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Situated in the middle of a block and surrounded by hedges and trees, the Otto L. Uhlig House is a one-and-one-half story wood frame bungalow with a common bond brick masonry veneer. The low rectangular building rises from a stone foundation. It is capped by a broad gable roof covered with asphalt shingles. Rafter ends are exposed. Three chimneys rise from the roofline. A shed-roof dormer projects from the roof on the west axial facade. Gables and the dormer are clad with wood shingles. The south (front) gable end facade is shaded by an open porch with a shed roof supported by simple tapered square wood columns resting on brick piers. Fenestration is symmetrical. Front facade windows are multiple light units from the Craftsman tradition. A bay window projects from the center of the east axial facade. The interior is relatively unaltered from its original appearance featuring a gas fireplace in the living room, fir window and door trim, and Craftsman-influenced light fixtures.

Located a few yards north of the house are a modern two-car garage and a small storage shed (both noncontributing).

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Under Criterion C of the National Register Criteria, the Otto L. Uhlig House is significant in the area of architecture, because it is a good example of early 20th Century bungalows in Spearfish, South Dakota. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan, the nominated property relates to the following historic context: V. Depression and Rebuilding, A. 3. Changing Urban Patterns/Residential Changes.

Shortly after the turn of the century, west coast American architects Henry and Charles Greene developed a new style for domestic designs eventually labeled "bungalow". Pure examples are low one story dwellings featuring broad gables on the street facade, overhanging eaves, and open entry porches. Also a product of the ongoing Craftsman movement there is an emphasis on rustication and finely crafted windows and doors. Floor plans are often symmetrical but lack any formal entrance foyer. Interior components frequently include handcrafted light fixtures, fireplaces, exposed ceiling joists, and built-in shelving. The Uhlig House is a very simple version of Bungalow styling, yet it displays some of the most characteristic elements of the style including especially a broad gable facing the street, exposed rafter ends, and Craftsman windows and fixtures.

Spearfish, located on the eastern rim of the Black Hills, was founded in 1876 in response to the emerging gold rush. It quickly grew into a vital service community for area miners and ranchers. In the mid-1880s, the city became the home of Black Hills Normal School, now known as Black Hill State College. Otto L. Uhlig was a pharmacist in Spearfish and the son of Otto Uhlig, Sr., who had been a visible promoter of a new community, which eventually became Uhlig Addition to Spearfish, in the 1890s. The younger Uhlig had this house built in 1922 shortly after receiving the parcel of land it occupies from his mother.

The period of significance of the nominated property does not extend beyond its date of construction in 1922.
