DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Dunsmore House is a rectangular dwelling, $36\frac{1}{2}$ ' x $22\frac{1}{2}$ ', built of a locallyquarried, rusticated limestone. It has a gable roof, covered with asphalt shingles, a wide wood cornice, and an exterior brick chimney on the south face. The main (east) elevation is symmetrical, five bays wide with a center door. Windows are 4/4, as are the two windows on each level (main floor and the half-story beneath the gable end) of the south face. The front door appears to be of a modern type, and is sheltered by a wrought-iron and wood porch (which replaced an older wooden porch). Red-stained shutters on the east face are also recent additions.

In 1913 a frame addition was made to the west (rear) side of the house, a kitchen and one-story supporch on the main floor and sleeping area above the kitchen. This addition is approximately 24' x 14', with a concrete-block basement connected to the original limestone half-basement. The main gable roof, and sunporch roof, of this addition are covered with modern shingles. Sunporch windows are 2/2/2.

The interior of the main block is divided by a central hallway. The original plan, two rooms on each side of the hall (on both levels) was altered in 1913 to create two large rooms on each level. Features remaining from the original construction of the Dunsmore house include a black walnut staircase and balustrade, maple flooring, and casement windows.

8 SIGNIFICANCE

The Dunsmore House is locally significant as the only house made of limestone block still extant in the immediate Cedar Falls-Waterloo area, and one of the earliest dwellings still standing in the area. It is a fine example of the utilization of locally-available materials in a simple design.

The house was built around 1866 by Thomas Chadwick, a master stonemason who emigrated to this area from England around 1860. Its first occupant, John F. Dunsmore, was an employee of the Illinois Central Railroad (and was during the 1890's a waterworks supervisor for the railroad). By 1913, the house had been acquired by F.M. Michael, who made the structural alterations and additions previously described. The house is now owned by the Black Hawk County Bicentennial Commission, and is open to the public as a "living history" museum.
