NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Honorable William Kennison Wood home is a two story Late Victorian Italianate home. It is situated in a rural area and is sited in the middle of a spacious yard among a group of large, old, cedar, maple and pine trees. Two large stones, each with a horse tie ring embedded, are set back from the country road at the end of the walkway that leads past a formal garden to the porch.

The stone foundation is visible. The wood siding of the home is a light gray with a darker trim. The exterior doors are of natural finish. The large columns on the front entrance are over a stone foundation and support a porch accessible from the second floor. A sloping basement door is located on the west of the home.

The roof has wood shingles, except for the north portion which is scheduled to be shingled with wood in 1995. The roof line is gabled. Three equal size gables face the north, two face the south, and one faces the west. All the overhangs, as well as the porch posts, are supported by decorative brackets.

Most of the woodwork of the interior is original. Replaced wood, when possible, came from the timber on the farm or reclaimed from old homes. Finishing and mold copying of replacement wood was accomplished on the farm. The floor of the dining and sitting room are oak. The rest of the house, except for the stairways and bathrooms, which are walnut and tile respectively, are hard yellow pine.

There are two bathrooms. The walnut trimmed bathroom was partitioned off the sitting room in the 1940s. The oak trimmed bathroom, located in southwest corner of the house, was remodeled from a small wash room in 1986.

The diningroom, sitting room, and living room all have painted trim. All the rooms have wallpaper except for the upstairs servant's quarters. The library has the original wallpaper and carpet. The paper of the library is worn as is the carpet. Efforts are being made to copy the original wallpaper. The trim of the library is heavy and ornate. A decorative frieze encircles the sidewalls about ten inches from the ceiling.

There are two stairways to the second floor. One leads to the servant's quarters over the kitchen. It is completely separated from the other second floor bedrooms. This single room with wainscoting is finished in natural pine. Windows open to the east and south. The other stairway is open with a curved walnut handrail, oak balusters, and walnut treads. The hall along the stairway leads to the dining room with side doors to the living room and library. The original ornate front door is flanked by flowered designed, red stained glass. The hallway trim and doors are finished with feathered or tramp art. This finish is of excellent quality. The open stairway is curved with midway and second floor landings. The second floor landing opens to two formal bedrooms. The landing also has two window doors that open to the outside over the front entrance.

The W.K.Wood home appears in the 1875 <u>A.T.Andreas Ill-</u> <u>ustrated Historical Atlas of the State of Iowa</u>. Since 1984 Vel Tyler, a 72 year old cabinet maker, has worked to help restore the home to its original form by using this picture and other collected data. The east and south porches had been

is trimmed with pine with natural finish wainscoting. The dining room, sitting room and living room have painted trim. All the rooms have wallpaper except for the upstairs servant's quarters. enclosed and extended with shed-like roofs. The north porch with its columns and deck had also been removed. The stone foundations were all in good repair and were used when replacing the porches to their original form. A flat roof dormer extended from the east roof of the servant's quarters. This was changed to a gable. The stained glass windows that had been on both sides and across the top of the north entrance were gone; however, broken parts were found and were copied for their replacement.

The north entrance is the main entrance. The road which had run west to a bridge over Indian Creek has been abandoned. The terrain of the yard clearly shows the old road pathway. The lone existing road now runs north-south and is east of the home. A driveway approach is being planned to facilitate the use of the formal north entrance.

The barn, privy fence and dirt mounds as shown in the Andreas illustration have been removed. The time of their demise is not known however the privy was still in use in the 1940s. The two stones with horse ties that are presently in the yard are not shown in the illustration. We are unable to determine when they were added. Large old pine and cedar trees are presently in the yard and may be the same as depicted in the illustration of the home in the 1875 Andreas Atlas.

The exterior wood was in good condition as were most of the windows. Replacement siding was required around one window and the one flat dormer changed to a gable. This was less than 10% of the total siding. Windows and doors were repaired or replaced to match the existing wood and design. One exterior NPS Form 10-800-6 (8-86)

door and 5 windows were replaced. Old glass was saved and used where possible. Two of the three chimneys had been removed to below the roof line.

The basement was expanded in 1980. The stone walls of the old basement were retained as well as all the peripheral founda tion. The excavation left a three foot concrete ledge so as not to disturb the original stone. Brick remains of a cistern were removed from the southwest corner of the basement.

A family room addition was added to the south of the house in 1991 to replace the summer kithen which is partially shown in the Andreas illustration. This was built to blend with the design of the original home. The wood trim and wainscoting are walnut milled from timber on the farm.

The Andreas illustration shows the east windows of the living room as being flush with the house. A bay window has been added in this area, apparently in the 1880s or early 1890s

The interior of the house had very little change from the original. A false ceiling was removed from the kitchen. A restaurant type booth was removed from the east wall of the kitchen. The floor of the kitchen was the only floor to be replaced. The remaining floors were sanded to smooth and remove paint.

Statement of Significance

The W. K. Wood home stands as a monument to Wood himself and to the early settlers of Iowa and Story County. The 130 year old house is solid and square on a foundation of stone. W. K. Wood purchased the original land from the government and remained at the same place until his death. He was a successful farmer and livestock producer, an entrepreneur and active politician. He, with his home meet the requirements for criteria B and C of the National Register.

The Honorable William Kennison Wood arrived in Southern Story County in 1851 with a sick wife and five dollars in his pocket. He remained at this location for 66 years until his death at 93 years in 1917. He became one of the largest and wealthiest landowners of the area. He voted in the organization of Story County in 1853 and became what was called the most representative citizen of the area. He built the most pretentious farm home of the county (W. O. Payne, History of Story County, pp410) in the mid 1860s. He was elected to the Iowa General Assembly in 1868 and 1870 for the 13th and 14th sessions. Local rumor states that his home was used as a stage coach stop and that President Lincoln had stayed overnight.

W. K. Wood was born in Ohio on April 19, 1828, moved to Indiana, then to northern Polk County near Cory Grove in 1849. His last move in 1851 was to a location just south of what was to become Iowa Center in Story County. He squatted on the land for two years until Story County was organized in 1853, and then participated in its organization. He purchased the land from the School Fund Commissioner of Story County in 1854.

W. K. Wood was known for his energy and industry and valued for his honesty and itegrity. It was his initiative the first saw National Park Service

and grist mill were built in Story County. They were located just east of Iowa Center and known as the Webb-Wood Mills. Iowa Center, at this time, was the second largest town in Story County and was being considered as a possible location for the State capital. The location of the railroad three miles south of Iowa Center, to what was to become Maxwell, led to the demise of this thriving community.

W. K. Wood became one of the largest land holders of Story County. He owned 1300 acres and was considered one of the wealthiest farmers. He was a well known pure bred livestock producer and dealer. His political career and agricultural affairs contributed to give him "popular acquaintance" with nearly every citizen in Story County. He served on several committees in the 13th and 14th Iowa General Assembly including the important Agricultural College and School Committees.

W. K. Wood had four wives. Three are buried together in the Iowa Center Cemetery. He had three children with the first wife. Two of these sons attended the Agricultural College and became prominent agents on the Chicago Livestock Exchange. He had one child each from the second and third wives. The fourth wife had a daughter from a previous marriage and survived Mr. Wood. She is buried in the Iowa Center Cemetery but in a separate location.

The W. K. Wood home appears in the 1875 A. T. Andreas' Historical Atlas of the State of Iowa. The time of construction was in the mid 1860s. The house is of Late Victorian Italianate design. It was one of the first two story homes to be built in Story County. The home, 130 plus years old, remains solid on a foundation of stone and retains its' original qualities.

Mr. Wood's fourth wife was deeded the home with part of the land on October 3,1901. Her daughter, Ida Thompson, subsequently inherited the farm. We became acquainted with Ida's daughter, Mildred Nelson, in 1956. She inherited the home and land in 1945. Mrs. Nelson's daughters, Mary Kirk and Margery Shaw inherited the land and home in 1967. Jo Anne Owen visited the home in 1956. Much of the original furniture was still in place. The home then became a rental property and Mrs. Nelson's furniture was sold at auction. Jo Anne and William J. Owen purchased the home and land, which now includes 160 acres, from Mary Kirk and Margery Shaw in 1980. These two ladies were great granddaughters of W. K. Wood's fourth wife.
