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#### 7. DESCRIPTION

Situated on approximately one acre of land at the northwest corner of Eucutta Street and U.S. Highway 45, the Shubuta Baptist Church is a late Victorian vernacular Carpenter Gothic style build-The original section of the church was built in 1894 and is a cross-gabled building highlighted by a two-story bell tower at its southeast corner. In 1906 a rear gabled addition was made to the building to provide Sunday school rooms and a baptistry, and in 1914 a large two-story gabled addition sympathetic to the design of the church was made to the west elevation of the building to provide additional Sunday school rooms. The church rests on brick piers infilled with latticed brick skirting, and the walls are finished with clapboard and a wooden water table. The complex gable roof is trimmed by a plain raking cornice, and decorative sawn gable ornaments are in both the south and east gable peaks of the 1894 building. The roof of the tower is a steeply-pitched, pyramidal, bell-cast roof crowned by a metal finial and trimmed with a bracketed cornice. Due to deterioration of the sash, the original art glass windows were replaced in 1986 with new art glass windows of similar design; however, the building retains a high degree of integrity.

The main (south) facade is a four-bay elevation with three gables and a bell tower. Accessed by a flight of six steps, the main entrance is located at the west end in the bell tower and contains six-panel, double-leaf wooden doors crowned by a peaked art glass transom. Above the entrance is a large ventilator composed of two rectangular louvered panels topped by a peaked louvered panel. The bay to the west of the tower contains three double-hung art glass windows capped by a peaked transom, above which is an oculus, also filled with art glass. The other two bays of the south facade are located in the 1914 addition and contain an entrance of six-panel, double-leaf doors, above which is a peaked art glass window, and in the westernmost bay a pair of multi-light art glass windows topped by a four-part peaked window. The east elevation has eight bays, each containing double-hung, peaked, art glass windows, and in the gable is an oculus.

The interior of the church retains a good degree of integrity. The walls of the sanctuary are clad in vertical beaded board finished with molded chair rails and plain wide baseboards, and the ceiling is also clad in beaded board. Door and window openings

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feature molded surrounds, with the door surrounds having well-detailed corner and plinth blocks. A round arch supported by pilasters frames the entrance to the chancel. Although the pulpit furniture dates to 1951, the pews are original to the building. Four large wooden doors that roll up from the floor separate the sanctuary from a large classroom to the west. When additional space is needed in the sanctuary, these doors are rolled open. The Sunday school rooms also retain a high degree of integrity, having beaded board walls, three-panel glazed doors with scalloped molding beneath the glazing, molded trim with corner and plinth blocks, and art glass windows.

Located on the grounds, to the west of the church, is the U.C. Wells Annex, a one-story, front-gabled, three-by-five bay, brick-veneered educational building constructed in 1979. It does not contribute to the historic character of the church.

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### 8. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Shubuta Baptist Church is a locally significant example of vernacular Carpenter Gothic ecclesiastical architecture of the late Victorian period. It is one of only two Late Victorian Carpenter Gothic style buildings in Clarke County, the other being the Shubuta Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which was built in 1891. Shubuta Baptist Church was constructed in 1894 and is the second church building for the congregation, which was organized in November In 1906, due to increased membership, a rear gabled addition was made to the building to provide Sunday school rooms and a baptistry; prior to this addition, members were baptized in the Chickasawhay River, at Coopers well, and Shubuta Creek. In 1914 a large addition sympathetic to the design of the original church structure was made to the west side elevation to provide additional Sunday school space. This addition also allowed for the size of the sanctuary to be increased whenever necessary by simply rolling up the four large wooden doors that separate the sanctuary from a large classroom. Although the original art glass windows throughout the church have been replaced with new art glass windows, the building retains a high degree of integrity on both the exterior and interior.

The church displays such significant features as the two-story tower with bell-cast pyramidal roof crowned by a finial and trimmed with brackets, a gable ornament and oculus in each of the gables of the 1894 building, peaked openings, and interior features such as beaded board walls and ceilings, molded chair rails, molded surrounds with well-detailed corner and plinth blocks, and wooden rolling doors separating the sanctuary from the Sunday school addition.




### Verbal Boundary Description:


