DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Lamborn Library is located at the southeast corner of Old Lancaster Pike and Valley Road. Situated in an area which is presently undergoing a transition from farm and hamlet to sub-development and shopping center, the structure sits on a nicely landscaped lot a block from the major roadway in Hockessin, Route 41.

The structure was built in 1870 as a one-room schoolhouse with dimensions of approximately 36 feet by 29 feet. Stone foundation walls 20" thick enclose a basement with floor several feet below grade. Walls above the basement level are 18" thick. A second floor schoolroom was added in about 1890. It was constructed of brick. At that time an eight foot brick extension was added to the west end of the building. This enclosed the stairway to the second floor and created an open, brick, arched portico sheltering the doorway to the first floor schoolroom. A small bell tower pierced the roofline during the time the building served as a school.

The roof is shingled. The gable ends of the building are of wood sheathed in fish-scale shingles. Stick-style detailing forming a sunburst pattern is found at the peak of the roof. The gable end, which is three bays wide, faces Valley Road and forms the facade. A double archway supported centrally by an iron post fills two bays and the staircase the third bay.

The double-hung windows have six-over-six lights, 10" X 16". These are original as are the shutters, blinds, entrance door and hardware. There is a stained glass window in the staircase. The staircase windows form an interesting contrast to those in the rest of the building.

The building has received stucco at the first floor level and white paint on the entire exterior. The interior plaster is applied directly to the masonry; the deep window jambs are rounded. No other interior features survive.

In the last several decades the building has been altered to allow for the installation of an apartment on the second floor, a modern kitchen in the basement, electrical wiring, a plumbing system, a hot water heating system, and the addition of a first floor fireplace with exterior brick chimney on the east wall. Originally, heat was obtained through the use of stoves.

Despite the changes the building has undergone in its history, it has retained a simple character which makes it architecturally pleasing. All of the modifications made have allowed the building to serve better its functions within the community.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE


The Lamborn Library building has served the field of education in Hockessin since the time of its construction. Built in 1870, the structure served as Public School #29 until 1932. Hockessin had had a school structure since before 1849. The earlier structure was located at the intersection of Valley Road with the Old Wilmington Road. It is uncertain why this structure was abandoned. The new school was built as a one-room structure; an upper story was added in 1880-93.

Its significance in education was perpetuated by a public-spirited citizen, Mr. Levis Lamborn, who left a small trust fund to establish a library, reading room and lecture hall. In recognition of Mr. Lamborn's generosity, the old school building was renamed the Lamborn Library. In accordance with Mr. Lamborn's wishes, the library has been in constant use since 1934. With the advent of the bookmobile, its library function diminished to the point of being virtually extinct. In its place, social and humanitarian activities which served the community were held in the building. It became the regular meeting place of such groups as the Community Club, garden clubs, Girl Scouts, Greater Hockessin Area Development Association, North Mill Creek Association, Lions Club, Friends of the Library, Story Hour and senior citizens groups. All of these organizations used the building at no charge.

At the present time, the building is being returned to use as a library. New Castle County has agreed to open a branch of its library system in the building. Ownership of the building will remain in the hands of the Lamborn Library Association who will assure the building's continued service to the community.
