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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The two story red brick residence, built in 1872 for the family of Camillus Nelson, is picturesquely located north of County Road 98, surrounded by a garden and towering trees. Its architectural design is principally of the Italianate style, although typical local adaptations of various architectural styles were incorporated into the design of this rural home. The house is a two story brick structure with a two story wooden section at the NW corner and a single story wooden section at the NE corner. Standing 25 feet tall, the rectangular house measures 28 feet across the front and 32 feet along the side. It rests on a visible three step brick foundation. The brick is of a style found in Northern California, one row of headersand then six rows of stretchers. The mortar in the first three feet of the walls has eroded from the brick and is in need of restoration.

Each window has a strip cornice above. The central window above the main entrance has a combination of a strip cornice and a pediment. This, along with the gable of the roof, gives the round arched, molded doorway special emphasis. Balustraded porches which formerly adorned the front of both the 1st and 2nd story have been removed, but could be restored.

In addition to the home and an adjacent tank house (without its former windmill), other ranch buildings once included a workman's cabin, blacksmith's shop, carriage barn, large machine shed, granary for wheat and barley, two large hay barns, watering troughs for stock, a small vineyard and a rose garden in front of the house.

The interior design is simple and functionally suited to the home's use as a farm residence for a large family. On the first floor there is a living room, dining room, double parlor, divided by sliding doors; and at the rear is a large porch, the kitchen and a storage room. Eleven foot ceilings are decorated with original rosettes. Some walls and moldings are in need of restoration. A hardwood stairway leads to seven bedrooms on the upper floor.

A parcel of land beginning at the north end of County Road 102 and lying about 2800 feet easterly from that point fronting on the north side of County Road 18-C, and being about 1500 feet in depth.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The pioneer farm home and 100 acres of the original Camillus Nelson Ranch have recently been deeded to the State of California Department of Parks & Recreation for restoration and development as a living historic agricultural farm. This and another large portion of the Nelson farm, deeded to the University of California Davis School of Medicine, are the gifts of C. Nelson Hackett, grandson of Camillus Nelson, a native of Kentucky and a veteran of the Mexican War, who first came to California in 1849 and settled permanently in Yolo County in the late 1850's.

In about 1872, he acquired clear title to some 3,000 acres of Swamp and Overflow land along the south bank of Cache Creek, land which had formerly been part of Rancho Rio de Jesus Maria, a grant of six leagues made to Thomas M. Hardy, an Englishman, by Mexican Governor M. Micheltorena on October 23, 1843. In the geographic center of these holdings, C. Nelson built an imposing two-story brick residence for his family in 1872, and established headquarters for his extensive cattle and grainraising operations. This successful agriculturalist served on the Board of Directors when the Bank of Woodland was incorporated in 1868 and made many civic contributions.

The proposed development of this historical landmark into a functioning valley ranch of the 1860-1900 period has statewide and national significance as an educational, cultural and recreational resource. This project has the wholehearted support of the Yolo County Historical Society. Establishment of this "living" museum in Yolo County is of particular significance for several reasons. First, the high degree of agricultural success achieved by the earliest pioneer ranchers of Yolo County led to development of a center of invention and manufacture of farm machinery that has continued to be of international importance. Secondly, the proximity of this proposed outdoor museum of rural Californiana to the State's first agricultural college, established at Davis in 1905, would be of mutual benefit. In addition to an exchange of historical collections for display purposes, the Nelson Ranch could provide an important research and educational resource for many departments on the ever-expanding University of California Davis campus.

Overall, restoration of the pioneer Nelson home and development of the surrounding acreage into a "living" historical farm would provide an educational and cultural resource to be enjoyed by all citizens and
