

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Jordan Brewery is located just south of the city of Jordan on the east side of Broadway Street South (State Highway 21) at the foot of the bluffs overlooking the town and the Minnesota River Valley to the west.

The large masonry industrial building was constructed in two sections. The northern section of the main building (ca. 1861) is a large three story ashlar limestone structure measuring 150 feet by thirty-eight feet. Window and door openings are arched and trimmed with local Jordan brick. Decorative brickwork caps the building. The building was built against the foot of the bluff, and caves were built into the hillside where the beer could be kept cool while it aged. The caves remain accessible. The southern section of the main building, also of masonry construction, is two stories in height and has a tall brick chimney located towards the rear. This section of simpler design was built around the turn of the century over a one story section dating ca. 1861. A one story brick bottling house building (ca. 1934) is located a short distance south of the main building.

The entire industrial complex was gutted by fire in 1954 and has remained vacant since that time. The ruins retain a significant degree of original design integrity.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Jordan Brewery Ruins are significant as a rare surviving nineteenth century industrial structure associated with an important Scott County industry. Jordan was an early industrial center in the county, and brewing became one of its thriving concerns when two breweries were established during the 1860s. The Jordan Brewery was begun in 1861 by Frank Nicolin and his sons, prominent businessmen and promoters in early Jordan. Nicolin sold out in the late 1860s and the building is better known for its later nineteenth century owners, Schutz and Kaiser (Schutz and Hilgers after 1902). The brewery was operative at this location through 1948 with a brief intermission during prohibition. Although gutted by fire in 1954 and vacant since that time, the Jordan Brewery is one of the largest and most impressive structures in Jordan. There is a strong local awareness of the ruins, and interest in their preservation.
