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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Pejepscot Paper Mill at Topsham is the earliest surviving example of Maine's nineteenth century wood pulp mills, Architecturally, it is also the finest. Erected in 1868 this complex of industrial buildings is dramatically sited at Brunswick Falls on the Androscoggin River.

The main structure has a granite foundation, stands three and a half stories high, and is of brick construction. The style is Italianate with a gambrel roof to span the wide breadth of the building. The southern end of the mill faces directly on the river and is the most ornamental. The wall is divided into eight bays of recessed brick panels with arched tops. The four central bays rise four full stories, the one directly on either side of the central section is three-and-a-half, and the one at either end is three. Within the recessed panels are windows with arches over them. The style of the arches vary slightly from story to story. On the half story of the bay directly to either side of the central section is a small blind arch. The gambrel roof overhangs slightly.

The east and west walls of the Pejepscot Paper Mill are divided into sixteen bays of recessed brick panels with arched tops. Each wall stands three stories high. Within the recessed panels are windows with arches above them. As on the southern end of the building, the style of the arches vary slightly with each story. On the west wall there are loading doorways as well as windows. The gambrel roof overhangs slightly on both the east and west sides. The east and west sections of the gambrel roof each have a series of sixteen skylights on them. About midway on the top of the gambrel roof is centered a square two story wooden cupola. The first stage is slightly larger than the second. Each side of each stage has two windows. Each window is ornamented with a projecting horizontal molding above it supported by small brackets. Small brackets also appear around the cornice of each stage of the cupola. The roof of the cupola is hipped with a decorative pinnacle at the center.

The north wall of the Pejepscot Paper Mill connects to a large complex of wooden structures which extend both north and west of the brick building. Many of these wooden frame buildings are similar in form to barns and other farm buildings in the nearby countryside. Some have the simple Italianate trim identical to that found on the cupola of the brick mill and may be contemporary with its construction. The academic dignity of the brick mill is an interesting contrast to the indigirous forms of its adjacent wooden structures.

The Pejepscot Paper Mill is one of the most handsome and well preserved industrial sites in Maine. It belongs to a period of industrialization when pride was taken in the exterior design and appearance of buildings. Thus, the mill should be considered of major importance to the nineteenth century architectural heritage of the state. EE INSTRUCTIONS

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The first wood pulp mills operated in Maine were located at Norway and Topsham. The Topsham Mill was erected in the latter part of 1868. The Topsham Paper Company utilized grinders from the machine shop of the Bath Iron Works and grew rapidly from its humble beginnings in the basement of a sawmill run by Charles D. Brown and E. B. Denison. The success of this early venture caused Brown and Denison to branch out with other mills. Overexpansion, trouble with the Voelter patent holders and a relatively poor location caused the firm to go out of business in the mid 70's.

The Company failed in 1874 and was purchased at auction by W.H. & A. W. Parsons for \$80,000. Four months later the Bowdoin Paper Manufacturing Company was organized with Adna T. Denison as its treasurer. Denison saw the future in wood-pulp paper and was one of the pioneers of that industry. The complex of Maine Mills under Denison's control were the first companies in Maine to grow beyond humble beginnings. Before Denison's empire collapsed under the auctioneer's hammer in 1887, he owned and operated mills in Portland, Mechanic Falls, Canton, Norway, and the mill at Topsham.

As David C. Smith points out in his <u>History of Papermaking in the</u> <u>United States</u>, (Lockwood 1970) Denison suffered from the fact that "his vision was more elastic than his capital". The paper industry at Topsham did survive, however, and the mill continues to produce paper to this day under the name of the Pejepscot Paper Company.

The Pejepscot Paper Company owes its significance to its early entry into the field of wood pulp production. Its utilization of the froundwood process heralded the real birth of an industry which in the 20th century would become "King" in Maine. For some the noxious fumes which issued forth from the stacks of Sulphite and later Kraft pulp mills would be an unwelcome irritant; to a few it would mean enormous profits; but to countless thousands of Maine workers it meant an economic alternative to shoe factories, casual labor or emigration from the state they loved.

Unlike most other paper mills of its period, the Pejepscot Company remains as an outstanding example of mid-nineteenth century industrial architecture and site location. Constructed at Brunswick Falls on a site utilized as a water power source since the 18th century, the main mill building and its surroundings present a classic picture of 19th century industrial New England.

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
