the very few privys in the area. Still functional, it is often a welcome "convenience" to those who spend a casual hour or so enjoying the tranquility and beauty of an early country church-yard. Truckers and other passers-by can often be seen on a pleasant day enjoying a placid lunch, or just taking a break from the routines of the day.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Functioning continuously as a religious facility for nearly 200 years, the New North Reformed Low Dutch Church is an important example of early church architecture in Bergen County and was the center of social and educational activity for the entire area.

The Old Stone Church was established in 1784 as the New North Reformed Low Dutch Church, as a "spin-off" of the Reformed Church of Paramus (National Register - 1975), whose Pastor, the Rev. Benjamin Vanderlinde, donated the original two acres of land for the Church site. The original of the deed from Rev. Vanderlinde hangs in the Church's lounge.

Local legend has held that a smaller structure was constructed in the 1784-89 period, and that the present structure was erected in 1814-19, since local records seem to indicate construction activity at that time. During the restoration of 1971-72, no evidence of an earlier structure, or of the present structure having been enlarged, was found. Since the keystone in the arch over the main entrance appears to be original and is dated 1789, this date is accepted as the date of construction of the present edifice.

The significance of the Old Stone Church is based upon its typical architecture for a vernacular country church of the late 18th to early 19th Century. There remain within Bergen County about fifteen similar stone churches, of somewhat earlier or later vintage. The Old Stone Church retains much of its original appearance, and is one of the best preserved, in relatively unchanged configuration, of the extant group.

The social impact exerted by the Church on the lives of the early settlers of the area was substantial. The Dutch, and other settlers who were assimilated into the Dutch culture, were devout worshippers, and the Church functioned not only as the center of religious life, but also as the center of all social and educational life. All organized activities were structured around the early church. It became social hall, meeting house and school. As the earliest church, and for many years the only church, in the Saddle River Valley during the 18th and early 19th Centuries, the Old Stone Church was a central part of the life of the area.

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8. SIGNIFICANCE (continued)

The cemetery, still in active use, became the burial place of many of the early settlers, and weather-beaten grave stones of a few Revolutionary War veterans may still be seen.
