DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The building erected in 1909 to house the First State Bank of Indiahoma was a no-nonsense, utility affair, 25-x-38 feet in size, with one-foot-thick poured concrete walls and a flat roof. It had a trio of double-sash windows to the right of the front (east) door, a single window on the north side wall, a similar window and another door on the south. A 10-x-16-foot addition of concrete blocks was later appended to the west end of the building for a restroom and storage. Exterior walls are plastered and painted. The flat roof of the original is tarred: the sloping roof of the addition is covered with composition shingles.

Interior walls of the one-time bank and now community building are plastered and painted. This main section has a 12-foot ceiling, the addition 8-foot. The old 9-x-12-foot bank vault still occupies the right-rear corner of the building, but nothing else remains. The original bank fixtures are now on permanent display at the Museum of the Great Plains in nearby Lawton.

Since the start of the current community revitalization program (cf. No. 8) the center has undergone a significant facelifting and plumbing, painting and general repair work. An old-time resident summed it up: "This is the best I have ever seen this building look!"

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The renovated (cf. No. 7) Indiahoma Community Center, at Main Street and Showplace Blvd., is focal point in a community-wide effort in the direction of economic revitalization and social self-reliance. And residents have already contributed significantly in this campaign for town restoration and beautification. Fittingly enough, the voluntary program continues - by using the unpretentious concrete center building itself as centerpiece - a community role begun nearly three-quarters of a century before.

This area was opened to settlement in 1901. The First State Bank of Indiahoma received its charter in 1909. And the present center building served as the community's lone bank from that year until 1964. The smaller the town, of course, the more important the role played, for better or for worse, by that town's bank. Indiahoma (pop. 434) was never large, but the First seems to have served it well. The comments of present residents are favorable. They point out that following the Depression Days moratorium of 1933, that closed all of the nation's banks, the First was one of the few in southwest Oklahoma that was able to reopen without restrictions. (That probably speaks as well of the community's citizenry as it does of its bank!)

In 1957 the First inaugurated an area uplift program by granting annual two-year scholarships to Cameron College in Lawton to the outstanding graduating senior from both Indiahoma and nearby Cache highschools. Two years later it remodeled the interior of its building and installed new fixtures. (An admittedly sidebar indication of the bank's progressive nature: In its 55 years of existence it seems to have been sufficiently prosperous in appearance to attract the attention of no less than four sets of bank robbers!)

Today, as the Indiahoma Community Center, the building is, as indicated, continuing this area-wide development role. Scheduled activities for youth and senior citizens, along with weekly citizen planning meetings, now take place at the renovated bank/center. Meanwhile, Heritage Plaza north of the Center is being lanscaped for use as an outdoor gathering place. One block to the north a Health Center has been established with regular medical care and



Significance of the First State Bank of Indiah ma, then, lies (1) in its 55 years of direct service to the community and now (2) in providing a physical rallying point for those who seek to preserve and to enrich that community. In that contest the otherwise unpretentious building is presented herewith as deserving of National Register status.
