<p>The Pine Island City Hall and Fire Station is located on the northwest corner of Main Street and Third Street SW in Pine Island City.</p> <p>The Pine Island City Hall and Fire Station is a two-story, orange-yellow brick building measuring 40 by 60 feet. Its facade is four bays wide, with large, round-arched double doors on each end of the ground floor, framing a pair of high, square windows with massive, rusticated stone lintels (these windows have since been filled in with signs listing the municipal offices in the building). The second floor facade contains four tall, narrow double sash with transom windows (whose transoms have since been filled in), with rusticated stone sills and decorative dark brick borders along their tops. Significance:		Status:
<p>The Pine Island City Hall and Fire Station is significant as an example of the type of municipal architecture that flourished in southeastern Minnesota towns in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.</p> <p>As successful manufacturing and commercial hamlets expanded into full-fledged towns, their need for municipal services grew apace. Everywhere, governing councils, volunteer fire departments, and police forces appeared to meet their communities' basic requirements. At first, these public services tended to be housed haphazardly, with small fire stations, meeting halls, and jails scattered around town. However, by the beginning of the 20th century, there was a move to integrate these functions in single large buildings.</p> <p>Such a course was followed by the village of Pine Island in 1909 when it built the City Hall and Fire Station.
