DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hiller-Schick Apartment Building is a long two story rectangular stone multiple dwelling constructed in three parts (1852-1856-1859). Its stepped gable ends of brock and stucco terminate gable roofs which were replaced in 1971, / It is not known which of the three parts of th building was the first, however, each has some distinguishing feature. The north portion, as with the entire building, has one exposed wall o stone laid in regular ashlar fashion. However, here the rough, irregu larly shaped stones appear at the basement level as well as the upper two stories. Regularly spaced windows have arched headings of stone and simple wood sills. The north corner has stone quoins and pilaster of stone with mock capital wood crowns flanked the central doorway and apparently both ends of the building. The other two sections are different in size though not in symmetrical appearance. Evidence of blocked openings at the smooth-stone basement level appear on either side of the modern cement stoop. The stone window headings here are flat and the one entrace is marked by an unusually large irregular piece of stone. Apparent renovations of this simple, part-Greek Revival, part Federal Style structure are the brick and stucco treatment of the nroth and south elevations as well as the brick wood stairways and porches at the rear of the building. Interior renovations are limited for the most part to the installation of modern utilities, new window glass, some new doors and possibly new floors. Rooms are arranged symmetrically along central hallways.

The Schick apartments now contains ten three-room apartments including two in the basement.

The Hiller-Schick Apartment Building, so-called due to its first and present owners, is believed to be one of the oldest, if not the oldest, remaining building in Davenport. It is certainly one of the earliest multiple dwelling units in the city and one of the few remaining structures built of locally quarried stone.

The land upon which the building stands is in the oldest section of Davenport owned in part by one of its earliest and most noted settlers, Antoine LeClaire. LeClaire and others sold the Gaines Street property to a local builder, John Hiller, as early as June 21, 1847. Legendary builder of the Clock Tower on the Rock Island Arsenal (1863), Hiller apparently built and resided at this Gaines Street address by 1856. Hiller is listed in the Davenport City Directory as a stonemason, and later as a stonemason and contractor.

In 1901 the Schick family became the second owners of the building and have maintained its use as an apartment building to this day.

Although the interior has been subdivided and renovated and major additions made at the rear, the street side of the Schick Apartments remains much as it must have appeared in the mid-nineteenth century.
