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5. SIGNIFICANCE: NE-25

Built and probably designed by Chris Rye, a contractor, for his family home, the house was influenced by the Prairie School movement. Rye was the contractor for several of Walter Burley Griffin's houses in nearby Rock Glen. The use of stucco, hip roof and interior detailing are the most obvious Prairie School characteristics. The exterior design of brick base, brick piers at the corners and brick window jambs and heads with stucco wall panel infill on the ground floor are uncommon design features.
