

Reason for Removal: The property has ceased to meet the criteria for listing because the qualities which caused it to be listed have been lost or destroyed (36 CFR 60.15 (a)).

Dates and Nature of Change: Burned, 2010.

Comments:

When it was nominated to the National Register of Historic Places in 1980, the Tenney Fire Hall was considered significant as "a well-preserved representation of small village municipal service functions." As noted in the nomination, it had fared better than the town hall, which was "a near duplicate of the fire hall in design," but "in extremely poor structural condition." According to the nomination, the fire hall, which had been expanded in 1918 to accommodate a larger pumper, still maintained all of its original equipment in 1980 and "the village . . . is interested in developing the hall as a local historic site."

These plans never materialized. In 2003, Donald "Oscar" Guenther emailed the Minnesota State Historic Preservation Office (MnHPO) enquiring on the steps to take to restore the fire hall, but when Carrie Hatler wrote an article about Tenney for her website "Forgotten Minnesota" in 2015, she noted that the idea of "a fire hall museum . . . never panned out."

In an ironic twist of fate, the fire hall burned down in 2010. Arson was suspected. Then in 2011, the city of Tenney, with a dwindling population of only three people, voted two to one to dissolve and turn the management of Tenney over to Campbell Township.³

When it was nominated to the National Register, the Tenney Fire Hall retain the seven aspects of integrity (location, setting, design, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association) needed to be nominated. In 2016, none of these remain. With only two houses and a grain elevator left standing in the entire town site, the property's setting is lost. Even the trees shown in the 1980 National Register photo are gone and only the street signs remain. Similarly, the integrity of the property's location, design, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association with a small village was destroyed when the fire hall burned.



CURRENT NAME:

The fire hall is a diminutive, detached structure located next to the Tenney town hall. The rectangular plan, single-story building has an oversized belltower above the front gable. The frame structure has been sided from its original construction with sheet metal showing a stamped brick pattern. The double front door is offset by a double-sash window to its right. There are two single sash windows toward the rear of the north side facade.


The fire hall was built in 1904 and in 1918 the town jail was moved and added to the rear of the hall. With the addition, the fire hall chimney was removed. The jail chimney was retained and is at the rear of the present structure. There is evidence of some original openings being covered.

The large belltower houses the original fire bell and an added siren. The tower has a pyramidal roof and louvered windows on three sides.

The associated town hall is located just north of the fire hall, but it is in poor condition

SIGNIFICANCE:

The Tenney fire hall is significant as an example of village provided municipal services. As originally constructed, the fire hall was half its present size - just large enough to house the towns hand drawn pumpers. The hall was enlarged in 1918 to make room for a larger pumper. (All three pieces of equipment are still owned by the village, which is interested in developing the hall as a local historic site). The Tenney fire hall never grew beyond the immediate needs of the town, which is only two square blocks, and in recent years fire service is from a nearby town. The adjacent large town hall, a near duplicate of the fire hall in design, emphasizes the small size of the fire hall. (The town hall is in extremely poor structural condition). The fire hall stands as a well-preserved representative of small village municipal service functions.
