DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Edwin H. Hewitt House is situated on a spacious lot at the northeast corner of the intersection of Franklin and Stevens Avenues in Minneapolis. Designed by Hewitt in 1906, the residence is executed in the Medieval Revival mode popular in Minnesota at the turn of the century. It is three storeys in height; the first storey is faced in a buff-brown brick accentuated by deep mortar joints and the upper storeys are faced in a buff stucco.

The principal facade faces Franklin Avenue (south) and is divided into three distinct bays flanked by a one storey sun room to the west and a one storey portecochere to the east. The main entrance is located in the central bay and is incorporated within a shallow portico with low Tudor arch. Directly above is a balustrade which defines a narrow decorative, but unusable, balcony. The flanking bays are gabled and are decorated only by heavy barges and rude brackets; the windows on the third storey are of the oriel variety. Windows throughout the building are leaded glass casements. The building is constructed of concrete, brick and stucco and is said to be totally fireproof.

Hewitt sold the property during the Depression of the 1930s. It was then acquired by Hodroff and Sons for use as a funeral chapel. Shortly thereafter a substantial wing was added to the rear (north) side of the building on the site of the former gardens; the porte-cochere was also added at this time. The additions were made in accordance with the original surface treatment and proportions of building and are faced in brick and stucco. The addition now houses the chapel and casket display and storage facilities.

The interior of the Hewitt House has retained a substantial degree of original design integrity. Floors throughout the first floor are of a glazed tile in hexagon shapes. Fireplace hearths and mantels were designed by Hewitt and are embellished with picture-tiles in a Medieval flavor which are assumed to have been designed by Hewitt himself. The first floor is devoted to office and reception functions.

The second storey of the Hewitt House formerly served as family bedrooms and chambers. These now serve as an apartment, however the original plan and detailing are retained. The third storey is incorporated within the twin gables and is reached by a narrow staircase. This level formerly served as a ballroom/ playroom and Hewitt's studio. Ceilings are covered with stucco and two-by-four wooden strips are affixed to the rafters to simulate a beamed ceiling. A large fireplace is located on the north gable of the studio. This area is also used as an apartment, however no major changes have been made in the floorplan or decorative treatment.

The building continues to serve as a funeral chapel and is maintained by the Hodroffs who purchased it from Hewitt. It is in an excellent state of repair and preservation.

8 SIGNIFICANCE

Edwin Hawley Hewitt was one of the most widely known and distinguished architects of Minnesota. Hewitt was born in Red Wing, Minnesota, in 1874. Privately educated, at home, Hewitt attended school at Hobart College in New York, but transferred to the University of Minnesota graduating in 1896. While at the University, he attended night classes at the Minneapolis School of Fine Arts and spent his summers in the office of architect, Cass Gilbert. He spent one year studying at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and entered the architectural firm of Shepley, Rutan and Collidge in Boston. In 1900 after placing first of all foreign entrance examinations and second in total French and foreign examinations, Hewitt attended L'Ecole des Beaux Arts, or the National School of Architecture in France. He remained until 1904 making trips to other European countries for additional study.

He opened his own architectural office in Minneapolis in 1904. In 1911 the firm of Hewitt and Brown was organized. Over the years the firm designed the Minneapolis Telephone Building which was selected by the American Institute of Architects for exhibit in Europe, the Episcopal Cathedral of St. Mark's, Hennepin Avenue Methodist Church, Metropolitan Bank Building, Gateway Building, the Northwestern Life Insurance Building, the Fort Snelling Chapel, Citizens Aid Building, the Minneapolis School of Fine Arts, the YWCA and numerous private residences.

Interested in the cultural growth of the Twin Cities, Hewitt became a major supporter of fine arts becoming a member of the Society of Fine arts and other architectural and art associations.
