# DESCRIPTION

The *General José de San Martín Memorial* is a bronze, over lifesize, equestrian statue on a concrete pedestal located in Reservation 106 at the intersection of Virginia Avenue and 20<sup>th</sup> Street, N.W. The statue is a copy of a late-nineteenth-century work created by the French sculptor Augustin-Alexandre Dumont that is located in Buenos Aires, Argentina. The bronze sculpture (not the base) is representative of neoclassicism.

San Martin wears formal military dress and a ceremonial hat. His right arm extends forward with the index finger pointing. The left hand holds the reigns of the rearing horse. Ornamental details include braided epaulets, a sash with tassels, and a curved saber. The horse's arched neck and large sweeping tail function to balance the sculpture.

When the statue was originally erected in 1925 in Judiciary Square (400 block of F Street, N.W.) it was set on a large granite base featuring bold, simple moldings and bronze reliefs inset in the shaft of the pedestal. The monument was disassembled in 1970 because of Metro construction.

In 1976, the statue was relocated to Virginia Avenue at 20<sup>th</sup> Street, N.W. and set in a plaza designed by the local landscape architecture firm T.D. Donovon and Associates. The statue, facing south, was erected on a tall, smooth concrete pedestal with tapering sides; the bas-reliefs were not reincorporated. The circular plaza was comprised of small, square, quarry-faced granite pavers set in intersecting concentric rings. A curvilinear, double-sided concrete bench was constructed near the perimeter of the southern half of the plaza and a long concrete kneewall was erected at the northern end of the plaza. The wall incorporated bronze lettering that describes the general as the founder of Argentine independence and the liberator of Chile and Peru. The description ends with the following sentence, "His name, like Washington's, represents the American ideal of democracy, justice, and liberty." Two bronze plaques were set in the small granite circular step around the concrete pedestal; both commemorate occasions when former Presidents of Argentina, Raul Alfonsin (1985) and Dr. Carlos Saul Menem (1991), visited the United States.

Despite the loss of the original pedestal with bronze bas-reliefs, the *General José de San Martín Memorial* maintains integrity; the granite blocks were moved to a National Park Service storage area associated with the George Washington Memorial Parkway and the bas-reliefs were given to the Argentine Embassy.

# SIGNIFICANCE

The General José de San Martín Memorial is significant as the first gift of sculpture to Washington, D.C. from a foreign nation. It is a copy, cast in 1924, after the original by Augustin-Alexandre Dumont located in Buenos Aires. An Act of Congress approved June 7, 1924 (43 Stat. 667) authorized its erection on public grounds. It was dedicated on October 28, 1925 in Judiciary Square (along F Street); it was moved to Virginia Avenue and 20<sup>th</sup> Street in 1976. The statue is significant under Criterion C in the area of Art.

José de San Martin (1778-1850) was born in Yapeyu, Argentina to Spanish parents. His father, a professional soldier, moved the family back to Spain when José was six years old. As a young man, José joined the Spanish Murica infantry regiment and served as a cadet for more than twenty years. He fought the Moors in Oran (1791), the British in 1798—held as a prisoner of war for more than a year, and the Portuguese in the War of the Oranges (1801). He fought with the Seville junta against Napoleon between 1808 and 1811; he became a colonel in 1808. Thereafter, he resigned to go to England to fight (as an ally) against the French. In London, he met some South Americans and returned with them to Buenos Aires in 1812.

In Argentina, he transformed volunteer soldiers into a disciplined army. After liberating the country from Spain, he led troops across the Andes and set Chile free. Thereafter, he sought to liberate Peru, although he took possession of Lima he needed Simon Bolivar's assistance to solidify Peru's independence. Following an unsuccessful meeting with Bolivar, San Martín returned to Buenos Aires and resigned his command. The British Government offered San Martín the opportunity to lead the Belgian Army, which at that time was struggling for independence against the Dutch. Consequently, San Martín moved to Belgium, but then changed his mind about the command. Thereafter, he went into self-imposed exile in France, where he ultimately died impoverished.

Augustin-Alexandre Dumont (1801-1884), a native of Paris, was a fifth generation sculptor. He studied at the *École des Beaux-Arts* and was the winner of the school's first prize in 1823. Thirty years later, he became a teacher at the École. His sculpture enhanced various significant buildings around Paris, including *Sainte Cécile* at the Church of the Madeline, *Justice* at the Chamber of Deputies, and *The Genius of Liberty* for the top of the July Column in the Place de la Bastille.
