Description of physical appearance & significant architectural features: (Include additions, alterations, ancillary structures, and landscaping if applicable)

This one story adobe house is one of the major transformations of the three-room wide pair-house type in Utah. Falling into the TYPE IVA category of the pair-house classification system, this house is two rooms wide, or two-thirds of the complete TYPE IV house. The distinctive plan and facade fenestration are indicative of this architectural form.

The house is basically a small square room (18×16) flanked by a larger rectangular room. These two rooms are placed under a symmetrical gable roof which naturally projects out over the smaller square room, leaving a recessed area about 5 feet deep on th front which serves as the porch. The wall on the south, the side which lacks a room, extends out to the front of the house as if indeed, Sorensen had intended to complete the house at a later date. Two chimneys are found on the walls of the smaller room. There is a shed attached to the back of the house and tarpaper siding has been tacked on to the outside of the original adobe walls.

Statement of Historical Significance:

Construction Date:

The Dykes Sorensen house in Ephraim is architecturally significant as an example of Scandinavian folk building design in Utah. The house contributes historically to the thematic nomination, "The Scandinavian-American Pair-house in Utah."

Dykes Sorensen, a Danish farmer, received the deed for this Ephraim lot in 1871. The land, and presumably the house, remained in Sorensen's possession during the 19th century. The plan and rather sparse architectural style of the house would indicate a building date c. 1865-1875. Sorensen does not appear in the biographical indices.
