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NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Green Meadows/Poplar Glen Historic District is located in the city of Memphis, Shelby County, in western Tennessee. It encompasses an area roughly fifty acres and is bounded by Union Avenue Extended on the south, the rear property lines of Madison Avenue, Ashlawn Road, and Ashlawn Cove on the west, and the rear property lines of Alicia Drive on the north and east. It is located just to the east of East Parkway, the general eastern boundary of Midtown Memphis and the third leg of the Memphis Parkway System National Register listing (NR 7/3/1989), and to the south of the city's major east/west thoroughfare of Poplar Avenue. The Overton Parkway Historic District (NR 11/18/1999) is also just to the west.

The district is an excellent example of a mid-twentieth century middle class suburban neighborhood consisting of houses mainly built during the years 1941 to 1952. Containing a total of 137 principal buildings, of which 117 are contributing, the Green Meadows/Poplar Glen Historic District retains an impressively intact collection of popular mid-twentieth century architectural styles including the post-war Minimal Traditional and Colonial Revival as well as the emerging Modernist Ranch from the late 1940s to early 1950s. The nearly homogenous architectural styling of the district consists of the two adjacent and largely similar developments of Green Meadows (Union Avenue Extended, Madison Avenue, Patricia Drive, and Monroe Avenue) and Poplar Glen (Ashlawn Road, Ashlawn Cove, Alicia Drive, and Union Avenue Extended). Green Meadows/Poplar Glen features a housing stock with plans consisting of the 1940s Minimal Traditional houses, cape cottages, and various forms of the ranch that evolved in post-World War II suburban development. The building stock consists almost entirely of single-family houses with attached and detached garages.

The majority of the district's detached garages feature one-story, mostly one-bay, gable-front roofs, and are clad in weatherboard, brick, or asbestos shingle siding. In many cases, attached garages become common in a western progression through the district with a transition from one-story garages attached by a side-gable hyphen to a full one or two-bay attached example.

The district's layout, in terms of street configuration and lot dimensions, exemplify suburban subdivision design in the post-World War II period in Memphis. The main entrance and character of the district is defined by the curvilinear boulevard design of Alicia Drive. With its two forty-feet lanes flanking a central grass median, the thoroughfare serves as a direct entrance and exit to the district as it traverses the eastern edge of the district from Union Avenue Extended on the south to Poplar Avenue on the north. The remainder of the district's streets are also indicative to a period of subdivision development known as the "automobile suburb" pattern complete with uniform street widths of 50 feet, interior district minimum and maximum building setbacks of 30 and 40 feet respectively, and larger setbacks of 45 and 65 feet respectively

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along Union Avenue Extended.¹ The landscaping of the district consists of well-manicured lawns and mature hardwoods. The lots are generally flat with the exception of the slightly terraced lots along Alicia Drive. The streetlights, sidewalks, and curbs are all cast-concrete. Many of the original cast-concrete double-track driveways remain as a contributing feature, especially in the Poplar Glen section. Overall, the district's combination of grid pattern and curvilinear streets, driveways and similar features remain as a contributing feature.

The houses within the district are generally single-family, feature one-and-one-half stories, and are clad in brick veneer with weatherboard gables.

Glossary of Survey Terms Used in the Inventory

Colonial Revival style

This was the dominant style of domestic architecture throughout America during the first half of the twentieth century. Identifying features include an accentuated front door, usually with an engaged-pediment supported by pilasters; a symmetrical facade; and windows with double-hung sashes, usually with multi-pane glazing.

Minimal Traditional style

Dominating architecture from ca. 1935-1950, this overwhelmingly popular style and house type is found throughout the entire district. It has a form similar to that of the English Cottage and simplified detail stemming from previous Colonial Revival precedents, but with a lower roof pitch, at least one front-facing gable or chimney, and height of one to one-and-one-half stories. Porches are often small and may be either sheltered by the main roof or have a separate roof. Stylistic embellishments are most often found at the entrance. Like the Minimal Ranch, it often features a prominent picture window. Minimal Traditional is also a general term used as a house type within the post-war period. Minimal Traditional houses are often a pre-ranch form rather than the English Cottage and have Colonial Revival or Tudor Revival influence.

Modernist style

An architectural style that represents the abandonment of historical stylistic precedents in favor of new variations of modern styles begun in Europe before World War I. Minimal Traditional style is viewed as the

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earliest of the Modernist styles following the Great Depression and becomes outnumbered by more restrained detailing found in the minimal, massed, and traditional ranch house forms. By the early 1950s, Modernist style houses, mostly found in ranch house forms, typify the evolution from cape cottage and double-pile cottage forms that exhibit Minimal Traditional or Colonial Revival stylistic influence. This phase of Modernism is often termed "Post-Depression Modern" and is characterized by the use of new materials and technologies. It is set apart from its architect-influenced, truly Modern cousin by its use of applied ornament. Typical stylistic elements include low pitch hipped or flat roofs with little or no eave, masonry walls with a horizontal emphasis, and corner casement windows that are usually steel casements.

By the 1960s, the European Modernist style's lack of decorative detailing and sense of horizontality emerges into the American Prairie split-level house form first popularized by Frank Lloyd Wright and the Chicago School in the early years of the twentieth century.

Minimal Ranch form

This type reflects the early growing popularity of the ranch design as it is a scaled-down version of the Traditional Ranch built as an inexpensive choice. Most often found in suburban housing projects, clustered together on curved streets with small lots it blends features of both Minimal Traditional and the newer modernist ranch type. Its characteristics include side-gabled roofs and a strict linear plan and footprint. Integral garages are often small, thus allowing only a single car. Like other ranch forms and the Minimal Traditional style, the Minimal Ranch often featured a prominent picture window.

Massed Ranch form

A common subtype of the ranch house without the defining element of a linear plan, this house type does exhibit many of the same features. Its distinction is derived from its differing footprint width and depth. It generally does not present as wide a frontage to the street as does the Traditional Ranch. Instead, it extends much deeper. Garages are typically attached, but not integral as found on Traditional Ranch examples. Massed Ranch houses were generally built on smaller and older lots.

Traditional Ranch form

This form traces it development from the mid-1930s, but saw its popularity rise in the early 1950s. The "rambling" ranch features a horizontal orientation, an asymmetrical facade, and a dominant low-pitch roof. It is loosely based on early Spanish Colonial precedents of the American southwest, modified by influences borrowed from Craftsman and Prairie modernism of the early 20th century. The footprint of the house usually features an "L" or "U," but sometimes cross or linear plans are found. Native stone, brick, or a combination of the two is most typically used wall cladding. The use of casement windows, often seen in bands, complements the sense of horizontality.

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English Cottage form

(8-86)

This house type is a variation of the bungalow and is similar to the Tudor Revival style; however, it is generally scaled down. Tudor Revival buildings usually have false half-timbering, while the English Cottage building has stone or brick without the wood detailing in the gables. Notable features include asymmetrical massing of steeply pitched cross-gable roofs, stucco walls, unusual window patterns, tall front chimneys, and English detailing. Most prominent is the cross-gable roof. Entries generally feature an uncovered stoop or an entry hood. Porches are generally to the side.

Cape Cottage form

This house form is derived from a vernacular type developed in early Colonial New England. It gained renewed national popularity in the late 1920s with the rise in popularity of the Colonial Revival style and with the advent of the Great Depression of the 1930s, its initial small size and low cost made it synonymous with the suburban landscape. The home has a simple plan, and is square or rectangular in shape, with a longer width than depth. It is generally One-and-one-half stories with a side-gabled roof and central front entrance, often pedimented. Paired-end chimneys are often common. Single windows are symmetrically arranged and usually feature six-over-six double-hung sashes. The upper half-story often featured gable-front dormers. A low porch of a front-gabled porch is also sometimes found.

INVENTORY

A survey of resources in the Green Meadows/Poplar Glen Historic District was prepared by David Royer, Rachel Engstrom, and Candice Carr, as part of the *Memphis Cultural Resources Survey* by Memphis Heritage, Inc. Properties on the east side of Alicia Drive were surveyed by Michael Sicuro. The neighborhood history and development, contained in the "Statement of Significance," is drawn from David Royer's "Green Meadows/Poplar Glen Coverform." The survey was done in June 2001and rechecked for this nomination.

Note on Contributing/Noncontributing Buildings: Buildings in Green Meadows/Poplar Glen Historic District are listed as contributing (C) if they were built within the period of significance, retain integrity, and add to the historic sense of time and place of the district. Noncontributing buildings (NC) were built within the last fifty years or are historic buildings that have been altered to a degree that has substantially diminished their historic integrity. This notation follows each address and is also given at the end of each outbuilding description.

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ALICIA DRIVE

(8-86)

- 1. <u>1 Alicia N. (NC).</u> One-and-one-half-story, four-bay, brick veneer gable-front and wing house with Minimal Traditional and Colonial Revival influence, built 1947 and altered ca. 1965. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 8/8 double-hung sash and single-light stationary. One-story side-gable side portico with wrought iron support. Entrance has a 6-panel Colonial Revival door with fluted pilaster door surround, lintel, and keystone.
- 2. <u>7 Alicia N. (C)</u>. One-and-one-half-story, three-bay, brick veneer Cape Cottage with Minimal Traditional and Colonial Revival influence, built 1947. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are paired 6/6 double-hung sashes and a bay window flanked by 4/4 double-hung sashes. Entrance is set within a gable-front pediment and features a Colonial Revival door with pilaster surround and Neo-classical pediment with incised floral motif.
- 3. <u>8 Alicia N. (NC)</u>. One-story, five-bay, brick veneer and weatherboard siding Minimal Ranch house, built 1947 and altered with facade and rear additions ca. 1980. Gable roof with flush eaves, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 4/4 and 6/6 double-hung sashes, some in pairs. Partial-width flat roof porch of new construction supported by box piers, segmental arches, and spindled balustrade. Entrance is obscured by ornamented wrought iron storm door.
- 4. <u>11 Alicia N. (C)</u>. One-story, five-bay, brick veneer Cape Cottage with Minimal Traditional influence, built 1947. Gable roof with flush eaves, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 8/8 and 6/6 double-hung sashes, some in pairs, and single-light sliding windows on enclosed side-porch. Single-bay gable-front porch with round arch and box cornice supported by box piers. Entrance has a paneled Colonial Revival door flanked by plain pilasters.

Garage, ca. 1947. One-story, one-bay, vinyl siding, gable-front roof. (C).

- 5. 14 Alicia N. (C). One-story, four-bay, brick veneer gable-front cottage with Minimal Traditional and Colonial Revival influence, built 1947. Gable roof with five-light gable-end fanlight, flush eaves, and covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 8/8 double-hung sashes, one with segmental arch brick solider course lintel. Single-bay side screened porch with box pier support and Chippendale balustrade. Entrance has a 2-light Colonial Revival door with fluted pilaster surround topped with triglyph adorned frieze and cornice.
- 6. 17 Alicia N. (C). One-and-one-half story, four-bay, brick veneer gable-front cottage with Minimal

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Traditional influence, built 1947. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are paired 6/6 double-hung sashes with shed roof aluminum window hoods. Single-bay undercut screened porch supported by box piers. Entrance is recessed with a replacement 3-light ca. 1960s door, but retains fluted pilaster surround.

Garage, ca. 1947. One-story, one-bay, weatherboard siding, gable-front roof. (C).

7. 20 Alicia N. (C). One-story, three-bay, brick veneer Cape Cottage with Colonial Revival influence, built 1947. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are paired 6/9 double-hung sashes. Single-bay gable-front porch with board and batten siding supported by wrought iron balustrade. Side-gable side-porch supported by box piers and wrought iron balustrade. Entrance has a 6-panel Colonial Revival door with broken pediment.

Garage, ca. 1947. One-story, one-bay, weatherboard siding, gable-front roof. (C).

8. <u>25 Alicia N. (C)</u>. One-and-one-half-story, three-bay, brick veneer and weatherboard gable-front cottage with Minimal Traditional influence, built 1947. Gable roof with box cornice with corner brick corbelling, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6 double-hung sashes and a single-light stationary flanked by 4/4 double-hung sashes with sunburst and round brick arch. Single-bay shed roof porch supported by wrought iron. Offset entry has a Colonial Revival door.

Garage, ca. 1947. One-story, one-bay, weatherboard siding, gable-front roof. (C).

9. <u>26 Alicia N. (NC)</u>. One-story, four-bay, brick and vertical board siding veneer gable-front and wing cottage with Minimal Traditional influence, built 1947 and altered with later porch enclosures at entrance and side elevation. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 8/8 double-hung sashes and 6-light round window addition at porch enclosure. Single-bay shed roof porch with wrought support and balustrade. Offset entry has a 6-panel Colonial Revival door.

Garage, ca. 1947. One-story, one-bay, weatherboard siding, gable-front roof. (C).

10. <u>32 Alicia N. (C)</u>. One-story, four-bay, brick veneer Minimal Traditional house, built 1947. Gable roof with box cornice and return, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6 double-hung sashes, some in pairs and a single-light stationary picture window flanked by 4/4 double-hung sashes topped by a sunburst and round brick arch. Single-bay undercut corner porch supported by box piers. Offset entry has a 2-light Colonial Revival door.

Garage, ca. 1947. One-story, one-bay, weatherboard siding, gable-front roof with exposed rafter tails. (C).

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11. <u>38 Alicia N. (C)</u>. One-story, four-bay, brick veneer Minimal Traditional house with Colonial Revival influence, built 1947. Gable roof with 5-light gable-front fanlight, flush eaves, and covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are paired 6/6 double-hung sashes. Entrance has a 2-light Colonial Revival door with fluted pilaster surround and shed roof awning.

Garage, ca. 1947. One-story, one-bay, weatherboard siding, gable-front roof. (C).

12. <u>39 Alicia N. (C)</u>. One-and-one-half-story, four-bay, brick veneer Cape Cottage with Colonial Revival influence, built 1948. Gable roof with flush eaves, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 8/8 double-hung sashes. Entrance has a 4-light Colonial Revival door with fluted pilaster surround topped with segmental pediment and incised floral motif.

Garage, ca. 1948. One-story, one-bay, weatherboard siding, gable-front roof. (C).

13. <u>44 Alicia N. (NC)</u>. One-story, four-bay, brick veneer Cape Cottage with Colonial Revival and Minimal Traditional influence, built 1947 and altered ca. 1965. Gable roof with flush eaves, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are paired 6/6 double-hung sashes. Single-bay gable-front porch supported by wrought iron and balustrade. Side porch at addition is supported by brick piers and infilled with lattice. Entrance has a 6-panel Colonial Revival door with fluted pilaster surround.

Guesthouse, ca. 1950, altered ca. 1965 with infill. One-story, one-bay, weatherboard siding, gable roof. (NC).

14. <u>45 Alicia N. (NC)</u>. One-story, four-bay, brick veneer, board and batten, and vinyl siding veneer Minimal Traditional house, built 1948 and altered with side corner porch enclosure ca. 1965. Gable roof with flush eaves, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are original paired 6/6 double-hung sashes and oriel window of 8-light casements; 1/1 double-hung sashes at infilled porch. Single-bay shed roof porch supported by wrought iron and balustrade. Entrance has a Colonial Revival door with 4-light fanlight.

Garage, ca. 1948. One-story, one-bay, weatherboard siding, gable-front roof. (C).

15. <u>48 Alicia N. (NC)</u>. One-and-one-half-story, four-bay, brick veneer gable-front and wing house with Minimal Traditional influence, built 1948 and altered with possible ½ story addition, replacement door, and newly constructed porch ca. 1975. Gable roof with flush eaves, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6 double-hung sashes. Three-quarter length shed roof porch supported by box piers and spindled balustrade. Entrance has a replacement single-light door.

Garage, ca. 1948. One-story, one-bay, weatherboard siding, gable-front roof. (C).

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- 16. <u>52 Alicia N. (C)</u>. One-story, four-bay, brick veneer gable-front and wing house with Minimal Traditional influence, built 1948. Gable roof with flush eaves, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are paired 6/6 double-hung sashes and an 8/8 topped with a sunburst detail. Single-bay shed roof porch supported by wrought iron. Entrance has a 6-panel Colonial Revival door.
- 17. <u>53 Alicia N. (NC)</u>. One-and-one-half-story, three-bay, brick veneer Cape Cottage with Colonial Revival influence, built 1947 and altered ca. 1965 with picture windows. Complex gable roof with 6-light gable-end fanlight, box cornice and return, and covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are multi-light stationary windows. Entrance has a 4-light Colonial Revival door with fluted pilaster surround topped by molded segmental pediment.

Garage, ca. 1947. One-story, one-bay of vertical board siding double-doors, brick veneer, gable-front roof attached to house by breezeway. (C).

- 18. <u>56 Alicia N. (C)</u>. One-and-one-half-story, five-bay, brick veneer Minimal Traditional house, built 1948. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Entrance is recessed and features a 6-panel Colonial Revival door.

Garage, ca. 1950, altered ca. 1975 with aluminum siding and replacement aluminum garage door. One-story, one-bay, aluminum siding veneer, hip roof. (NC).

126. 2416 Union (C). One-story, four-bay, brick and weatherboard siding veneer Minimal Traditional house, built 1941. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6 double-hung sashes and multi-light casements. Partial-width undercut porch supported by wrought iron. Entrance has a 4-light Colonial Revival door.

Garage, ca. 1941. One-story, two-bay, weatherboard siding, hip roof connected to house by hyphen. (C).

127. <u>2432 Union (C)</u>. One-story, four-bay, weatherboard siding and brick veneer gable and wing Minimal Traditional house, built 1941. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6

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and 6/9 double-hung sashes. Entrance is recessed with wrought iron support and features a 6-panel Colonial Revival door.

- 128. <u>2440 Union (C)</u>. One-story, five-bay, brick veneer Minimal Ranch house with Minimal Traditional and Modernist influences, built 1940. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6 double-hung sashes. Entrance has a 4-light Colonial Revival door with multi-light sidelights.
- 129. <u>2450 Union (C)</u>. One-story, six-bay, weatherboard and brick veneer Minimal Traditional house, built 1946. Gable roof with prominent facade chimney, box cornice, and covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6 double-hung sashes. Entrance has a 6-panel Colonial Revival door with pilaster surround.

Garage, ca. 1946. One-story, two-bay, weatherboard siding, hip roof. (C).

130. <u>2458 Union (C)</u>. One-and-one-half-story, six-bay, weatherboard siding and brick veneer Minimal Traditional house, built 1946. Gable roof with semi-circular light, flush eaves, and covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6 double-hung sashes. Entrance has a 4-light Colonial Revival door.

Garage, ca. 1946. One-story, one-bay, brick veneer, gable-front roof. (C).

- 131. <u>2466 Union (C)</u>. One-story, seven-bay, brick veneer Minimal Traditional house with Colonial Revival influence, built 1946. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/9 double-hung sash and large multi-light stationary picture windows. Entrance has a 2-light Colonial Revival door with pilaster surround.
- 132. <u>2476 Union (C)</u>. One-story, five-bay, brick veneer Minimal Traditional house with Colonial Revival influence, built 1946. Gable roof with flush eaves, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are multi-light casements with 3-light transoms. Partial-width gable-front portico with weatherboard siding and supported by Doric columns. Entrance has a 4-light Colonial Revival door with fluted pilaster surround.
- 133. <u>2484 Union (C)</u>. One-and-one-half-story, four-bay, weatherboard siding and brick veneer Minimal Traditional house with Colonial Revival influence, built 1946. Gable roof with hip dormers with 6/6 double-hung sash, box cornice, and covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6 and 4/4 double-hung sashes; some in bands of three; multi-light casements in pairs with two-light transoms. Entrance has 6-panel Colonial Revival door with pilaster surround.
- 134. <u>2494 Union (C)</u>. One-and-one-half-story, five-bay, brick and weatherboard siding veneer Minimal Traditional house with Tudor Revival influence, built 1947. Gable roof with shed roof dormer featuring 6/6 double-hung sashes, some in pairs, box cornice, and covered with asphalt shingles. Prominent tapered brick chimney at facade. Windows are 6/6 double-hung sashes, some in pairs and large multi-light stationary

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pictures. Single-bay gable-front portico with half-timbering and decorative brickwork supported by box piers and brackets. Entrance has a slab door.

135. <u>2512 Union (C)</u>. One-story, five-bay weatherboard siding and brick veneer Minimal Traditional house, built 1946. Gable roof with box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6 double-hung sashes. Single-bay gable-front porch supported by wrought iron. Entrance has a 3-light Colonial Revival door.

Garage, ca. 1946. One-story, two-bay, brick veneer, gable-front roof. (C).

136. <u>2528 Union/82 Alicia S. (C)</u>. One-story, five-bay, brick veneer Minimal Traditional duplex, built 1947. Gable roof with segmental soldier course at gable-front projection, flush eaves, and covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 6/6 and 8/8 double-hung sashes. Single-bay undercut porch supported by turned posts. Entrance has a 6-panel Colonial Revival door.

Carport, ca. 1970. One-story, one-bay, brick veneer, shed roof. (NC).

137. <u>2534 Union (C)</u>. One-story, five-bay, brick veneer Minimal Traditional duplex with Colonial Revival influence, built 1946. Gable roof with 6-light fanlight, box cornice, covered with asphalt shingles. Windows are 8/8 double-hung sashes, some in pairs. Single-bay bell cast roof porch supported by brick piers and featuring a scrolled wrought iron security door that conceals duplex entrances of 6-panel doors.

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NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Green Meadows/Poplar Glen Historic District is being nominated under Criterion A in the area of community planning and development. The district reflects the patterns of post-World War II suburbanization in Memphis. It represents an intact development of changing residential subdivision design in the context of the great demand for post-war housing. Under criterion C, the district is also being nominated as a significant cohesive collection of mid-twentieth century residential architecture featuring Minimal Traditional, Colonial Revival, and Modernist Ranch styles. The collection of 137 principal buildings and numerous garages retains its architectural integrity. The properties meet the registration requirements of the Memphis residential MPS as amended to 1960.

Although located within the city limits as annexed as early as 1919, the Green Meadows/Poplar Glen neighborhood remained as an undeveloped tract of fields, however, neighborhood oral history suggests that a nine-hole golf course existed on the western half of the neighborhood prior to 1940s development. Within Census Tract 31, early residential development was evident in the creation of the ca. 1914 Morningside Heights subdivision and the nearby ca. 1917 Strathmore Place Historic District (NR 12/17/1998) located immediately west and northwest respectively of Green Meadows/Poplar Glen Historic District. Strathmore Place, like Morningside Heights, which was designed by Memphis Park and Parkways System (NR 7/3/1989) landscape architect George Kessler, created a template for curvilinear streets and inward facing development in this area of East Memphis suburban expansion (see Census Tract 31 map). Although following over two decades later, Green Meadows/Poplar Glen retains much of this planning ideology as it features residential development isolated from major arterial thoroughfares such as Poplar Avenue to the north and Union Avenue Extended to the south. However, due to its 1941-1952 period of significance, its architectural styling is limited to the realities of the post-depression housing market as it lacks the diversity and detail of revival styles found throughout Strathmore Place, Morningside Heights, and East Parkway in general. Its architectural influence is more identifiable with the contemporary developments of the High Point Terrace Historic District further east (NR pending) and Leawood Subdivision in northeast Memphis.

Around 1940, Union Avenue was extended from East Parkway to curve north in order to connect with Poplar Avenue. The original grass median placed on the thoroughfare directly south of the district (a portion of which is extant under the current Aulon Viaduct) was removed along with the traffic circle at the East Parkway intersection to accommodate higher volumes of traffic.

The original plat for the Green Meadows (western half of district) was filed in July 1941 by Aetna K. Chandler of the prominent long-time Memphis development firm of Chandler and Chandler. Mrs. Chandler's husband, William C. Chandler, founded the firm in 1906 and went on to popularize the bungalow throughout Memphis with 1920s developments such as Shadowlawn Historic District (NR 8/14/1995), Forrest Avenue within the National Register-eligible Galloway-Speedway neighborhood off of North

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Parkway, and Azalia Street in south Memphis.² Mr. and Mrs. Chandler's son, Charles Chandler, later became a prolific subdivision developer throughout the 1940s and 1950s with neighborhoods such as High Point Terrace.

Green Meadows was platted to include over 60 lots along Union Avenue Extended, Monroe, Madison, Patricia, and a portion of Ashlawn. Harsh restrictions were imposed to include no structures over two-stories in height, no primary residents other than whites, mandatory housing costs set at a minimum of \$6,000 for Union Avenue frontage, \$4,000 construction minimums set on all other lots, and a 700 square foot minimum for all houses.³ Despite the local housing market's rejuvenation in the early 1940s following the economic slowdown of the Depression years, new constructions in Green Meadows were delayed until the end of World War II. During the late war years, however, development commenced on the eastern half of the historic district in what became known as Poplar Glen.

John B. Goodwin, another prolific Memphis developer, platted the Poplar Glen portion of the district in May 1945 alongside the existing Green Meadows area. It consisted of Hollywood Street (now Alicia Drive), a portion of Madison, the majority of Ashlawn Drive, and all of Ashlawn Cove. Goodwin's post-war developments consist of the 1949 Poplar Plaza Shopping Center at Poplar and Highland Avenues and the potential National Register-eligible subdivisions of Edwin Circle and Plaza Gardens built primarily in 1941-1944 and 1949 respectively. Goodwin also extended his development reach to multi-family housing with the potential National Register-eligible John B. Goodwin Poplar Plaza Apartment Subdivision (now known as Williamsburg Manor) built in 1948 adjacent to what became Poplar Plaza Shopping Center.

With Goodwin's development of Poplar Glen, restrictions relegated the neighborhood to whites only, however, the minimum cost for construction on Union Avenue Extended was set at \$8,000 with a minimum square footage of 1,400. As intended in Green Meadows, interior streets such as Hollywood (Alicia) and Ashlawn/Ashlawn Cove were given lower construction minimums set at \$6,000 and \$4,500 respectively as well as smaller square footage. By the end of 1945, many of Poplar Glen's homes were nearing completion and the neighborhood became built-out by 1947. After the end of the war, Green Meadows itself began a rapid construction pattern that resulted in its completion by the early 1950s.

The growth of both halves of the district embodies the dramatic change in suburban development and population increases occurring throughout East Memphis. Census Tract 31 experienced a 63% jump in

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population from 1940 to 1950. Residents of Green Meadows/Poplar Glen, like much of the area, were middle-class with a median income of \$3,494 in 1950.⁶

The architectural styling found throughout Green Meadows/Poplar Glen is indicative to the post-war housing market as well as to the varying lot sizes found throughout the neighborhood. As the Poplar Glen portion of the district developed more quickly at the end of World War II, its styling exemplifies the need for mass-produced affordable housing as found along Alicia Drive. The small Cape Cod and Minimal Traditional houses exhibit Colonial Revival influences although in a simplified manner. As a similar version of the Colonial Revival style, Minimal Traditional styling was chosen for a large number of cape cottages with characteristic low-pitch roofs, little decorative detail, often front-facing gables, and either 6/6 or 8/8 double-hung sash windows. Numerous examples of Cape Cods with Colonial Revival and Minimal Traditional influence line the boulevard streetscape to create a solid rhythm of architectural styling. The three-bay cottages maintain a consistency with their uniform setbacks, small square footage, and prominent front and side-gable roofs.

The Colonial Revival and Minimal Traditional styling found in the Poplar Glen portion of the neighborhood is continued in Green Meadows, however, on a larger scale and along with Modernist stylistic examples. Larger lot sizes along Ashlawn, Madison, Monroe, and Patricia afforded more sizable Minimal Traditional and Colonial Revival housing in addition to varying forms of the suburban ranch house. As a style that became popular from 1945 on, Modernist ranch houses were strongly influenced in concept by the Prairie School houses of Frank Lloyd Wright in terms of being built with concrete slabs on-grade, expressing a low, horizontal feeling, with generous roof overhangs and carports. A major characteristic that is unique to this style is the emphasis placed on the automobile. The Green Meadows' section of the district, in particular, has single and double garages/carports that dominate the facade/streetscape as they command attention and remain an example of the influence of cultural values on design. Also the western half of the district exemplifies the post-war relationship of the house to the ground. A number of Green Meadows' houses are built on concrete slabs. Floor plans throughout the district vary from cape cottages on the eastern side of the district (Poplar Glen with its earlier development) to rectangular and "L" plan ranch houses that feature hipped or gabled roofs. Most all houses also reflect the change in house construction standards in terms of the lowering of ceiling heights to the national eight feet. Cape Cottages such as those found at 52 S. Alicia and 20 N. Alicia and a Modernist Ranch house located at 2428 Madison Avenue exemplify these characteristics.

Windows throughout the district also follow the changes in home construction in the postwar period as almost all in Poplar Glen are double-hung wood sashes, but Green Meadows in its later years of development, roughly 1947-1952, features some aluminum double-hung windows, steel casements, or the

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popular single-light stationary picture window of the 1950s. Examples of these newer modern features are found prominently on ranch houses located at 2467 Monroe Avenue and 2436 Madison Avenue.

Prominent front yards remain an important design feature throughout the entire district; especially the Green Meadows section. Placement of houses within the district, in most cases, accentuates the low horizontal feel of the postwar period designs and early suburban ranch house design. As lots within Green Meadows are often quite larger and more landscaped than those found in Poplar Glen at the east side of the district, a new maintenance requirement was created: the large, manicured front lawn, another post war boom phenomenon of the middle class. Another postwar design feature change evident within the district can be found in the declining use of front porches. As the majority of Green Meadows houses were developed just a few years later than those of Poplar Glen, the design feature of mostly having no front porches reflects the changing American society. With the advent of television, neighborhoods saw the abandonment of people from the front porch for the den and more noteworthy air conditioning kept them there. By the end of Green Meadows/Poplar Glen's period of significance, like suburban development nationwide, the front porch disappeared from new residential construction across the landscape.

The Green Meadows/Poplar Glen Historic District remains as a significant example of Memphis' residential development and post-war housing boom. The district maintains integrity and significance as a district eligible for listing under Criteria A in the areas of community planning and development and under Criteria C in the area of architecture for its characteristics of design, materials, workmanship, size, and setting of the Minimal Traditional, Colonial Revival, and Modernist style housing there.

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VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

The boundaries of the district are the rear property lines of Madison Avenue, Ashlawn Road, and Ashlawn Cove on the west, the rear property lines of Alicia Drive on the north and east, and Union Avenue Extended on the south.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The boundaries of the Green Meadows/Poplar Glen Historic District include only those properties historically related to the evolution of both developments. It is the most intact collection of historic resources that shows the architectural development of the district.




