This Civil War battlefield is located on State route 76, approximately 12 miles north and west of Camden, Arkansas. Route 76 follows the course of the road used by the Union forage train in 1864. The land is high, with a good growth of pine trees shading the park area. The site consists of 84.54 acres, but only those portions of the site which lie north of Route 76 have been improved for recreational use. The improvements consist of a comfort station, picnic tables and benches, barbecue pits and drinking water facilities.

The terrain has not changed much in appearance since 1864. In 1864, however, there was more land under cultivation. This cultivated land has since been allowed to grow up into pine forests. The underbrush has, of course, been cleared from the park area, but the land to the south of Route 76 has not been cleared in many years. Much of the area to the south of the road consisted of cleared fields and orchards, enclosed with split rail fences, at the time of the Poison Spring battle in 1864. The greater portion of the military action occurred at, or near, the present park site; although it is known that during the engagement the conflict ranged to both the east and west of the park area.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Civil War battles in south-central Arkansas were directly related to a Union plan to split the Trans-Mississippi area of the Confederacy. The Union Red River Campaign called for a converging attack on the Confederate forces defending the Trans-Mississippi. An amphibious force (the army under Major General Nathaniel P. Banks, and the navy under Rear Admiral David D. Porter) would move up the Red River toward Shreveport, Louisiana. A second Federal force led by Major General Frederick Steele, would move on Shreveport from Little Rock, Arkansas. Steele marched out of the Little Rock perimeter on March 23, 1864, at the head of an army of about 13,000 men, 800 wagons, 30 pieces of artillery and 12,000 horses and mules.

General Kirby Smith, commanding the Trans-Mississippi Department for the Confederacy, instructed General Richard Taylor, who was in Louisiana with Texas troops, to hold Banks in check until he (Smith) was able to join him with Arkansas and Missouri troops. On April 8, 1864, Smith and Taylor joined forces at Mansfield, Louisiana and defeated Banks' force. The Confederates followed this initial victory with another at Pleasant Hill, Louisiana on April 9th. Banks' forces began to withdraw down the Red River valley.

Steele's march, meanwhile, was being opposed by a Confederate mounted force led by Major General Sterling Price. Price was unable to stop Steele's advance, but he did manage to slow it down to the point where Steele's rations and forage supplies would be insufficient to carry the troops to Shreveport. Reports of Banks' defeat were also beginning to reach Stelle. Consequently Steele abandoned his march toward Shreveport and turned his army toward Camden, Arkansas which he occupied on April 15. By this time Banks' defeat and withdrawal had been confirmed and Steele began to fear that General Kirby Smith would move north into Arkansas in order to reinforce the mounted force of General Sterling Price. Steele wished to withdraw to Little Rock, but he did not have the rations and forage necessary to make the move.

8. SIGNIFICANCE, CONT'D

On the 17th of April, General Steele dispatched a foraging train of approximately 225 wagons guarded by 1300 men and four cannon. The purpose of this expedition was to secure forage and rations for Steele's men who were occupying Camden. The foraging party traveled about 16 miles from Camden, on the road to Washington, Arkansas, to a point where 5,000 bushels of corn were reported to be in storage. Upon arrival the Union foragers discovered that the Confederates had managed to burn about 2,500 bushels of the corn. The Federals were, however, able to load 141 wagons with corn and other supplies.

The Confederates had observed the train leave Camden and plans were made to follow and overtake it. On April 18, 1864, the Confederate troops under Brigadier General John S. Marmaduke intercepted the Union column on its return route to Camden. The ensuing battle was a complete victory for the Confederates. The Union force was shattered; the entire wagon train captured, as well as the accompanying artillery and a large number of prisoners. The victory served a two-fold purpose for the Confederacy in that it denied the Federals their much needed forage and rations, and effectively reduced the number of troops, animals and transport available to Steele.




