

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Ah Toy Garden is one of three Chinese terraced gardens on China Mountain in the Warren Mining District of central Idaho. The site covers an area of approximately 3 acres, and consists of several garden terraces, one semi-subterranean habitation, three rock cairns, one trash midden, portions of an irrigation ditch, a tree with wooden dowels embedded in it, and remnants of a Chinese trail. The dugout has been excavated, stabilized, and reconstructed as part of an interpretive program planned by the Payette National Forest. The Ah Toy Garden possesses the qualities of location, setting, design, workmanship, materials, feeling, and association required to achieve National Register listing. The reconstructed dugout qualifies under Criteria Consideration E for National Register status.

The Ah Toy Garden site is the most complex of the three Chinese terraced gardens on China Mountain. It is also the most remote and many of its historical attributes are intact. The Ah Toy Garden is located on a southeast facing slope north of China Creek and above the South Fork of the Salmon River. It is situated approximately 10.5 miles from the mining town of Warren, where a large Chinese population flourished in the latter half of the 19th century. Contemporary sources place the last Chinese occupant on the Ah Toy site in 1910. Excavation of the dugout recovered datable artifacts which place the period of occupation between the late 1880's and 1920. This corresponds with the chronological period determined significant for properties eligible in this National Register Multiple Property Documentation submission.

The Ah Toy Garden is located in a setting of Ponderosa pine and Douglas fir. The tilled garden terraces have encouraged new forest growth. Ponderosa pines are encroaching onto the cultivated terraces. Increment bores were taken from several trees and date the pines as 60 -70 years old. A natural spring is located below the dugout habitation and the site looks southeast toward the South Fork of the Salmon River. Grapevines grow over a rock cairn, and rhubarb still grows near the dugout, remnants of fruit that was once cultivated on the site. Historic sources say the Ah Toy Garden produced vegetables, strawberries, grapes and rhubarb for commercial sale as late as 1910.

The Ah Toy garden site contains over 21 discernable earth terraces on a 30% slope. Portions of an irrigation ditch are visible within the

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Ah Toy Garden is significant under Criterion A, as part of the history of overseas Chinese on the Idaho mining frontier. This site is also significant under Criterion D, as a partially excavated site which has yielded information about the historic occupation of the Ah Toy The reconstructed dugout meets eligibilty requirements under The Ah Toy Garden is part of a complex of Criteria Consideration E. Chinese sites on the Warren Mining District from 1870 to 1920. Toy Garden represents the successful adaptation of traditional Chinese agricultural technology to the terrain of the Salmon River Mountains of This site also represents efforts of the 19th century Chinese immigrants to maintain their ethnic identity and lifeways while engaging in a commercially profitable enterprise. The Ah Toy Garden possesses qualities of location, design, setting, workmanship, materials, feeling, and association neccessary for properties of this type to meet National Register standards.

The Ah Toy Garden is significant to the history of Chinese immigrant communities in Idaho and the American west. The Ah Toy Garden site is significant for its location, landscape, and association with the Chinese community of the Warren Mining District. The Ah Toy Garden reflects significant elements of design, setting, and workmanship that are evidenced in the spatial relationship of the dugout to the physical features of the site. The central placement of the dugout, the siting of the dugout above the spring, the location of placer equipment near the irrigation ditches, and the midden immediately outside the dugout entrance contribute to the integrity of location, setting and design. These elements may also yield information about the relationship between Chinese occupants and their physical environment.

The excavated area was limited to a very small portion of the site, and clarified the sites' eligibility for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places. The dugout habitation has been stabilized

terraced areas. Remnants of a Chinese pack trail known as the Old China Trail are evident within the site boundaries. Three rock cairns exist which are composed of quartz native to the site. These cairns may represent clearing rocks for terrace construction, or may reflect placer mining activites on the site. The irrigation system may have served a dual purpose - to irrigate terraces and provide water to mine surface deposits of placer gold. Gold panning equipment was located on the site.

A large Ponderosa pine up slope from the dugout habitation has four wooden dowels placed horizontally in the base of the tree, two feet above the ground. These dowels may have formed part of a water gate for the irrigation system.

The earthen and rock habitation of Ah Toy was excavated in 1988 as part of a long range cultural resource management plan by the Payette National Forest. The dugout is a semi-subterranean dwelling located near the center of the site. It is a slightly uneven, square structure situated in a slope. The south wall of the dugout is built against one of the large rock cairns. The partially intact walls were uncoursed quartz cobbles mortared with mud. These walls may have been constructed using rocks from the cairns. The doorway of the dugout faces southeast, overlooking terraces downslope and a large linear cairn. A milled lumber threshold was found in situ with hinge and latch hardware nearby. evidence of a hearth, window, or chimney was located. Remnants of wood indicate a log superstructure covered with sod formed the roof. Artifacts recovered from inside the dugout include metal hoe blades, opium pipe fragments, a modified opium tin, Chinese ceramic fragments, and metal utensils. A local collector removed many complete Chinese ceramic vessels during the 1940's. These artifacts are in a private collection.

A trash midden was located immediately outside the door of the dugout and extends on to a linear cairn to the south. Many artifacts of domestic and Chinese association were noted on the surface near this cairn.

The dugout habitation of Ah Toy was reconstructed in 1988 after excavation and evaluation. The reconstuction involved rebuilding the uncoursed rock walls to reach the surrounding ground surface. Mud was used to mortar the quartz cobbles and was placed behind the walls to support them, without detracting from visual integrity.


A roof was built using ax felled Ponderosa pine from the immediate area outside the site boundary. A layer of pine boughs and forest duff was laid atop these logs and the whole was covered with earth from on site. These construction techniques were determined appropriate and consistent with original construction. The reconstruction was undertaken after consultation with the Idaho State Preservation Office.

and partially reconstructed in its exact historic location and is consistent with original design, workmanship and materials. The reconstruction of the dugout was undertaken to preserve and stabilize the remaining structure, and to enhance the sites' potential for interpretive purposes. The carefully researched and implemented reconstruction adds considerably to qualities of feeling, setting and location. The reconstruction has added appreciable visual impact and focus to the property.

The excavation and reconstruction of the Ah Toy dugout is part of a broad long range plan to preserve and develop significant sites on the Payette National Forest for academic research and interpretive exhibit. This site and other Chinese sites in the Warren Mining District from 1870 to 1920 serve to show elements of material culture and lifeways from a distinct ethnic group who contributed to the development of the area.
