

DESCRIPTION

The Gold Miner Hotel, now operated as a bed and breakfast, is located on a northwest corner lot, one block north of Eldora's main street. The property is included as a contributing building within the Eldora Historic District (5BL758). The district was listed in the National Register of Historic Places under the *Metal Mining and Tourist Era Resources of Boulder County* Multiple Property Submission on 10/04/89. On 12/05/96, Boulder County's Historic Preservation Advisory Board recommended the hotel for designation as a Boulder County Historic Landmark.

This well-preserved log building has an irregular plan consisting of an 1898 L-shaped, two-story, hipped roof portion and a circa 1934 one-story, cross gabled roof addition. On the south side of the 1898 portion's roof, a central gabled roof dormer provides light and ventilation for a partially finished attic. The hipped roof has boxed eaves and was originally covered with wood-shingles. At this time, it is covered with the same orange/red, painted metal material used on the addition's roof. The foundation is of native stone, and the walls are of indigenous logs. Windows are primarily wood framed, double hungs. Wood trim is painted white, with accents of orange/red.

The logs in the 1898 portion appear to have been rough milled and are square on all four sides. The half-dovetail joints are well-crafted. The clapboard facing on the south facade was installed at the time of the building's construction and is painted white. The circa 1934 addition's logs were left rounded on the exterior. A small non-historic wood frame, one-story, shed roofed addition on the north does not detract from the integrity of the building. The Gold Miner Hotel is in good condition and retains integrity in terms of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association.

On the south facade, a shed roofed porch extends across the 1898 building. At the east end, wood steps lead up to the wood porch floor which is supported on a rock base. The support rocks are now concealed by a river rock foundation wall. The porch roof is supported by four turned posts and two pilasters placed against the wall. The original decorative brackets, visible in an 1899 photograph, are still in place. A non-original door fills the central entry opening, the header of which is topped with a simple molded cornice. Windows on this facade exhibit similar headers. A large 8/8 window is symmetrically place on each side of the entry. On the second floor, there are three 4/4 windows. The gabled roof dormer has a 2/2 window. The 1899 photograph shows windows on this facade with 2/2 lights. It is not known when they were replaced, but the present window materials appear to be consistent with those founded in the circa 1934 addition.

The east side of the original building has four 4/4 windows on the second floor and two on the first floor. The original wood sign reading, "Gold Miner Hotel," that was located above the porch roof is now attached to the east wall between the first and second level, toward the front of the building. A brick chimney pierces the roof toward the rear.

SITE MAP



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The circa 1934, one-story addition, built within the "L" has a single window on the south. On its east, paired windows flank a central door, and a small window is in the gable end. An exterior stone chimney is on the north. The logs are placed vertically in the lower portion of the addition's east wall. The addition was built as a "club room" and is now used as a lounge.

On the west side, there are four windows on the second floor and three on the first. On the north, there are three windows on the second floor. A wood framed, lean-to shed, with three windows, constructed at an unknown date, is attached at the first floor level.

On the interior, a staircase extends from near the front entrance to the second floor. To the right of the staircase, on the first floor, is a public sitting area. To the left is a wall, behind which are private rooms accessed from a hallway located in the middle of the building. A dining room and kitchen are in the "L" which extends to the north.

On the second floor, the original room configuration has been altered. At this time, there are five guest rooms. The alteration is believed to have occurred circa 1967. Some markings on the oak flooring indicate the locations of the original wall partitions.

A circa 1986, non-contributing shed is located at the rear of the property.

SIGNIFICANCE

The Gold Miner Hotel, associated with two periods of Eldora's history, is significant under Criterion A for Commerce and Criterion C for Architecture. The building is a well-crafted and well-preserved example of the Vernacular Commercial Building Property Type as described in the Multiple Property Documentation Form, *Metal Mining and Tourist Era Resources of Boulder County*.

The original 1898 portion is a rare surviving Colorado example of a full two story log building and is associated with the mining era's building boom. Although the hotel was built quickly, between December 1897 and February 1898, the squared logs were joined with carefully-crafted half dovetail joints, and the clapboard facade may be viewed as indicative of the builder's desire for a more refined appearance. Eldora's mining boom proved to be short lived. By the 1920s, the local economy relied primarily on the area's ability to attract tourists, and the circa 1934 one-story log portion of the hotel is associated with the continuing expansion of tourism within Boulder County's mountain communities. Both portions of the Gold Miner Hotel remain much as constructed and are capable of conveying their historic commercial use.

As Eldora's largest commercial building, the Gold Miner Hotel functioned as the center of social and business activity. Prior to Prohibition in 1916, the hotel had a saloon as well as a restaurant. By the 1920s, tourism supported the local economy. Tourists initially arrived by way of the Colorado & Northwestern Railroad which began regular local service in 1905. After a 1919 flood washed out much of the line, the financially strapped railroad did not rebuild. However, the increasing popularity of motoring vacations continued to bring visitors into the community. Circa 1934, the one-story log addition was built on the east side of the 1898 two-story hotel. Local newspaper articles indicate the property remained in use as a hotel at least through 1935. To date, there is no confirmed information regarding when the property ceased to operate as a hotel. The property served as a private residence from 1956 to 1979. Since then it has been operated as a bed and breakfast.

Historic Background

Although Eldora (first known as Happy Valley and then Eldorado) experienced some growth between 1891 and 1896, the big increase in gold mining activity and building construction began during the summer of 1897 and lasted for about a year. Nearby, the Mogul Tunnel was driven into Spencer Mountain to intersect the Spencer Mountain mines, and the fifty-ton per day Enterprise chlorination mill was under construction to recover the gold. Newspaper reports were almost giddy with predictions of "the next Cripple Creek," but the expected large recoveries never materialized. Photographer Joseph B. Sturtevant took several photos of new construction in the town during August and September, and the Gold Miner Hotel was not yet in existence.

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On December 7, 1897, I. J. Randall and his brother Jas. M. Randall purchased the lot on which they built the hotel. One of the Randall brothers owned a sawmill operating at the west end of town. When a *Denver Republican* reporter visited the site about ten weeks later, the hotel was nearly completed. The editors of *Ores & Metals*, in the February, 1898, issue wrote, "All lines of business are well-represented including a really good hotel, the Gold Miner."

In February, 1898, a Denver Republican reporter wrote:

The sale of lots is continuous. Purchasers examine the plat, go out and guess at the probable location, and at once commence to rustle lumber or logs for their homes. This is not easy. The sawmills now in operation cannot supply one-half the lumber demanded, and a new mill is now on the ground, in process of erection, while two others are on the road. Notwithstanding all the obstacles to the erection of buildings, five or six new houses are commenced every day, and this number will be largely increased as soon as the weather becomes more settled and the supply of lumber is nearer the demand.

Within the year, as mining activity slowed, the real estate business picked up. As author and former resident Donald C. Kemp explained, "The [mining] boom degenerated into a campaign to sell town lots." The Mayham Investment Company, operating out of a ground floor office in the Brown Palace Hotel in Denver, offered undeveloped lots for \$50 to \$100. The promoters claimed they would resell within thirty days for \$1,000 each. Their advertisements concluded with, "If you want one or more of these lots you should call at once, as at the rate they are now selling there will be none left next Saturday."

Kemp, in *Happy Valley*, A *Promoter's Paradise*, indicated that even when four sawmills were in constant operation in the spring of 1898, they still were insufficient to supply the demand for lumber.
