### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Citizens' National Bank occupies a corner lot facing Worthington's courthouse square. The building is best described by quoting excerpts from an article printed in the August 23, 1901 edition of the Worthington Herald on the occasion of the bank announcing its construction.

The paper wrote, "The building will front on 10th street and will be two stories high with a large and airy basement. The frontage will be 24 feet and length  $63\frac{1}{2}$ . It will be placed back about four feet from the street to allow entrance to the basement without any street obstruction. Kasota stone will be used up to and including the water table. Above that the trimmings will be Bayfield brown stone. The brick for front and the avenue side will be a light terracotta pressed brick. The coping and center piece will be of brown stone surmounted by a 24-foot flagstaff. Three 24-inch polished red granite columns will further ornament the front. The vestibule will be tiled and double plat glass doors will make the entrance to the bank lobby."

"The general style of the front of the building is the double arch - an arch over the doorway and an arch over the large plate glass windows. At the left of the main entrance will be the door leading to the two suites of offices on the second floor. Passing into the bank building we find a handsomely tiled lobby and a banking room about 22 by 32 feet. The cashier's private room, 10 by 11, is located at the front. The bank's entrance to the vault is very convient, veing right off the rear of the banking room. The inside measurement of the vault is seven by fourteen feet. A solid stone foundation will be built for the bank safe to rest upon. Under the stairway, just off the lobby, will be the clothes press for use of employees. In the rear of this will be a small room provided with tables, chairs, pens, ink, etc. for use of customers. To the rear of the customer's room is the director's room, 12 by 16 feet, joined by folding doors. From the director's room is a stairway leading to the boiler room in the basement."

"all of the inside furnishings of the first floor will be in red oak. The ceiling will be 13½ feet in the clear and of steel construction. Marble base boards and wainscoating will adorn the lobby. Passing up to the second story we find two fine suites of office rooms of three rooms each, both provided with closers, wash and toilet rooms. The furnishings of the second floor will be of Tennessee pine and the ceiling is 11 feet to the floor. The basement will be finished all with yellow pine and painted and ceiling will be eight feet. There will be a large front room some 21 by 25 feet such as will be used for boiler, fuel room and cistern. The roof will be "old style" tin painted top and bottom."

This account, written in 1901, is still generally descriptive of the building. The exterior is unchanged with the exception of removal of the roof top flagstaff. The main banking floor has been opened up into a single room, now used for retail display. The floor, ceiling, and interior trim are all original. Second floor office suites are close to the original although in a deteriorated state because of disuse for the last sdveral years. The basement no longer has furnace and boilers and the space formerly used for that purpose is now joined with the original "large front room" and is used for display and sales.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Citizens' National Bank is a significant representative of the role of commerce in Worthington and Nobles County and for its architectural contribution to the city's main street/courthouse square townscape. The bank was established in 1901 by a group of Worthington businessmen ("its directors all live here, its stockholders are all interested in the upbuilding of this town") including J.D. Humiston, an important figure in the National Colony that first promoted settlement in the city. Built in 1901, thirty years after the town was founded, the stone and brick bank represents a second generation of commercial buildings. In 1900 the block-front facing the courthouse square consisted primarily of frame structures. By 1907 only one frame building remained; the rest were replaced by masonry buildings. The Citizens' National Bank was among the earliest of the "new generation," substantial structures, and is one of the few structures surviving from that period virtually intact.
