DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Wakarusa Hotel building is a simple two story rectangular limestone structure with gable roof and basement. The front gable structure faces west on the town's main street.

Vertically proportioned window openings with plain stone sills and lintels are arranged symmetrically on all facades, two in each story of the west and east facades, three in each story of the south facade, four in each story of the north facade.

Doors occur in the center of the first story of the west facade and toward the east of the south facade. A small one-story frame porch with shed roof shelters the south entrance.

In the center of each gable near the peak is an arched opening with simple stone trim. The roof trim consists of a simple boxed cornice treatment.

The west wall is laid up with rough faced, regularly coursed, cut stone. The other walls are treated similarly, though on these subsidiary facades the variation in the size and shape of the stones is greater, causing the appearance of rubble wall construction.

The following alterations have occurred:

- (1) Two historical alterations--a two-story addition to the north and a one-story addition to the east--have been removed, although as a result of these additions three of the original window openings on the north and one of the original window openings on the west were enlarged to accommodate connecting doorways.
- (2) The original one-story frame porch on the west facade has been removed.
- (3) A yellow wash has been applied to the exterior where the walls were not covered by additions. The poor quality of the stonework seems to have been the reason for applying this protective skin on the exposed wall surfaces.
- (4) The roof has been reshingled over the years and the superstructure of one chimney removed.

SPECIFIC DATES

The Wakarusa Hotel was the first business beside the railroad station to be established in Wakarusa. The oldest surviving structure in town, it remains today as a noteworthy reminder of Wakarusa's early history and evidences the character of the early businesses that developed in the small Kansas communities that grew up along railroad routes and became important sources of services for rural populations.

BUILDER/ARCHITECT

The town of Wakarusa, located some 12 miles south of Topeka, was platted in 1858. It served as the center for a small farming community and was located as a station on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad line.

W.H. Mills came to Kansas in 1869 from Illinois. By 1873 he was the proprietor of the Wakarusa Hotel, a modest two story stone structure with twelve rooms which he is reported to have built himself. In 1883, the A.T. Andreas <u>History of the State of Kansas</u> reported that W.H. Mills was not only associated with a hotel business, but also ran a livery business, a grain trade and a store. This latter enterprise was housed in a structure adjoining the hotel to the north. The Andreas entry states that the store "has a good railroad trade and is fast running into a good county trade located on the road from Topeka to Carbondale, about twelve miles from Topeka and six miles from Carbondale north and south, and from twelve to fifteen miles from any other store east and west. His hotel is also flourishing, being constantly full and largely transient."

Mills died in 1903, but in the <u>Kansas Gazeteer and Business Directory of 1912</u>, the Wakarusa Hotel was still listed as a functioning enterprise. It is not known how long the hotel continued to operate or what all the other uses were to which the building may have been put. It apparently was used as a residence for many years. The current owner intends to rehabilitate the structure and use it both for a residence and a small business.


