

7. Description

The Wells Fargo Depot is 50X140 feet is size, has beamed roof construction, is one story in height with a two-story area on the front facade once used as a hayloft. The building is red brick construction with a stepped parapet. Under each step is an enlarged brick dentil. Above each dentil are two courses of corbeled brick with a brick cap topping each. Walls are 16 inches thick of coursed brick.

The alterations to this significant structure are minor. When horses were no longer used in the company's business, the stall windows were filled in with brick. Also, the opening to the hayloft (center of front facade) was likewise enclosed. The alteration is, as stated above, minor, and the building can be returned to its original appearance.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Wells Fargo and Company Livery Stable is significant in the history of Oklahoma City for its role in the area of transportation. Oklahoma City was a rapidly growing territorial town in 1906 (and soon to be the State capitol) and benefited greatly from the services of the famous freight company.

Frontier communities experienced the common problem of isolation, and there were many efforts to provide better communication and transportation links from the settled regions of the country to them and between the developing towns and cities. Wells Fargo and Company was the most famous of the enterprises devoted to this end. After merging in 1867 with Ben Holiday's Butterfield Overland Company, Wells Fargo and Company controlled all traffic in the west and served as the main feeder to railroad lines well into the twentieth century.

In 1894 Congress granted land, once part of a military reserve, to Oklahoma City, and it was officially dedicated for use as a public school site, park lands, and public streets and alleys. After several transactions, two of the lots were sold to Wells Fargo and Company on November 15, 1905. Oklahoma Statehood was only two years away, and the territorial city was experiencing a tremendous boom in the late territorial years. Wells Fargo and Company constructed the Wells Fargo and Company Livery Stable in 1906. It served the firm as office, wamhouse, and stable. A railroad spur ran parallel to the rear of the property making the location ideal for transfer of freight. Passengers, freight, and mail were carried by Wells Fargo and Company. The famous company provided an important transportation link for citizens of the Oklahoma City area with the rest of the State and country.

The Wells Fargo and Company Livery Stable was utilized by that firm until 1917 when the company discontinued its overland express service. The property was deeded to American Railway Express in 1918 and then to Railway Express Agency, Inc. in 1919.

Rehabilitation of this significant structure is planned under the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981. Plans are being developed to make the Wells Fargo and Company Livery Stable a focal point during the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the opening of Oklahoma Territory.
