

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Icehouse Historic District contains residences dating primarily between the 1900s and the 1930s but also includes an elementary school, an abandoned horse track, stable and riding ring, and remnants of Civil War fortifications (which does not contribute to the historic district, although additional archaeological research may determine it to be individually eligible). 213 contributing resources and 141 noncontributing resources are contained within the district. The boundaries extend east to west from the boundaries of the Old Town Historic District to the banks of the Valley Creek with Jeff Davis Avenue bordering on the north and Live Oak Cemetery and Dallas Avenue on the south. The streets are approximately 30 feet wide with the exception of Young Street which is only twenty feet.

The district contains tree-lined streets with sidewalks and curbs. Being situated along the banks of the Valley Creek, the district contains an abundance of natural southern flora such as magnolias, oaks, elms, fig trees, crepe myrtles and azaleas. The remnants of a pecan orchard, known as Rixey's Grove is still visible along the upper edges of the district and provides a number of established shade trees. The residences are uniformly situated on most lots, approximately twenty feet from the curb, providing a sense of unity and stability to the neighborhood. Alleys divide some blocks, providing for the location of garages and outbuildings in the rear of the property and there are very few vacant lots. This helps to ensure the overall sense of time and place of the district.

The residential buildings within the district illustrate interpretations of Tudor Revival, Craftsman, and Colonial Revival styles reflecting the wide range of class and taste of the area. A few structures possess elements of other revival styles with Spanish and Mediterranean influences. The earliest structures also reflect the vernacular T- and L-shaped cottages which were so popular in this area in the early 1900s. An integral part of this neighborhood is the numerous shotgun houses which are located along the perimeter of the district. These houses date from the early 1900s and are a classic example of a popular vernacular house form.

The majority of homes in the Icehouse Historic District are one-story, single family dwellings and still remain single family housing units. The building materials are primarily brick and wood. Several houses have stucco, weatherboard and brick veneer exteriors. Those houses constructed of wood usually contain large, front porches while the brick cottages usually have projecting gable stoops.

Overall, the Icehouse Historic District is a homogeneous neighborhood of frame and brick houses along tree-lined streets. The neighborhood is tightly knit and contains a mixture of low- and middle-income families.

CRITERION C (ARCHITECTURE/COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT)

Significant in the area of architecture, the Icehouse Historic District is characterized by a homogeneous neighborhood of small frame and brick houses as well as other resources associated with the area including an elementary school, the icehouse, an abandoned horse track, a stable and riding ring. Remnants of Civil War fortifications (which do not contribute to the district, although additional archaeological research may determine them to be individually eligible) are also contained within the district. Retaining their original integrity, many of the residential buildings illustrate vernacular interpretations of Tudor Revival, Craftsman, Colonial Revival, and Spanish and Mediterranean Revival styles that were prevalent during the 1920's and 1930's. The earliest buildings also reflect the vernacular T- and Lshaped cottages that were popular during the early 1900's. Named for the city ice house which is located in the northern edge of the district (on Jeff Davis Avenue), the Icehouse Historic District is also significant in the area of community planning because it reflects the continued growth and development of Selma during the early twentieth century. The period of significance for the district extends from the oldest building (1909) until 1939.

- 1. 429 Young Street. c. 1955. One-story dwelling with gable side roof, five bay facade and aluminum siding exterior wall treatment. The door is located in the first bay and the windows are 6/6 double hung sash. The second and fourth bays are paired windows. The shed roof entry porch has two decorative iron supports. The roof material is asbestos shingles and has an interior end chimney. (NC) #8-21
- 2. 428 Young Street. c. 1939. This two-story, Dutch Colonial Revival structure has a cross gambrel roof of asbestos shingles with an exterior end chimney. The exterior wall treatment is aluminum siding. The four bay facade has an arched door in the second bay while the first bay is an angled bay window in the gable projection. The sash is 6/6. A flat roof addition with sliding glass doors is located on the eastern (rear) facade. A garage is located on the property. (C) #8-22
- 3. 425 Young Street. c. 1960. One-and-a-half-story, gable side dwelling with asbestos shingled roof and an exterior end chimney. The exterior wall treatment is a mixture of brick veneer and aluminum siding. Three dormers are located on the front facade while the first floor has a four bay facade. The dormers have octagonal windows in the gables, over the regular 6/6 double hung sash windows. The first and third dormers are large and the third dormer extends out over the first floor projection. The door is centrally located off the recessed porch. The porch has two supports and connects the first and third bay projections. The fourth bay may have been an attached garage at one time. This house has a wooden fence and a pool. (NC) #8-23
- 4. 423 Young Street. c. 1935. This two-story, Colonial Revival structure has a gambrel side roof of asbestos shingles with an interior chimney. A gable side wing is attached to the North (side) facade and contains a first floor garage and two upper bays. The main block has a three bay shed roof central dormer. The three bay first floor facade has a central dorway and a full width attached shed roof porch with four Doric columns. The exterior wall treatment is brick and stucco and the windows are 3/1 double hung sash. (C) #8-24
- 5. 424 Young Street. c. 1942. One-and-a-half-story, traditional home has a gable side roof of asbestos shingles with two exterior end chimneys. The main block of the house has three, 2/2 double hung sash, dormer windows. One-story wings with casement windows are located on each end. The five bay facade has a centrally placed door with metal awning and 8/8 double hung sash windows. The house is covered with aluminum siding. Numerous outbuildings are located on the property. (NC) #8-25.

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- 6. 421 Young Street. c. 1935. This two-story, Colonial Revival structure has a cross gable roof with a clipped, front facing gable facade. The North (side) wing has a first floor garage and a two bay second floor facade. The roof material is asbestos shingles with an interior chimney. The first floor facade has three bays with a centrally placed door. The windows are 8/8 double hung sash. A full width, shed roof attached porch is supported with twelve columns in groups of three. The porch roof contains a central open gable extending over the entry. A vent with flanking single glass panes is located underneath the clipped gable. The exterior wall treatment is brick and stucco. (C) #8-26.
- 7. 420 Young Street. c. 1935. One-story brick dwelling with gable side roof composed of asphalt shingles with an interior end chimney. The four bay facade has an arched doorway located in a gable projection in the second bay and 6/6 double hung sash windows. A former side porch is located in the arched fourth bay and is now enclosed with plate glass. Two round dormer windows are located on either side of the entrance. A matching garage is located on the property. (C) #8-27
- 8. 419 Young Street. c. 1942. One-story, brick, Tudor Revival structure with gable side roof of asbestos shingles and an exterior front chimney. The three bay facade has a centrally placed door with an overhang in a sloping gable projection. The screened-in side porch is located in the first bay and has an arched support. Windows are 8/8 double hung sash. (NC) #8-28
- 9. 418 Young Street. c. 1935. One-story, brick, Tudor Revival structure with a low hip roof of asbestos shingles and an interior and exterior end chimney. The three bay facade has a centrally placed door and paired, 8/1 double hung sash windows in the first and third bays. A partial width, recessed, screened-in porch has an arched entrance with gable roof and one brick end support. The house has a matching garage. (C) #8-29
- 10. 417 Young Street. c. 1929. This one-story bungalow has a low hip roof of asbestos shingles with an interior and interior end chimneys. The doorway is centrally located on the three bay facade and has sidelights and a large overhang supported by heavy decorative brackets. The tripart windows are vertical 4/1 double hung sash windows. The central shed roof dormer contains a vent. A metal hipped roof ventilation duct crowns the hip roof line. The exterior wall treatment is plain weatherboard. (C) #8-30
- 11. 416 Young Street. c. 1935. One-story brick dwelling, low hip with cross gable roof of asbestos shingles and two interior chimneys. The door with sidelights is located in the second bay of the four bay facade and the windows are 8/8 double hung sash. A screened-in side porch is located in

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the fourth bay. An attached entry porch has a curved pediment and two classical supports. Brick window boxes are located under each window and a brick garage is located at the rear of the property. (C) #8-31

- 12. 415 Young Street. c. 1929. One-story bungalow with plain weatherboard exterior, asbestos shingled, gable front roof and an interior end chimney. The door is located in the second bay of the three bay facade and the paired windows are 4/1 double hung sash. The attached, gable front, partial width screened porch has two small wood columns on brick piers with a connecting brick balustrade. This dwelling has exposed rafters and brackets. An attached carport is located in the rear. (C) #8-32
- 13. 414 Young Street. c. 1948. One-story, gable side dwelling with asbestos shingled roof and asbestos shingle exterior. The door is centrally located in the three bay facade and the paired windows are 6/6 double hung sash. The recessed partial-width porch has four iron grillwork supports. (NC) #8-33
- 14. 413 Young Street. c. 1920. This bungalow has a one-story original section with a two-story rear addition now under construction. The gable front roof is composed of asbestos shingles with an interior chimney. The attached, partial width, gable front porch has been altered by enclosing the left side. The porch originally had two wooden end columns on low brick piers and a connecting brick balustrade. The door is located in the third bay of the four bay facade. Original paired windows are vertical 4/1, double hung sash. The two front facing gables have vents and brackets are located on the gable sides. The exterior wall treatment is plain weatherboard and aluminum siding. (C) #*-34.
- 15. 412 Young Street. c. 1935. This one-and-a-half-story, Tudor Revival house has a gable front roof of asbestos shingles with five dormer windows and an interior and interior front chimney. The exterior wall treatment is stucco. The attached sloping gable, partial width porch has been enclosed with plate glass. The original arched doorway porch entrance is enclosed with glass and contains a decorative planter. A window is located in the front gable and a garage is attached to the south (side) facade. The windows are 6/6 double hung sash and the centrally placed doorway has a multi-pane light. This house has awnings and decorative lintels. (C) #8-35
- 16. 411 Young Street. c. 1929. One-story, Tudor Revival brick cottage with cross gable, asbestos shingled roof and an interior and exterior front chimneys. The three bay facade has a centrally placed doorway with paired vertical 4/1 double hung sash windows. The doorway is located in a sloping gable projection connected with the front chimney. The chimney

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has a decorative white plater arch detail and a partial width, brick terrace fronts the structure. (C) #8-36

- 17. 410 Young Street. c. 1950. One-and-a-half-story, cross gable cottage covered in aluminum siding with asbestos shingled roof with an exterior end chimney. The attached partial width, shed roof porch has three iron supports. The three bay facade has a central doorway and windows with central panes of plate glass with flanking 2/2 double hung sash panes. The front and side gables contain a faux half-timbering effect. A carport is located in the rear of the property. (NC) #9-2
- 18. 409 Young Street. c. 1920. One-story, gable front brick double dwelling with asbestos shingled roof with two interior chimneys and a dominant centrally placed front chimney. The attached, gable front entry porches have screened arched openings and are two bays wide. The facade has a total of four bays with entrances occupying the second and third bays. The windows are 8/8 double hung sash. The entry porches are separated by the front chimney which contains a cone-shaped planter. (C) #9-3
- 19. 407 Young Street. c. 1913. One-story, plain weatherboard bungalow with gable side roof of asphalt shingles with an exterior end chimney. The five bay facade has a centrally placed door and 4/4 double hung sash windows. The attached, partial width, gable front porch has two square columns on brick piers and decorative brackets. (C) #9-4
- 20. 401 Young Street. c. 1920. One-story, plain weatherboard dwelling, gable side roof of asphalt shingles with an exterior front chimney. The roof has decorative brackets. The four bay facade has a door in the fourth bay and 6/6 double hung sash windows. The attached, gable roof entrance porch has two iron supports. The windows have metal awnings. (C) #9-5.
- 21. 400 Young Street. c. 1950. This house has been altered to face Young Street. It now has a gable front roof which slopes to the right. The three bay facade has an arched door in the third bay. The roof material is composed of asbestos shingles and the house is covered in aluminum siding. The chimney is on the exterior front and is positioned between the first two bays. The windows are 6/6 double hung sash. (NC) #9-6
- 22. 635 Young Street. c. 1929. One-and-a-half-story bungalow with plain weatherboard exterior wall treatment and asbestos shingled roof with two interior chimneys. The gable side roof contains one gable roof dormer and one shed roof dormer. The transomed door is located in the second bay of the two bay facade and the windows are 9/9 double hung sash. The attached, partial width, gable roof porch has two square end columns on brick piers with connecting brick balustrade. A side entrance is located on the north facade while a screened-in porch is located on the south side. (C) #9-7

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- 23. 700 Young Street. c. 1950. One-story dwelling with hip with cross gable roof. The exterior is covered with plain weatherboard while the roof is composed of asbestos shingles with an interior chimney. The six bay facade has a door located in the third bay and 6/6 double hung sash windows. The flat roof entry porch has one iron work support. (NC) #9-8
- 24. 703 Young Street. c. 1913. This two-story craftsman dwelling has a wood shingle exterior with an asbestos shingled, gable on hip roof with an interior and exterior end chimneys. The roof also contains a centrally located hip roof dormer with a band of 3 windows. The three bay facade has a doorway in the second bay and tripart and paired casement windows with 10 panes per sash. The attached entry width porch has an open gable roof and two plain wooden supports. (C) #9-9
- 25. 704 Young Street. c. 1918. One-and-a-half-story, gable front bungalow with pressed tin roof with decorative brackets and two interior chimneys. The exterior wall treatment is plain weatherboard. The facade has four bays with transomed entrances with sidelights in the second and fourth (recessed) bays. The windows are 40/1 double hung sash. The recessed porch wraps around the west and south facades, has four supports covered with weatherboard shingles. The supports are connected by wooden bannisters. Decorative gables are located on each side of the bungalow and the front gable has a window with flanking vents. (C) #9-10
- 26. 705 Young Street. c. 1939. One-and-a-half-story, brick Tudor Revival structure with gable front, asbestos shingled roof with interior and exterior end chimneys. The four bay facade has 1/1 double hung sash windows. The second bay however, has French doors. The doorway is located in the fourth bay of the five bay facade in a gable projection. The fifth bay is a porte cochere with large brick arches. The paired window in the front gable is 4/1 double hung sash. The chimney has clay pots and cloth awnings are located over the first and third bays. (C) #9-11
- 27. 712 Young Street. c. 1939. One-story, cross gable, brick Tudor Revival dwelling with asbestos shingles and an exterior end chimney. The three bay facade has a centrally placed door in a gable projection and 9/9 double hung sash windows. The original side porch has been enclosed with 6/6 windows and French doors. The gables show a half timbering effect and cloth awnings are placed over the windows and door projection. (C) #9-12
- 28. 715 Young Street. c. 1942. One-and-a-half-story bungalow with asbestos shingled roof and interior chimney. This dwelling appears to be one story but a wing on the North (side) facade reveals an open basement level garage. The two bay wing above has an open porch with two stucco supports and arts and crafts latticework detail. A side entrance is located off the end of the porch. The gable front main structure has a

two bay facade with paired, 6/1 double hung sash windows. The doorway is located in the first bay and has a full transom and sidelights. The full width attached gable front porch has three pairs of supports on a low brick balustrade. The supports are plain posts but have decorative woodwork between them. The exterior wall material is stucco. (NC) #9-13

- 29. 714 Young Street. c. 1942. One-story brick dwelling with hip with cross gable roof of asbestos shingles and two interior chimneys. The four bay facade has a door in the second bay and 6/6 double hung sash, tripart windows. The door has a pedimental arched overhang. (NC) #9-14
- 30. 721 Young Street. c. 1913. This two-story, Craftsman house has a stucco exterior and a cross gable roof of asbestos shingles. The three bay facade has a central doorway with transom and double hung sash windows with a 1/1 or multi-pane over one sash arrangement. The full width, one-story attached porch has a flat roof and two end piers. A bannister runs along the porch roofline connecting the end piers. A two-story angled bay is located on the south (side) facade. A flat roof stucco garage is located behind the property. (C) #9-15
- 31. 725 Young Street. c. 1942. Two-story bungalow with stucco exterior, clipped gable side roof of asbestos shingles with an interior chimney. The house appears to be one-story but its positioning on a hill allows for a full two-story structure. The four bay facade has a door placed in the third bay with multi-pane transom. The windows are 1/1 double hung sash. The first bay may have been an original porch but is now enclosed with casement windows. A carport is located on the first level. (NC) #9-16.
- 32. 726 Young Street. c. 1942. Two-story Georgian Revival brick structure with gable side roof of asbestos shingles and an interior chimney. The cornice is denticulated. The five bay facade has a centrally placed doorway in classical surround with a fanlight. The windows are 6/6 double hung sash with decorative shutters and sills. The side porch has a flat roof with eight supports and decorative iron grillwork on the top. A round window is located in the section connecting the house and the garage. (NC) #9-17
- 33. 801 Young Street. c. 1929. One-and-a-half-story bungalow with cross gable roof of asbestos shingles and an asbestos shingle and stucco wall exterior. There is an interior chimney. The four bay facade has a door with transom and side lights located in the third bay and 1/1 double hung sash windows. The partial width recessed porch has two square wooden supports and a metal awning over the entrance. A window is located in the front gable and the roofline has exposed rafters and brackets. (C) #9-18

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- 34. 802 Young Street. c. 1950. One-story dwelling with gable sides and asbestos shingled roof with an exterior front chimney. The house has replacement aluminum siding. The three bay facade has a central doorway and 6/6 double hung sash windows. An attached side porch has two iron supports. (NC) #9-19
- 35. 810 Young Street. c. 1929. This house has been stripped for renovation but renovation is no longer in progress. Only the shell of the house remains and the entry may be original. (NC) #9-20

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#### HISTORICAL SUMMARY

The Icehouse Historic District is part of the original lands purchased by the Selma Land Company in 1819. William Rufus King, a leading Alabama statesman and future Vice-President of the United States, was a principal organizer of the land company which bought large tracts of land at the present site of Selma. The company proceeded to draw plans, lay out streets, and designate lots in order to exhibit a plat of a new town and on December 4, 1820, the Alabama legislature passed an act incorporating the town of Selma. King named the town for one of the residences of Ossian, a blind poet of ancient Caladonia whose poems, first published in 1760, were extremely popular in the early part of the nineteenth century. Ossian composed "Songs of Selma" about 200 A.D. in hopes of soothing his anguish for the loss of his favorite son in battle. The word Selma is Greek and means seat or throne, appropriate for a city which soon became known as the "Queen City of the Black Belt."

Selma soon prospered as a commercial and transportation center. In 1827, the first newspaper, the "Selma Courier," began publication and in 1836 a charter was obtained from the legislature to construct the Selma and Tennessee Railroad. The Selma and Tennessee Railroad was under construction by 1847 and other railroads soon followed such as the Alabama and Mississippi, Alabama Central, Selma and Greensboro, and the Selma and New Orleans. These railroads invigorated the economy and made the town a major transportation and manufacturing center in Alabama. Planters were attracted to this area by the rich farmland of Alabama's Black Belt and the transportation network that allowed them to gin and ship their cotton downriver and on to Mobile.

On Nov. 4th, 1834, William Rufus King and George Phillips, another charter member of the Selma Land Company, sold a tract of land including portions of the Icehouse District to Joseph Pickens, a prominent Dallas Countian. In 1836, Edward L. Jones from Onslow County, North Carolina, acquired the property from Pickens and developed the area into a working plantation. Edward Jones was a prosperous planter who owned property throughout Dallas, Clark, and Marengo Counties in Alabama as well as plantations in his native North Carolina. Jones settled on his plantation in Dallas County along the Valley Creek, just outside the city limits of Selma. Unfortunately, Edward Jones and his only son, Richard S. Jones died within months of each other in 1858, leaving as the sole heirs of the entire estate, Richard's two small children, Sallie Ann and Drury Fair Jones. The estate was held in trust for the minor children by a series of guardians, including their mother Martha Rebecca Jones Rixey.

The Jones' Valley Creek Plantation was an important site for Selma during the War Between the States. In 1862, Selma was selected as the location for the Confederate naval foundry, rolling mills, and weapons manufacturing facili-

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ties. Selma's existing foundries and manufacturing plants and its close proximity to needed raw materials made it a strategic military operation. The Confederate arsenal and foundry soon shipped cannon, weapons and supplies throughout the Confederacy and constructed the first iron-clad warships which were soon to take part in the Battle of Mobile Bay. Selma experienced a wartime boom and many new streets were opened up on the east side of town. Fortifications were constructed and consisted of a ring of earthwork trenches and breastworks around the city. Many of the western fortifications were placed on the high ground above the Valley Creek on part the Jones Estate. The Battle of Selma devastated the city with the destruction of over 150 homes and the entire Confederate Arsenal, Foundry and Iron Works. In 1877, the city purchased from the Jones Estate, fifteen acres of land for a new cemetery which was to contain a lot for a Confederate Memorial. Live Oak Cemetery was formed and today, this beautiful and historic cemetery forms the southern boundary for the Icehouse Historic District.

Selma recovered after the War Between the States. In 1866, Selma became the county seat of Dallas County and many of the prominent citizens of Cahaba, the former county seat and state capitol of Alabama seat shipped their homes up river to Selma. The late 1800s saw the reemergence of Dallas County as the leading cotton county in Alabama and at Selma, the first non-railroad bridge across the Alabama River was opened in 1885. The city's political power reached its peak in the 1890s with the election of General Edmund Pettus and John Tyler Morgan to the U.S. Senate and in 1892, both the Speaker of the Alabama House and President of the Alabama Senate were citizens of Selma. With the establishment of Knox Academy and Selma University, Selma became a center for Black education and between 1890 and 1907, five new hospitals were constructed, making the city a medical center for West Central Alabama. The late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries were prosperous times for Selma and with the rise in population and in the economy, Selma needed room to grow.

With the death of her brother in 1878, Sallie Ann Jones became the only surviving heir to the Jones Estate and in the 1890s, she and her husband C.N. Featherston began efforts to develop that portion of the estate east of the Valley Creek. The Featherstons engaged the services of Julian Smith, County Surveyor, to partition the outlots or blocks into individual lots. The Icehouse Historic District was developed from a survey conducted by Smith for the Featherston family in 1890. The survey is listed in the Dallas County Map Book as "Map of the Jones Addition, Northwest Selma."

The division of lots contains the land bordered by the Old Town Historic District (NR) on the east and the Valley Creek on the west and by Jeff Davis Avenue on the north and Dallas Avenue on the South. The streets which run east-west are Gary, Montgomery, McCleod, Furniss, and Parkman Streets and

Abbot, Dallas, and Parkman Avenues. The north-south streets are Young, King, Pettus, Lapsley, and Union Streets and Ickerman, Howard, and King's Alley. When the survey was first completed the majority of streets had different names. Jeff Davis was known as North Avenue and the other east-west streets were numbered as they progressed south. Therefore, Gary, Montgomery, McCLeod, and Furniss Streets were known as Fifth, Fourth, Third, and Second respectively. Young Street was named Bluff street for its position on the banks of the Valley Creek and Jones Avenue was later changed to King Street.

This section of land was the site of the original Confederate Fortifications during the War Between the States. The extremities of this district have also been heavily populated Black neighborhoods. This is still the case today along the northern boundaries along Jeff Davis, Gary, and King Streets and Union Alley. The southern boundaries along Dallas Avenue on the site of the Valley Creek Homes was also a historically black neighborhood and this particular area continued along Parkman Street, encompassing Ickerman's Alley and Abbot Avenue. A horse riding stable and arena and a large pecan grove which was known as Rixey's Grove were also located along the banks of the Valley Creek. Martha Rixey was Sallie Jones Featherston's mother and Mrs. Rixey managed the estate after her daughter's marriage and relocation to Georgia. The county jail was constructed on Pettus Street in 1867 and the grove behind the jail was used for a number of hangings in the late 1800s. This particular jail has been demolished. Also located in the Icehouse District is the Byrd School, a Beaux-Arts style building constructed in 1919 and located on the site of the home of William Byrd, a prominent attorney and judge for Dallas County in the last half of the 1800s.

The name for the Icehouse District comes from the city ice house which is located in the northern edge of the district on Jeff Davis Avenue. This business is a continuation of the ice business first begun in Selma around 1840. Ice was first brought to Selma in that year by Constance Dominic. Later, in 1851, F.S. Jackson built a brick building on the river bank between Lauderdale and Church Streets and filled it with three barge loads full of ice. The Enterprise Ice Company was organized in 1877 to make ice by steam. This business was very successful and shipped ice throughout Alabama and Mississippi.

By late 1890, the first lots were offered for sale but the construction of homes did not begin in this area until after 1900. The blocks were divided into fourteen lots each, with 60 ft. frontage. The streets were 30 ft. wide with the exception of Young Street which has a width of 20 ft. The depth of the lots differed but generally are 128 ft. The seven and eight hundred blocks of King and Pettus and the six hundred block of Pettus contain bisecting service roads which allowed for the construction of garages and outbuildings

in the rear of the property. This technique was also used in the later addition of the Riverview Historic District. The older homes were constructed in the seven and eight hundred blocks of King and Pettus, the six hundred block of Lapsley and the eight hundred block of Union. The first builders of the homes were professionals and they constructed large, one- and two-story brick and frame houses. While a few of these houses are typical of the popular T- and L-shaped cottages, the majority of the earlier houses reflect the growing popularity and influence of the Craftsman and Revival architectural styles.

The greatest period of growth for the Icehouse area was in the 1920s and 30s. Middle- and working-class families moved into the area and began to construct single family dwellings. A large number of Craftsman and Colonial Revival homes were built in the six hundred blocks of Pettus and King Street and the six and seven hundred block of Young. Nevertheless, a great majority of homes in this Icehouse District are of the Tudor Revival style. Fine examples of this style were constructed along the four and five hundred blocks of Young and King Streets with an outstanding Tudor Revival house located at 700 King Street. Also illustrating an emergence of different architectural styles in Selma are 815 King Street and 412 Pettus Street which reflect Spanish and Mediterranean influences.

Two vernacular architectural styles which are evident in the Icehouse District are the shotgun and the double tenant house. A number of these houses are located in the historically Black neighborhoods along Parkman, Jeff Davis, Howard and Ickerman's Alley, and north King. Two noteworthy examples of the double tenant houses are 830 and 826 Lapsley and a number of classic shotgun houses are located in the three hundred block of Abbott Avenue.

The West End Land Company purchased most of the Icehouse District from the Featherstons in 1906. The West End Land Company was formed as a mortgage and building association specifically to develop this particular section of Selma. The president of the company was Albert Meyer, a developer and member of a prominent Selma family. F.M. Abbott, a local attorney and a major land and real estate developer of the Riverview District, also purchased lots in this area and offered land and home mortgages.

Overall, the Icehouse Historic District is characterized by a dense and homogeneous neighborhood of small frame and brick houses along tree-lined streets with well tended lots. The neighborhood is tightly knit and contains a mixture of low income, middle-class and upper-income families. The residences are primarily early twentieth-century frame and brick residences of Tudor Revival, Colonial Revival, Craftsman, and Ranch styles.
