DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located in the central business district of downtown Madison Borough the two buildings nominated herein are at a very busy intersection (Route 24 and Green Village Road). Directly behind the buildings is an embanked railroad line.

Madison Public Library, Main Street and Green Village Road, 1900. Richardsonian Romanesque structure designed by the Boston architectural firm of Brigham and Adden. This building, physically most impressive, is distinguished by its massive heavy rock-faced block form, round-arched entranceway and windows, and projecting octagonal clock tower with high pitched conical roof. Irregular in form the entire roof is slate and capped at the breaks by tiles. The tower cornice is highlighted at the corners by gargoyle-like stone carvings. The stone is polychrome, an unusually late usage of this technique. Throughout the building it is evident that only the highest quality craftsmen were employed in its construction.

The exterior of the building is distinguished by an arched porch, foliated stonework, and a tower with gargoyle rainspouts. Inside can be found stenciled ceilings and walls, painted imitations of mosaic tile, oak woodwork (including a spiral staircase), homiletic stained glass and custom-made bronze hardware.

The Library is now tenanted by the Museum of Early Trades and Crafts, which provides a much-needed adaptive use to the structure.

James Building. 23-25 Main Street and 2-8 Green Village Road. 1899. An imposing three story orange brick commercial/public building with a curved facade, this structure is Jacobethan Revival in style as reflected by the steep sided gables rising out of the roof (the center gable has segmental stepped Flemish curves while the flanking gables are triangular form). Constructed as a commercial/public building, the rent was to finance the subsequent building of the library and furnish it with a continuing endowment.

The structure is divided into a six bay fenestration on the Green Village Road side and 3 bays on Main Street. Both are brought together by a two bay curving facade at the corner.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Fine examples of Richardsonian Romanesque and Jacobethan Revival architecture the Madison Public Library and the James (Mercantile) Building share an unusual interrelationship between a public facility and a private commercial structure. The rent from the James Building financed construction of the library and furnished an endowment for its operation. The library was an important educational resource in Madison. The James Building was one of the most prominent commercial structures in the town when it was built.

#### Architecture.

The Madison Public Library is an excellent example of Richardsonian Romanesque style architecture.

Indeed, this Richardsonian Romanesque public building is one of the best of its style in New Jersey. Suffering from few changes since its erection in 1900, it has a heavy rock-faced massing steep-pitched slate roof capped at the breaks by tiles, arched heavy entranceways, foliated stonework, and an octagonal clock tower with a steep colonial roof highlighted at the cornices by gargoyle rainspouts. The interior is enhanced with stenciled ceilings and walls, painted simulations of mosaic tile, oak woodwork and paneling, homiletic stained glass and custom-made bronze hardware. The polychromatic exterior of the library is an unusually late usage of this technique indicating either the conservative nature of the architects or the traditional demands of their clients.

### Brigham and Adden, architects.

Other than the records of the Madison Public Library there is no verification of the collaboration of Brigham and Adden.

Charles Brigham ( -1925), a F.A.I.A. out of Boston, Massachusetts, primarily worked within the New England region. Early in his career he paired with John Sturgis to build the Boston Museum (e. 1876) at Copley Square (replaced by the Plaza Hotel around 1900). Later Brigham joined with John Spofford to create the firm of Brigham and Spofford which functioned from the 1880's to c. 1900. From 1905-1909 Brigham was associated with the firm of Brigham, Coveney and Bisbee (nee Coveney and Bisbee).

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Significance (continued)

The periodical American Architect and Building News has numerous designs done by Brigham indicating a penchance for Neo-classical, English Tudor, and Romanesque styles.

Two of Brigham's buildings are already on the National Register. The Richardsonian Romanesque Stoughton Railroad Station in Massachusetts (1888) and the Lewiston, Maine City Hall (1890-92) which he collaborated with John Spofford to build.

Little is known of W.P. Adden, architect, save the fact that he at least co-designed the Madison Public Library.

The James Building is an imposing Jacobethan Revival 3 story orange glazed brick commercial structure with a curved facade to fit the contour of the street. The roof with a curved and stepped center Flemish gable is flanked by alternate large and small triangular form gables. The enormous size of this structure made it ideal for public functions. The size and its corner location makes it a focal aesthetic landmark for anyone coming into Madison from Morristown via Route 24. The architect for this structure is unknown, although it was possibly designed also by Brigham.

#### EDUCATION

The Madison Public Library when it opened on Memorial Day, 1900, became Madison's first public library. Almost from the start its programs were progressively oriented to providing all area inhabitants with library services. Until 1912 a horse-drawn bookmobile carried library benefits to outlying districts -- an important service not renewed until 1922 by the Morris County Library. From 1900 until 1906 a free public lecture series was sponsored; one each year delivered in Italian. This, together with a substantial collection of the Italian-language books, recognized the importance of Madison's large immigrant community. Bilingual service was in tradition of larger urban libraries and settlement houses of the period, but infrequently available in smaller towns such as Madison.

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Significance (continued)

#### SOCIAL/HUMANITARIAN

The James Building and the Public Library opposite enjoyed a symbiotic relationship early in the 20th century; an example of speculation for public benefit. The James Building, built in 1899 by Dr. Willis James, was to use its commercial rents to finance construction of the Madison Public Library and furnish an endowment for its continued operation. This visionary plan was successful until the Great Depression which eventually wiped out the commercial revenue.
