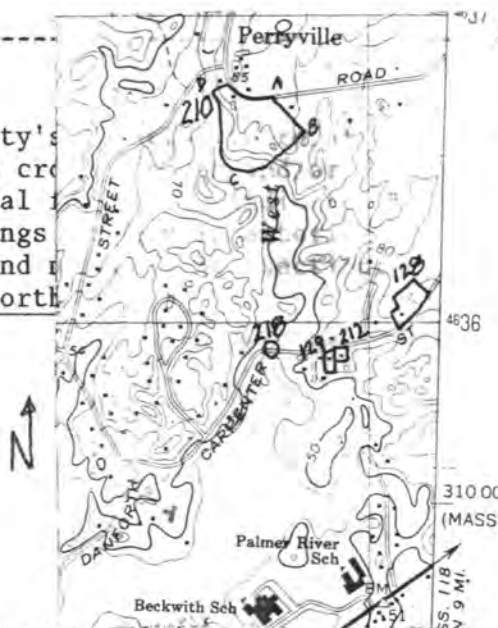

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.)

The James Perry House, a cross gable cottage built by a wealthy manufacturer, is the finest example of Italianate architecture in Rehoboth. The front facade (east) has two windows on each side of the entrance. The doorway treatment is transitional Late Greek Revival with flanking sidelights and pilasters surmounted with a narrow entablature. A double round-headed window is located in the large central gable above the entrance. The overhanging eaves, on the house and on two small additions to the south end, are decorated with modillions and small paired brackets. A four-door

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.)

In the 18th century, most of the land in this vicinity belonged to the Carpenter family. The first Perry to move here was Daniel Perry, who in 1831 purchased a tract of land and started a turning mill on the Palmer River. Members of the Perry family operated a thriving mill business here until the end of the 19th century. In addition to the prosperous turning shop which made butter moulds, farm tools and bobbins for many textile manufacturers in Massachusetts and Rhode Island, a sawmill and gristmill were built in 1840. This house, which overlooks the mill race, was built ca. 1860 by James H. Perry, brother of Daniel, who built a new turning shop downstream in 1859; the business operated into the 20th century.

As an outstanding local example of Italianate residential architecture with strong associations with a prominent businessman and with Rehoboth's economic development in the 19th century, the James Perry House meets criteria A, B and C of the National Register of Historic Places on an individual basis. Archaeological investigations of the known industrial remains may show that it also meets criteria D.

carriage house and barn are connected as a continuous line to one of the south additions. The house retains many original features including four-over-four windows, interior mouldings and doors, clear glass door knobs, and a heavy, intricately turned newel post with companion balusters in the central staircase. A well maintained mill race, a portion of the earthen dam as well as undetermined subsurface industrial remains are located adjacent to the house.

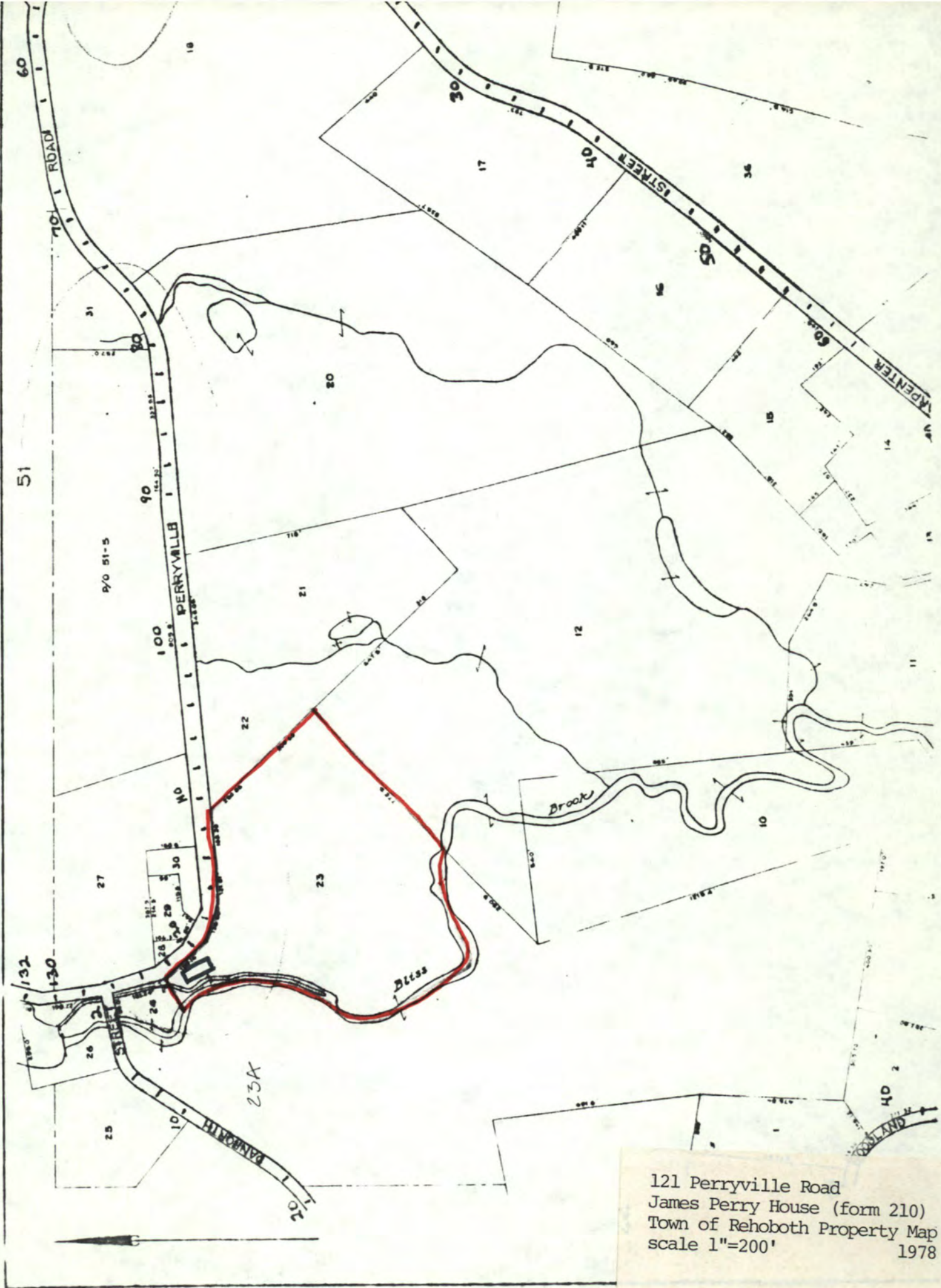
