Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Daniel Stein House (c.1875) is a rambling frame residence with touches of the Gothic Revival, Italianate, and Colonial Revival styles. It is located on a large lot near the center of Farmerville. Despite several changes over the years, the house retains its National Register eligibility as an architectural landmark in Union Parish.

The house has an off-center axial hall with two rooms on one side and four rooms on the other. There is also a secondary rear hall. The capacious attic is completely open and was never finished.

The Gothic Revival influence can be seen in the two steeply pitched forwardfacing gables with their decorative verge cuts. Italianate features include the window and door surrounds inside and out, the interior paneling, and the mantels. Major openings on the exterior are ornamented with jigsaw cut surrounds which terminate in pediment shaped cornices. Major openings on the interior are ornamented with elaborate multiple shoulder molds and bold molding profiles. The interior of the parlor bay window is adorned with copious panels, some of which have false burl graining. are false grained to give the effect of alternating diagonal planks of walnut and oak. The two matching original mantels are located in the front rooms at opposite ends of the house. Each features intricately chamfered pilasters and double brackets. There is also an Italianate looking mantel in the rear central room which appears to have been assembled from salvaged parts. It is not known if this feature is original or not, but it has been in the house as long as anyone can remember. Other noteworthy features which are original include a projecting polygonal bay in the front parlor, the four over four windows, the floorboards in most rooms, and the diagonally striped wainscotting in the front parlor and main hall. This wainscotting matches the panels in the front parlor bay window.

Over the years the Stein House has undergone something of an evolution. Originally the front gallery only ran between the two projecting front rooms. The present Colonial Revival gallery encompasses the entire front, turns the corner in a curve, and runs down the side. This gallery was probably added in stages, and achieved its present style and configuration in the 1920s. Originally there was a smaller central front-facing gable which matched the two still there. When it was lost is not known, but it was probably in the 1930s when several other changes were made. These other changes include the addition of a rear kitchen, the enclosure of a portion of the side gallery, and the addition of a side wing with a polygonal bay using materials salvaged from the dining room, which is just behind the front parlor. A band of 1930s windows in the dining room shows where the "surgery" took place. There were also some

minor	changes	in	the	1930s,	including	adding	some	cabinets,	changing	some	doors,	and

minor changes in the 1930s, including adding some cabinets, changing some doors, and treating the exposed exterior walls with asbestos siding. The only recent changes have been the installation of a c.1900 oak mantel in the front central room and the enclosure of a rear gallery.

Despite these admittedly noteworthy alterations, the Stein House is still an architectural landmark in Union Parish, for the reasons cited in Part 8.

Directly behind the house is a garage built in the last couple of years. Of course, it is listed as a non-contributing element.


State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Stein House is of local significance in the area of architecture as an architectural landmark within the context of Union Parish. It is one of very few buildings left to represent the pre-Queen Anne Revival taste.

Union is a piney woods parish which has been largely characterized by Upland South settlement and relatively small-scale agriculture. There was also some lumber related development in the early twentieth century. All of this has left the parish with a comparatively modest architectural patrimony, as is shown in the Comprehensive Historic Structures Survey. The survey has identified some 317 50+ year old buildings in the parish, most of which are bungalows or ordinary commercial buildings. There are very few buildings in the parish with high style pretention, and only seven which represent the pre-Queen Anne Revival taste. Most of the latter are greatly altered, but a few still markedly display noteworthy pre-Queen Anne Revival architectural features. One of these is the Stein House. Noteworthy features include the surviving Gothic Revival influenced gables, the copious Italianate woodwork, and the polygonal bay. The architectural history and development of the Stein House extends much further back in time and is much richer than the overwhelming majority of older structures in Union Parish. Moreover, it is one of the parish's largest older buildings, a fact which underscores its local landmark standing.

#### LEGAL DESCRIPTION:

A certain tract of land situated in the  $SE_4^1$  of the  $SW_4^1$  of Section 30, T21N, R1E, Town of Farmerville, Union Parish, Louisiana, and being more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

Commencing at a three inch iron pipe found set in concrete representing the NE Corner of said Section 30, thence 4,281.64 feet South and 2,773.12 feet West to a 5/8 inch rebar set on the South Right-Of-Way Line of Jackson Street (apparent forty foot R/W) and marking the POINT OF BEGINNING; thence S0°57'00"W parallel to the west right-of-way line of Lafayette Street (apparent forty foot R/W) for a distance of 182.88 feet to a 5/8 inch rebar set on the North Right-Of-Way Line of Bayou Street (apparent forty foot R/W); thence N88°50'23"W along said north R/W line for a distance of 188.77 feet to a 5/8 inch rebar set 218 feet east of the East Right-Of-Way Line of Church Street (previously Jefferson Street, thirty foot apparent R/W); thence N1°15'46"E for a distance of 181.38 feet to a 5/8 inch rebar set on the South Right-Of-Way Line of Jackson Street; thence S89°17'52"E along said south R/W line for a distance of 187.78 feet to the POINT OF BEGINNING; containing 0.79 acre, more or less, and being subject to any rights-of-ways, easements or servitudes of record or use.
