

YELLOW BLUFF FORT

Fla. 105, New Berlin Duval County

A Confederate battery was located at Yellow Bluff on the north bank of the St. Johns River below Jackson-ville during the summer and early fall of 1862 to help the battery at St. Johns Bluff keep Federal gunboats from going up the river.

Because of its significance as a port and railhead, Jacksonville was the key to North Florida. Between 1861 and 1865, the city and the territory along the St. Johns changed hands from Union to Confederate armies no less than four times.

In February of 1864, Yellow Bluff was occupied by Federal troops, chiefly, apparently, to prevent the Confederates from using it. After failing to restore Florida's allegiance to the Union, Federal forces withdrew from the fort for the last time on July 26, 1864, and Yellow Bluff again came under the domination of the Confederacy.

Yellow Bluff Fort was situated on elevated terrain which rose steeply from the shoreline of the St. Johns River. From its lofty position, the fort's guns commanded a wide stretch of waterway. The fortifications consisted of triangular earthen works dug to provide protection for the guns.

Cleared of tangled underbrush and palmetto scrubb, the memorial offers the visitor a scenic view of the area. With the exception of the large spreading live oaks, draped with Spanish moss, the site remains as it was in 1862.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In the summer of 1862, batteries were erected by the Confederates on the St. Johns River below Jacksonville, at Yellow Bluff And St. Johns Bluff, on opposite sides of the river. For approximately 20 days in September, these batteries prevented a Federal squadron of six boats from coming up the river to Jacksonville.

Yellow Bluff Fort changed hands four times from 1862 to 1864. The longest and probably the most significant occupation of the fort was the last, which lasted from February 7, 1864 until July 26 of the same year. During this time, General Seymour used Yellow Bluff Fort as a signal station for his river operations. After failing to restore Florida's allegiance to the Union, Federal forces withdrew for the last time on July 26, 1864, and Yellow Bluff again came under the domination of the Confederacy.
