NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

Conants's Cabin and Park is a private park built in 1920 by George Conant on a 15 acre piece of the farm he owned along Iowa Highway # 96, three miles East of Gladbrook, Iowa, in rural Tama County. The Park and Cabin are set in a grove of Burr Oak and was built for the recreation and enjoyment of citizens of Gladbrook and neighboring areas. The property features a two room cabin and two outdoor toilets made of logs chosen from the grove. The buildings, built in the pioneer manner of building log structures, are set on a modern cement foundations with asphalt shingle roofs. While the foundation and current shingles are not part of pioneer construction, the dominate log construction clearly retains the element of pioneer style.

The site was chosen not only because the Burr Oak Grove was conveniently located on Highway 96, but because the pasture in the back of the grove is defined by Wolf Creek, as such, the creek is considered a contributing element. The Park and Cabin are surrounded by farm land. A circular gravel driveway passes the Cabin. Two outdoor toilets are located toward the back of the property overlooking Wolf Creek. These are considered contributing to the property.

The Cabin, also considered Contributing, has two rooms. The first is 25 feet by 36 feet. The second room is about 25 feet by 15 feet. The two outdoor toilets are approximately 4 feet by 4 feet, traditional dimensions for a farm privy. There are outdoor and indoor picnic tables, grills, a swing, merry-go-round and horseshoe pit. The logs for the building were carefully selected by George Conant's father, Jonathan Conant, from among those growing in the site. They were chosen and cut to insure the retention of the bark over time. The original bark remains today. The roofs of all the buildings are pitched and shingled. The main room of the Cabin has a brick and tile fireplace.

The Cabin and Park remain as originally built in 1920. And continued to be used for recreation. Through the years the original beveled glass windows have been replaced with modern window glass. The original furniture, piano, fully appointed kitchen and flower boxes were replaced with picnic tables. The original location of the swinging bridge over the Wolf Creek, the ball field, and tennis court are now pasture.

The logs for the cabin were selected by Jonathan Conant from the surrounding grove. It took five weeks to cut and prepare them. They were cut in the months of October and November so that the bark will not peel (<u>Traer Star-Clipper</u>, July 2, 1920)

The main windows are 24 inches in height by 48 inches wide. The original windows were beveled glass (<u>Toledo Chronicle</u>, July 22, 1920)

The <u>Chronicle</u> also reports the original "kitchen is equipped with a range, cupboard, kitchen cabinet, table, sink, and underground iceless refrigerator of the 'dumb waiter' type, water piped into the kitchen, and all necessary dishes and cooking utensils (<u>Toledo Chronicle</u>, July 22, 1920.)

The Main Room contained a fireplace with 'old fashioned' andirons, beamed ceiling, dining table, library table, rockers, day-bed, grass rugs, pictures and draperies (<u>Toledo Chronicle</u>, July 22, 1920)

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The <u>Traer Star-Clipper</u> (July 2, 1920) commented that the building was already wired for electricity and contained all the light fixtures. Power was to be obtained from a new high voltage line soon to be constructed along the highway from Gladbrook and extending beyond the Park.

"There is not another place like it in Iowa and probably few in the United States" trumpeted the local press before presenting the following description of the Park and landscape.

The park is a beautiful wooded tract of fifteen acres, a part of the farm which Mr. Conant bought last year. ... Along the outside of the house are being placed log window boxes for flowers... Just in front of the house is a large beautiful flower bed. The site is ideal, with the tall and stately old trees all around. ... West of the house there are already in use two double tennis courts, two croquet grounds and five courts for pitching horseshoes. There are thirty swings for the children and the swinging foot bridge. There are twelve picnic tables and three old fashioned styles over the rear fence affording access to Wolf Creek on the north. ... This week an attractive steel fence is being installed in front of the grounds. Recently twelve bird houses, built by the manual training class in the Gladbrook schools were added to the park (Toledo Chronicle, July 22, 1920).

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE - Criterion A - History

George Conant was born on the Conant Homestead_south of Gladbrook. He moved with his parents to Gladbrook in 1885. George attended Gladbrook High School and for 15 years clerked in a mercantile store. Later he purchased the store and operated it for 9 years. He married Olinda Broeker in 1900. They were without children. George served as a trustee of the Methodist Church and was a prominent Mason. In 1920 he built the Conant's Cabin (see Harvey 1998).

The local press spoke glowingly of the cabin and the park, giving numerous details of the building, playground with equipment, and camping and picnic facilities. The Cabin was a memorial to George's' pioneer father, J. W. Conant, who wanted to "see a log cabin in the grove to commemorate the old log cabin of pioneer days" which J.W. had built on the old Conant homestead in 1855. George took up is fathers dream and enlarged on the idea by "making the log house a modern bungalow and turning the grounds into a public park." It is clear that George intended the park and cabin to be available indefinitely for area family reunions and general recreational use (see <u>Toledo Chronicle</u> for July 22, 1920)

The site has great significance in the history of Iowa's State parks. It also is significant in the context of the beginnings of State Parks in the United States. The Park was designed and built at the time Iowa was starting to develop a state park system. The log building predates the construction of park structures in Backbone State Park, Iowa's first State Park. A discussion with architects at the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, State Parks Division, verified that this may be one of the oldest if not the oldest Shelter structure in the State. The 1917 Iowa State Parks law was far from effective implementation when George Conant constructed this park. In 1920 there were few automobiles registered in Iowa so it is clear that this recreation area was designed to provide a place for the Conant family and neighborhood friends who would mostly arrive by wagon. The area is located on a rural road, but one recognized by local residence as a significant pathway to the commercial center of Gladbrook. The turn of the century saw the beginnings of a federal national park program. That movement took roots slowly and any national designation of areas in Iowa was a long way off. One of the important features of the Conant Park is that it is primarily the result of one family's sense of community or civic responsibility. It comes from a strong Protestant ethic of giving to others from the abundance one has achieved and at the same time looks back to the early settlers and their courage and contribution. One should not see this area as the fruition of a national movement which arrives in Iowa but a local expression of civic duty and family pride. George Conant did not create this park because everyone was doing it, but because it was a community good and a way to honor the energy, creativity and endurance of the first generation of pioneers. It would be a mistake to read too much into both the Craftsman influence and the larger state and national park movement when considering this nomination. The creation of this recreation area owes more to the old notion of stewardship and pride than national movements in architecture and environmentalism

Additional evidence of the important of the Park is given in the <u>Tama Northern</u> newspaper of July 23, 1920. "George Conant has received a note from the State Park Commission asking for plans and specification of the log cabin..... Two members of the commission visited the park last week and said that it is the best equipped park in the state..." From its creation, the Cabin and Park attracted more than local interest. It quickly gained popularity among

Gladbrook area residents and was easily accessible. With increased "recreational motoring" the Park began to serve tourists and those outside the Gladbrook area. It is said that Robert Waller began his notes for, <u>The Bridges of Madison County</u> while resting in Conant Park during a drive.

At no time over the years were the land and facilities deeded to any government agency. The Cabin and Park remain on private property, undivided from the larger farm tract. For many years area service clubs have aided in maintaining the area. A small portion of the original park across the stream to the North was reclaimed for crop land in the 1930's.

Criterion C - Architecture

The cabin proper and the restroom buildings, all of native log construction, are early examples of the "rustic" architecture that became the standard for park buildings throughout the country in the 1920'2 and 1930's. The Conant buildings appear to be strongly influenced by a series of designs for rural houses, schools, and summer cabins promoted by Gustav Stickley in his <u>Craftsman</u> magazine and a series of house and building plan books. Conant's Cabin appears to be a somewhat scaled down version of Stickley's "A Plain Little Cabin that Would Make a Good Summer Home in the Woods," which appeared in his <u>Craftsman Homes</u>, published in 1909. These cabins or cottages were to be of stone, brick,

or any one of a number of our native woods suitable for such construction....specially planned for its own use" and "standing...in small clearings made in the natural woodland. Therefore, they are designed especially for such surroundings and are most desirable for those who wish to build inexpensive summer or weekend cottages for holidays and vacation use" (Craftsman Homes 1909:81).

The Conant Cabin is similar to Stickley's in terms of its overall rectangular form; window size and placement, design and placement of chimney; and especially the utilization of large logs for porch posts. In adapting the Stickley design, Conant eliminated the two bedrooms, while retaining and enlarging the living room and kitchen and utilizing a gable roof rather than an hipped one. According to a contemporary newspaper account, Conant, who had been successful in business and real estate "designed the log cabin and other improvements in the park" and "obtained the idea of a log cabin from his aged father," who had built such a structure seven miles southwest of the park in 1855 (Toledo Chronicle, July 22, 1920). Conant took his father's idea "and enlarged on it by making the log house a modern bungalow" (ibid.).



<u>USGS Topographic Map (Gladbrook Quadrangle, 7.5' Series)</u> Showing General Location of Nominated Property





Plat of Survey of Nominated Property Showing National Register Boundary





Detail Map of Nominated Property Showing Cabin and Restroom Locations





Conant's Cabin East Elevation Source: John Byerly, AIA, Marshalltown, Iowa











Conant's Cabin North and South Elevations Source: John Byerly, AIA, Marshalltown, Iowa













GLADBROOK HAS NOVEL NEW PARK

GEORGE CONANT DONATES FIF-TEEN ACRES OF WOODLAND FOR PLAYGROUND

Log Cabin Built in Memory of Father-Spending Large Sums for Playgrounds and Amusements-An Ideal Picnic Spot

North Tama has a new public park that is destined to become one of the most popular beauty spots, in this section of Iowa. The place is known as Conant park, owned and improved by George Conant, of Gladbrook, and located on the Tracr-Gladbrook road about three miles east of Gladbrook. The park, and the purpose for which it was established, are original and unique. There is not another place like it in lown and probably few in the United States.

The park is as beautiful, wooded tract of fifteen acres, a part of a farm which Mr. Conant bought last year. The feature of the improvements is a beautiful modern bungalow fashioned after the old log cab-ins of ploneer days. The building consists of two rooms, a kitchen fifteen feet square and a large living room 25x36!

The building was constructed of logs, cut from the surrounding grove and laid in concrete. There is a concrete platform around the structure, fourteen feet, in front and twelve feet on the sides and rear. The main windows, are 24 inches in height and 48 luches wide. The windows in front are of the finest bevoled plate glass. The kitchen is equipped with a range, cupboard, kitchen cabinet, table, sink, an underground iceless refrigerator of the "dumb walter" txpe; water piped into the kitchen, and all nocessary dishes and cooking utensits. The main room has a beautiful brick fireplace with old fashloned andirons. and has beamed celling and other bungalow features. It is equipped with dining table, library table, rockers, day bed, old fashloned draperies, grass rugs, pictures, etc. Along the outside of the house are: being placed log window boxes, for flowers that would delight any woman. Just in front of the house is A large and beautiful flower bed. The

The cabin is already being used by campers. Its use is confined to Mr. Conant's friends and acquainlances. The grounds, however, are open to the general public. West of the house there are already in use two double tennis courts, two croquet grounds and five courts for pitching horseshoes. There are thirty swings for the children and a swinging foot bridge. There are twelve plenic lables and three old lashioned styles wyld the rear lence affording acceps to Wolf creek on the The park was eslablished by Mr.

Conant primarily for picules, camping parties, family reunions, club and fraternal gatherings and the like. He allows camping parties the use of the grounds indefinitely, with privilege of using the water and fuel on the grounds.

Mr. Conant encourages the use of the grounds for these purposes, but will prohibit public dances. He has given the Gladbrook! American Legion boys the exclusive right to sell led cream and soft drinks on the grounds, but to date has allowed nothing to be sold on Sundays.

Mr. Conant himself designed the ; log cabin and other improvements in the park and has given most of the last six months to manual labor there. He obtained the idea of building a log cabin from his aged father, J. W. Conant, eighty years fold, and ploneer of northwest Tama. The sentor Mr. Conant wanted to see a log cabin in the grove, to commemorate the old log cable of pioneer days which he blinself built on the old Conant homostead, seven infles southwest of the park, in 1855. The son, who has made success in business and real estate, was impressed with the idea and enlarged on it by making the log house a modern bungalow and turning the ground into a public park at an expense of many thousand dollars.

Next year Mr. Counnt will equip the ground east of the casin with the latest and best playground apparatus for children, the has also decided to improve the ground laying to the north of the house in another year or two. He will probably lay out a baseball park or construct a swimming pool.

. The building is wired and equipsped with beautiful electric light fixtures. Lights will be supplied by a high tension line from Gladbrook. which is soon to be constructed past the park. This week an attractive steel fence is being installed in front of the grounds. Recently twelve bird houses, built by a manual training class in the Gladbrook schools, were added to the park.
