

John Cole bought land here (from the father of Benjamin Westervelt, according to the Vreeland Geneology) and probably built this house between 1810 and 1830. He sold it with a 52 acre lot to George Y. Allaire of New York City on April 24, 1841. He died in the 1860's and the estate went to his daughter Rebecca Cole on April 14, 1879, from an executor (June 10, 1969). She and her husband sold it on May 1, 1880 to William Mott who sold it in 1885 to Andrew D. Bogert, who subdivided the property into "Leonia Park". The house was sold with about one-half acre to Isabel Maynard on July 1, 1887. Rutherford and Harriet Boyd bought the house on November 14, 1916 and it was, in turn, inherited by their son.
