STATEMENT OF SIGNATURE

The Mc Caulley cabin is of larched logs, 8' x 12' x 16'. The log cabin type is rare, mostly, timber frame houses being more common. The interior is rough-hewn wood, it is really a log cabin. The cabin is surrounded with trees, shrubs, and grass. It is located on the south side of the Spring Creek, about 1/2 mile from the mouth of the creek. It is in good condition.

The McCaulley cabin was built to serve as a trading post for John McCaulley who had recognized the need for a supply point between his estate of Soda Springs and the Big Meadow Ranch. In 1880 he bought the ranch at Big Meadows on the West Fork of the Snake River in the National Park, and found Thomasine Weston to be a suitable man to help him establish pasture for their herd. There, Mr. Weston established a camp, or post, on the McCaulley's land, the Army Superintendent's site of "McCauley's Ranch" for grazing in the timbered meadows. The title to the timbered land was held by each change of Superintendents. Since the McCaulley had no right to an in-holding in the National Park the Army could not prevent the McCaulleys at Soda Springs, only control the areas between Soda Springs and the Big Meadow to Teelumee Meadows. Despite administrative control, however, besides the McCaulleys were always granted permits to graze their cattle to the high country pastures.

In 1912 the Sierra Club, activated by the desire to preserve the land from grazing as well as a need for a club camp ground in Northern California, purchased the property from the Kellards. The Club added a new camp area, built Parsons Memorial Lodge, and used the land as a club camp residence.

In 1972 the National Park Service purchased the Sawtooth Cabin from the Sierra Club, closed the trail and, while maintaining the cabin, turned the campground into a primitive "backcountry" area. The Mr. Cauley cabin is now used as a private residence by a ranger assigned to McCloud Meadows during the summer months.

DETAILS OF THE EXTERIOR AND INTERIOR APPEARANCE

The Mc Cauley cabin is a one-story, square wooden structure, measuring 18 ft. x 22 ft. The exterior walls are made of logs which have been cut in the interior to form log wall plates. The logs are laid in alternating row and notched at the top so that they overlap slightly. The logs were chinked with a mix of clay and straw. The original shingling has been covered with a layer of asphalt. There is a small door opening on the east side, and a board and button door on the west side. On each end (E. and W.) of the cabin there is a small overhang window with exterior shutters.

The interior is 12' x 22' x 8' high. There are 3 large round logs running between the gables which support the roof. The floor is a wood plank floor and a concrete floor. Concrete was also poured into a trench around the western logs of the cabin.

STATEMENT OF SIGHTINGS

The Mc Cauley cabin is of historical interest. The log cabin type is representative. The interior is unusual in its construction. The cabin association with the Big Springs area of Tuolumne Meadow is in conservation.

The Mc Cauley cabin was built by McCauley who had acquired the estate of John Bartlett Parsons ranch at Big Meadow on the West Fork, and found abundant leafless pasture for their herd. There are the Mc Cauleys and the Army Signal grazing in Tuolumne Meadow. The U.S. Park Service, in charge of Superintendents, own an inholding in the National Park land at Big Meadow to Tuolumne Meadow. Besides the Mc Cauleys were always up to the high country pasture.

In 1912 the Sierra Club, motivated from grazing as well as a need for purchase the property from the U.S. Park Service, purchased the property from the U.S. Park Service.

In 1972 the National Park Service purchased the property from the Sierra Club, closed the road and turned the campground into a trail. The Mc Cauley cabin is now used as a primitive residence assigned to Tuolumne Meadow.
