Big Elk Guard Station

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Description

Setting

The Big Elk Guard Station is located in the NE ¼ of the NW ¼ of Section 16, Township 37 South, Range 4 East, W.M., on the Ashland Ranger District of the Rogue River National Forest. The site, at about 4,700 feet in elevation above sea level, is situated on the southwestern margin of Big Elk Prairie and is reached by an access spur from FS Road #3706 (Big Elk Road), which passes a short distance west of the compound in a north-to-south direction. Big Elk Prairie, a former lake basin that still supports a shallow depth of water each year from March to June, is located at the western edge of the Brown Mountain Lava Flow, a relatively recent (approximately 20,000 to 30,000 years old) geologic feature. The administrative site is underlain by the Plio-Pleistocene basalt flows of the High Cascades. The vegetation is characteristic of a true fir forest community, with old-growth Shasta red fir, white fir, and Douglas-fir, and a fairly dense growth of lodgepole pine adjacent to the meadow. The meadow supports grassy perennials, scattered scrub-form serviceberry, and blue camas.

Structural Description:

Constructed in 1929, the Big Elk Guard Station Cabin, the major component of the complex, is a rectangular, one and one-half story building that measures 18'4" wide by 22' long and rests on a mortared basalt rubble foundation with a grout coating and several ventilation openings. The cabin has a steeply pitched gable roof with wood shingles and exposed pole-rafter ends and measures approximately 11'6" from the top of the corner of the cabin at the eaves to the top of foundation. The exterior walls (to the eave line of the roof) are composed of peeled lodgepole logs that are square-notched at the corners and chinked with mortar. Gable ends are covered with wood shingles. Fenestration is composed of six-light, single and double casement windows. There are two entrances: one near the northwest corner in the west wall, and another with a gable-roofed, portico porch, near the southeast corner in south wall. The structure is painted a dark red-brown.

The interior of the Big Elk cabin contains a main room/office and a kitchen on the ground floor, and two upper-story bunkrooms that are reached by a double landing stairway. Horizontal boards cover the interior walls and are painted white in order to maximize interior light. Original fir flooring remains intact. Five-panel doors are mounted throughout; window and door trim is plain. Light and cooking/refrigerating

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fixtures are propane-powered. In the main room, a mortared-rock fireplace with a grout-covered chimney against the exterior of the north wall provides heat.

A Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC)-built Garage/Storage Shed, erected ca. 1938, lies about 50' east of the cabin. This rectangular, single-story building measures approximately 18' x 16' feet in plan and approximately 8' 6" feet from the top of the corner boards at the eaves to the ground. The building has a medium-pitch gable roof with wood shingles and exposed rafter ends. The exterior walls are composed of horizontal "double-run molding" shiplap siding that covers horizontal boards over a milled lumber frame. A vehicle entrance with double leaf swinging doors and a four-light window are located in the north elevation. The structure has no foundation; the western two-thirds of the structure has an earth floor and the east third, separated by an interior partition and accessible by two swinging doors in the west wall, has a wooden floor. The building is used for miscellaneous storage.

A gas-and-oil storage shed (constructed ca. 1935 and probably moved to the Big Elk site at a later date) is located approximately 100 feet north of the Big Elk Guard Station Cabin. The small, wood-frame structure measures 8'4" x 5'4" in plan and rests on a raised wooden platform about two feet high. A small deck, measuring 5'6" x 5', extends in front of the double-leaf plank doors at the south elevation. The shed's gable roof is wood-shingled; the walls are sheathed in horizontal wood siding. A standard vault privy, approximately 4'x 4' in plan, and constructed of 2"x 4" and 4"x 4" dimensional lumber, is located about 150 south of the cabin, out of sight of the primary structures.

The Big Elk Guard Station Cabin retains substantial integrity. Modifications have been few. The chimney has been mortared over, and the roof, probably covered originally with sugar pine shakes, now has cedar shingle roof. The structure has benefited from appropriate rehabilitation in recent years. On the west façade, decayed logs have been replaced to a height of three logs high. The sill log on the south side between the door and the southwest corner has been replaced, as have a few selected decayed logs (or portions of them) in various other locations. The original gabled portico over the entrance on the south side has been replaced within the last ten years. The shed-roofed overhang on the west elevation has replaced a smaller projection. The increase in size of the overhang was accomplished to more effectively shed snow from the porch (LaLande, August 2, 1999). The associated garage also retains substantial integrity.

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Big Elk Guard Station

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Significance

The Big Elk Guard Station, with its central building erected in 1929 as a seasonal administrative headquarters on the Ashland Ranger District of the Rogue River National Forest, has previously been determined eligible to the National Register of Historic Places. The Guard Station is significant for its association with the agency's administrative development, particularly in the area of the Forest south of Fish Lake. Submitted as part of a multiple property submission, "U.S. Forest Service Historic Structures on the Rogue River National Forest, Oregon," the Big Elk Guard Station represents its associated historic context, "Early Forest Service Administrative and Natural Resource Management on the Rogue River National Forest, 1907 to 1932." The cabin meets the registration requirements outlined for "rustic"-style agency structures in the registration document. With its major component constructed in 1929, it was established during the historic period. The Guard Station retains its integrity of setting, design, and materials, and it evokes direct historic associations with its historic context. The building is eligible to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A as an important, tangible representative of early Forest administrative activities in southwest Oregon. The oldest administrative site built within the Rogue River National Forest, the Big Elk Guard Station is now the oldest one in continuous use (LaLande, August 2, 1999).

Additionally eligible to the National Register under Criterion C as an excellent representative of early "rustic"-style Rogue River National Forest administrative buildings, the Big Elk Guard Station cabin employs native materials and was constructed by Forest Service personnel before the agency developed standardized plans for its buildings. The Guard Station exemplifies projects undertaken by the Forest prior to 1933 and the arrival of the CCC in the area. As historian Gail Throop explains:

Prior to the Depression, the Forest Service building program was limited. Buildings were erected when and where they were needed, with little advance planning and minimal consideration of future needs or expansion of facilities (Throop 1979: 28-29)

The Big Elk Cabin represents one of three remaining examples of Forest Service log construction within the Rogue River National Forest. Willow Prairie Cabin, located a relatively short distance north of the Big Elk Guard Station is in good condition. The other, Fir Glade Guard Station, is totally collapsed and deteriorated. The Big Elk Guard

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Station cabin is among the five oldest Forest Service structures on the National Forest. The Big Elk site as a whole, has local significance due to its early and continuous association with Forest Service activities in the southern Cascade Range.

History

The Big Elk Prairie was included in the original Cascade Forest Reserve of 1893. The area (reorganized as Crater [now Rogue River] National Forest) came under Forest Service jurisdiction in 1906, and in the following year a 95-acre administrative site was withdrawn from mineral and homestead entry (Rogue River National Forest: Item L-9).

In October 1907, Forest Service employees Delbert Myers (foreman), Fred Stanley, Samuel Dorran, and John D. Holst erected a log cabin composed of two peeled-lodgepole log "pens, separated by a central open breezeway, under a single gable roof, at Big Elk Prairie. This "Ranger Station" was the first Forest Service structure to be built within the National Forest (Holst 1951:1).

During the 1920s, a pole barn was added to the site in order to store hay and tack gear for Forest Service horses and pack-string mules. In 1929, the Forest Service abandoned (and later destroyed) the original Big Elk cabin that had proved inadequate for the Ranger District's needs, and built the present Big Elk Guard Station cabin. The CCC built the present garage building about 1938. The barn, which suffered serious damage from a windfall tree, was removed from the site about 1950. A small gas-and-oil shed (probably of CCC construction), and a wooden privy comprise the remaining features within the rectangular, fenced enclosure of the Big Elk compound.

Big Elk Guard Station served for several decades as a summer-use guard station. Although the Cabin has not been "permanently" occupied for about five years, the site remains a seasonal-use administrative/residential compound. Big Elk Guard Station is the oldest continuously used administrative site within the Rogue River National Forest. Although the construction of major new highways and forest roads had lessened the Forest Service's dependence on the site, it continued to serve an important function in housing Ashland Ranger District seasonal fire crews.

Boundary Description:

The Big Elk Guard Station is situated on National Forest land in the NE ¼ of the NW ¼ of Section 16, Township 37 South, Range 4 East, WM, in Jackson County, Oregon. The property is identified on USGS map Brown Mountain Quadrangle, 7.5 minute series, included with this nomination. The nominated parcel is more particularly described as beginning at a point 58 feet due west of the southwest corner of the cabin; then proceeding 150 feet to the southeast along the fence line; thence northeast along the fence line 170 feet more or less; thence 270 feet northwest; thence 150 feet southwest; thence 120 feet south east to the place of beginning, encompassing one acre, more or less.

Boundary Justification:

The nominated area of one acre, more or less, includes the Big Elk Guard Station cabin, garage, and gas-and-oil house. This boundary encompasses the primary discrete and identifiable location where the guard station administrative activities took place.




