Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Okmulgee Library, completed in 1921, is a one-story detached building with flat roof and 2' parapet. It is finished with buff brick and light brown limestone. The brick is laid in Flemish bond courses and the limestone base has a smoothly cut, coursed finish. Decorative features also employ the light brown limestone. It is approximately 80' x 105' with two vertical divisions in the rear. The first is a 2' x 24' recessed portion immediately behind main portion and the second is a 4' x 75' recessed portion behind the first recess.

Fenestration in the facade includes six large <u>compound arch</u> windows set in round arch openings of limestone with scrolled keys. The north and south walls of main portion each have three large <u>compound</u> arch windows set in round arch openings of limestone with scrolled keys. The north and south walls of the recessed division each have three 8/8 sash windows.

Rear wall has eleven rectangular-shaped 1/1 sash windows with fixed pane transoms. These are located in the center. There is also in rear wall one 1/1 sash window near southwest corner and two 1/1 sash windows near northeast corner.

There is one rectangular-shaped exterior chimney stack near the northeast corner.

Facade has double metal-type doors with glass panes. There is one plain wood door in the southwest, corner and one plain wood door in concrete block addition to the northeast corner.

Several elements of the Georgian Revival style are employed. The focal point of the facade is a 4' x 20' projecting pavilion with large round arch opening with scrolled key. Corners of the projecting pavilion are accentuated with paired limestone pilasters of Corinthian detail. They are supported by two large limestone plinths. The projecting pavilion is slightly pedimented and features a modillioned cornice and a frieze with multiple moldings and an inscription reading "Okmulgee Public Library".

There are twelve large Rilladian-type windows in facade, east, and west walls. Each are set in round arch openings of limestone with scrolled keys. The windows are separated by paired limestone pilasters with Corinthian-type capitals. The facade, east, and west walls of the main portion of the building feature a modillioned cornice and frieze with multiple moldings. The parapet has molded limestone decoration.

The limestone base is approximately 3' high and is delineated from brick exterior by a molded limestone water table. There are two stoops. One is three-stepped and leads from street level to raised level of library grounds. The other is four-stepped and leads to main entrance.

Plain cornices are located in recessed divisions to the rear of main portion and a plain masonry belt course marks parapet in rear wall.

A small 15' x 15' concrete block addition was completed to the northeast corner of the building in 1981. It houses the heating and cooling system for the library.

The library sits on the southeast corner of Eighth and Okmulgee Streets. A large parking lot is located directly across the street and large open space areas are located to the southeast and south of the building. There is an apartment complex to the rear and a gas station to the north.

Although some windows and doors have been replaced, the architectural integrity has been preserved during the 62-year history of the building.

The Okmulgee Library is both historically and architecturally significant because: (1) it was the first city library in Oklahoma to be constructed with funds derived from a municipal bond issue and

(2) it is the best example of Georgian Revival design in Okmulgee County.

The Okmulgee Library Association was created on June 19, 1914 and the city of Okmulgee appointed the first library board. At this time the library was housed in the Creek Nation Council House in downtown Okmulgee. Shortly after the appointment of the library board, it made application to the Carnegie Foundation for funds to construct a new library. The Carnegie Foundation offered \$15,000, however, it was declined by the library board because of the small amount and plans were laid for a municipal bond election for library funding. The \$75,000 bond issue passed and construction of the new library was begun in 1917 on land donated to the city by two local families. Completed in 1921, the Okmulgee Library was the first city library in Oklahoma to be built with municipal bond funding.

The Okmulgee Library has several Georgian Revival characteristics including the projecting pavilion with minor pediment, large **compound** arche windows, Corinthian-like pilasters marking corners and divisions between windows, modillioned cornice, and frieze with multiple moldings. These features make it the best example of Georgian Revival architecture in Okmulgee County.
