DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Engels' Dry Goods Store is a one-story red brick commercial building measuring 25' x 100' with no definitive architectural characteristics. The exterior is typical of territorial storefronts, however with entresol, original wooden window sashes, and hanging canopy. From the street, the building appears much as it did when constructed.

The interior of the store is in excellent condition, with the original 13' tall molded-tin ceiling, drop lights, overhead fans, and shelves of stacked dry goods. The north wall is covered with Coca-Cola posters and the others are plastered and painted. Typical of old, small town stores, the interior is dimly lit. When entering the store, the original furnishings overwhelm the visitor. On the immediate left is an antique gas-jet cigar lighter which has been burning since 1921. The lighter rests on an old marble-topped display case which was in the store in 1910. Behind the display case is a wooden bar and cabinet which at one time held glasses for the fountain. It too is original. Above the bar on the wall, and extending approximately 75' towards the rear of the store, is a superb collection of Coca-Cola promotional posters dating to 1913.

As customers walk into the store they also notice the drop lights and ceiling fans. The wooden blades of the fans have been removed and stored, but they could easily be reinstalled. Farther into the store customers find several tables and chairs which also are original furnishings dating to 1910. To the left is the old brass cash register which was purchased with redeemable cigar wrappers. It is in excellent and operable condition. Beyond the tables and counters are shelves for dry goods. The only noticeable difference from countless historic photographs of country stores are the new goods on the shelves.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Engels' Dry Goods Store of Luther is unique in Oklahoma County, for the store has survived since 1910 in a well preserved and superbly authentic condition despite the ravages of urbanization, agricultural depression, and changes in transportation. In addition to its, importance as a valuable relic from the past, the Engels! Store retains social significance. As it did in 1910, the store still serves the town of Luther as a focal point for conversation, refreshments, and relaxation. Moreover, just as it did in 1910, the small general store provides rural citizens with needed dry goods. The overwhelming importance of country stores to the development and social structure of rural Oklahoma is thus represented by Engels' Dry Goods Store.

Settled in 1895 following the opening of the Kickapoo tribal lands, Luther quickly became a trading center in the Deep Fork River Valley. By the early 1900s the Frisco and KATY railroads had connected the town to Oklahoma City, beginning a period of prosperity. Slowly, growing trade convinced many merchants to replace their wooden structures with brick or stone. By 1909 most of the buildings on Main Street were either brick, stone, or concrete block. In 1910 the store at 115 S. Main Street was occupied by Michael C. Engels.

Engels, who had migrated to Indian Territory in 1889, established a small dry goods store in his one-story structure. In his new quarters he stocked the shelves with dry goods, operated a fountain and opened his store to his fellow townsmen. Cooled by overhead fans, the citizens of Luther looked to Engels' store for a place to relax, have a Coke, buy needed supplies, and enjoy the conversation of neighbors.

In 1913 Engels started a tradition when he purchased a 50 gallon barrel of Coke syrup, for with it he received a promotional poster depicting four girls drinking Coke. He continued collecting a poster a year, until Coca-Cola posters covered the entire north wall of his store. Engels' collection and preservation of posters extended to most of the physical items in the store. To his death he retained the store's original furniture, wooden display cases, shelves,

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scales, hanging lights, and overhead fans. His collecting extended even to the brass cash register, which he obtained by redeeming cigar wrappers. Another prized possession was a gas-jet cigar lighter positioned next to the door. Customers could buy anickel cigar, then cut and light it on the way out.

In 1921 Engels moved his store and all of its furnishings across the street to 114 S. Main. The move changed the store only slightly, for the two buildings were similar in design and the building at 114 also had been used as a store. From 1921 to the present the Engels family has operated the store in that location with little variation despite the changes affecting Luther. The prosperity which had prompted the optimistic plans of men like Engels gradually was replaced by stagnation and decline as the twentieth century progressed. The agricultural depression of the 1920s and 1930s compounded the economic problems. If not for rail connections and U. S. Highway 66, which passed through town, Luther may have disappeared from the map, as did more than a dozen other towns in eastern Oklahoma County.

This economic stagnation in part explains the suvival of the Engels' Dry Goods Store in its original state. The town was too small for a retail chain outlet, yet far enough from Edmond and **The Oklahoma** City to need a dry goods store and fountain. Yet, external factors do not fully explain the unique survival of this familyowned country store; the other factor has been the Engels family.

M. C. Engels'love of his store and its possessions was passed down to his children, who still operate the store today. Like their father, they have retained all the store's original furnishings, even though they have been barraged by antique collectors. The deep, narrow store thus appears today much as it did sixty-years ago, serving as a focal point for Luther's citizens, just as it did in 1910.
