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Physical Description

The Drees Brothers building is a single story structure located on the east side of Main Street in the downtown business area of Timber Lake. The town is the county seat of Dewey County, part of the Cheyenne River Indian Reservation. The building occupies most of three 25 foot city lots. North of the store, on the corner, is a gas station/convenience store. South of Drees and Trauger is a circa 1950 office building, and south of that is the Timber Lake Topic newspaper office, built in 1919. The wide street is bare of trees or green space.

The wood frame building has a concrete and rock foundation. The original (north half) of the building, measured 24 feet by 40 feet and was erected in 1910 as Drees and Trauger General Merchandise. An addition was placed on the rear of the building and the south half was added circa 1920. The roof on the north half of the building is gabled, while the south side is a simple slope. The building originally had a wood shingle roof, but is now covered by galvanized tin.

The store features a false front with a denticulated cornice. The entryway has been slightly altered as two exterior doors were added over the recessed entry. The storefront has three decorative pilasters, one on each end of the facade and one in the center of the building. There is a door and four plate glass windows on each side of the center pilaster. Most of the decorative features of the building, exterior and interior, were added when the south half of the building was added. The box cornices and decorative trim on the front of the building are molded tin with a variety of floral motifs. A transom window made up of small, square, leaded glass lights is intact under the masonite on the store front.

The building is covered with pressed metal siding that is made to resemble cut stone. The north side of the building features a brick chimney and a small hipped roof entry way that is not original. A shed roof through dormer is at the rear of the building in the living area. The attached garage is clapboard sided and a small entry at the back of the building is masonite sided. The garage was added sometime in the 1930s or 40s on the east end of the north side of the building. Some windows at the rear of the structure have been covered over. A new walk in cooler was recently built in the meat room but the high ceiling was left unchanged, and the interior of the building is largely intact.

The hardwood floors and tin ceiling throughout the merchandise area have not been changed. The pressed metal on the ceiling extends down the walls about 5 feet. 6x6 posts support the roof and run

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down the center of the building spaced approximately eight feet apart. Original oak display cases were likely there before 1920, as a shipping stamp gives the name and address of George Drees, who was in partnership with his brothers Frank and Leo only until 1919.

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Statement of Significance

Drees Brothers General Merchandise is historically significant under Criteria A for its association with the settlement and development of Timber Lake and the region as well as the growth of commerce in the area. It is also significant under criteria C as a representative example of early commercial architecture in the rural areas of South Dakota. Since its original construction in 1910 the store served the community of Timber Lake and the surrounding region, especially the Tribal groups living on the Cheyenne River Indian Reservation. The well maintained building continues to serve Timber Lake as a country store and is one of only a few intact false front, wood frame historic structures on the main street of the small community.

Historical background and significance:

Timber Lake had its beginnings in homesteading. In 1909, 10,000 claims were made available on the Standing Rock and Cheyenne River reservations. The major influx of settlers came to the area in 1910. The Department of the Interior established the site of Timber Lake along the north side of the lake by the same name, under the provisions of the 1908 Homestead Act.

Tents housed the first businesses and residents. Soon a half dozen lumber yards were in business, bringing in regular shipments of building materials on the railroad. A building boom was in progress all summer in 1910. Hotels, a drug store, a bank, a meat market, and Drees and Trauger General Merchandise were among the first businesses to open. They began to supply homesteaders with groceries and the articles they needed to turn their homestead claims into homes. They also stocked colorful shawls, blankets and other items that their Indian customers wanted.

Of all of the early businesses started in Timber Lake, only the Drees Brothers Store/Country Market has continuously operated to the present day.

The store's first owners, Frank, Leo and George Drees and Dan Trauger, successfully sought to do businesses with the Indian population of the region. The store undoubtedly was one of the places where native peoples and white settlers came into close contact. Frank Drees learned to speak some of the Lakota language of the local tribes. Drees and Trauger built two small cabins behind the store where customers who traveled into town by horse and wagon could stay while they conducted business in town. A fifty cent deposit was required to stay in one of the cabins, but this money was

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refunded upon return of the key and the person staying was not obligated to conduct business at the Drees and Trauger store. The cabins have long since been demolished. The owners also traded with the Indians for their beaded buckskins, moccasins and other hand-crafted items.

In 1912, Dan Trauger sold his part of the business to the Drees brothers, and the name changed to Drees Brothers General Merchandise. This is the name by which the building was known for most of its period of significance. The store has changed names several more times through the years and is presently known as the Country Market. Although the name has changed the building's history continues on. Many of the local citizens can attest to the important role the store played during the good times and bad. Nearly all of the early owners sold supplies on credit and boxes of account books still on hand affirm the fact that some accounts were never paid. One owner was even known to accept a load of coal from workers at a local coal mine in exchange for groceries.

During the West River homesteading period, many of the buildings were cheaply built and were either lost to fire or structural decay or have been remodeled beyond recognition. The significance of this structure lies in the fact that it has remained virtually unchanged for the past 75 years. Since 1920, the building has seen few changes. A garage was added to the rear of the property, a new roof was put on and a new meat freezer was added in 1996. Timber Lake remains a small rural community and the Drees Brothers/Country Market is still a focal point of the community's business area.
