DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Walnut Grove is located approximately one and a half miles west of the center of Gallatin in Sumner County. The original part of the house faces south, and the building is about one hundred yards east of East Camp Creek approximately one quarter mile southwest of its intersection with Red River Road, state route 25.

As originally built ca. 1800, Walnut Grove was a two-story stone house with two rooms on each floor. Two chimneys, located mainly on the exterior, flank the house. The original facade (east elevation) featured a five-bay, symmetrical arrangement. Each opening was surmounted by a flat stone arch with a keystone; the center door is also topped by a rectangular transom. The gable ends, laid in coursed limestone like the facade, are blank except for small attic windows and the slightly projecting chimneys. The west elevation is a three-bay, symmetrical arrangement. Originally covered with wooden shingles whose exposed ends had been rounded, the gable roof is now covered with modern square-ended wooden shingles. The window sash and cornice have also been replaced with modern versions of eighteenth-century design.

A few years later (probably ca. 1820) a two-story brick ell was added to the facade of the stone house. In plan, this addition added two more rooms on each floor and a narrow entrance hall. A Federal stairway made primarily of cherry, rises from the hall. The south elevation of the addition features four bays, including two doors which are surmounted by semi-circular fan lights. With the addition of the brick ell, the doorway into the stairhall became the principal entrance.

Unlike the stone section, the brick ell retains some original trim. In addition to the noteworthy staircase, a mantel (in the Tennessee version of the Federal style) graces a room. Concrete porches sheltered by a portico supported by two-story columns have been built on the north and south faces of the brick addition.

A small early nineteenth-century office is located approximately twenty feet from the southeast corner of the porch built on the south side of the brick ell. A brick smoke-house, of approximately the same vintage as the office, stands approximately fifty feet from the center door in the west elevation.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Architecturally, Walnut Grove is an example of an imposing residence in Middle Tennessee in 1800. During the early settlement period, most houses were built of logs; only an occasional house, undertaken by a prosperous settler, was built of stone. The original part of Walnut Grove then represents an example of the finest segment of residential construction surviving from the early days of the settlement period.

With conditions more comfortable, the house was enlarged using brick, a material not favored during the earlier period of construction. A fairly spacious center hall and open stairway also reflected changing tastes in interior arrangement of space. When completed, the new brick section housed the principal rooms and main entrance. This realignment of living area expressed not only the owner's pride in the new construction, but also indicated how rapidly and completely architectural preferences had changed during the early years of the nineteenth century.

With its two sections built to reflect two distinct periods, Walnut Grove illustrates the impact of changing architectural tastes in a developing area. No significant subsequent additions detract from the example of these two early construction efforts.

The present owners literally rescued the building and prevented it from falling into complete ruin. They have converted it into a comfortable residence and intend to continue living there.
