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The Steele-Fowler House in Huntsville is an interesting Greek Revival style home designed by the noted architect George Steele for his own use. The stone and stucco structure is built on three levels although from the front it appears to be a two story building with a basement. The front is well porportioned with stone exterior walls at the basement level and stucco over brick used above this level. There is a one story portico across the middle of the building outside the entrance. The flat roof of the portico is supported by two square doric columns at the corner and two round fluted Doric columns in the There are two square pilasters at the back of the portico behind the square columns. The entablature above the Doric capitals is the only highly decorated part of the rather severe front. Above the plain architrave is a triglyph decorated frieze with guttae below and mutules above on the othewise plain cornice. The front doorway and the two front windows on the first floor all have the same treatment with square pilasters surmounted by Doric Capitals and plain entablatures and cornices. The front doors are double and have these panels inserted. The upper floor has three windows with plain stone sills and simple wood lintels. Plain two story pilasters with Doric capitals are used on both front corners. The structure has a metal sheet hipped roof.

The other sides of the structure utilize Greek Revival influences but George Steele made no attempt to retain classical porportions on any facade except the front. The east side is three stories in height. There is a two story uncentered portico with four square Doric columns. At the basement level there is a double door glass paneled entrance to the banquet facilities. Above the doors are a glass transom and wood lintel. On the main floor level there was a double door entrance This porch has been enclosed. On the to a cross hall from the porch. west side and rear of the house there was an entrance loggia that was built at the ground level. The flat roof at the first floor ceiling level was supported by seven square columns. At the first floor level there was a balcony with a wood balustrade. On either side of the balcony were steps down to the loggia. From the balcony there was a window to the ballroom and a glass paneled double door leading to the rear The loggia has been enclosed to make a stucco covered addition stair hall. to the rear. Except for the two enclosures mentioned the house has remained largely as George Steele built it.

The principal entrance to the ground floor was from the east side portico. To the right of the entrance hall was a reception room and to the left was a banquet hall with a kitchen beyond it. At this level there were two servant's rooms and a store room. There was also an entrance under the balcony to the entrance loggia. On the main floor there is a ball room to the right of the entrance hall off the front portico. On the left side and up a half story are the family living room, dining room, and kitchen. On the second floor are four bedrooms. Except for the ceiling plaster work in the ballroom the interior is not ornate. The original "carpenter" brand locks are still in place and the glass is probably mostly original.

The Steele-Fowler House is primarily significant for its architecture. George Steele was one of the more outstanding architects in the antibellum South. Several of his structures still survive in Huntsville including the old State of Alabama Branch Bank building built between 1835 and 1837 and which still stands on the Courthouse square. He also designed the Madison County Courthouse which was completed in 1840 and which was used until it was razed in 1914. This structure was modeled after the Parthenon in Athens and was considered to be one of the finest public buildings in the South by some architectural experts. Among the homes that he designed that still stand in Huntsville are the Leroy Pope home built in 1834 on Echol's Hill, the Clay home built in 1830 which originally was a boarding home for the Huntsville Female Seminary, and the Cabaniss-Roberts Home built in 1838.

The Steele home was built in 1840 on a wooded site near what was then the outskirts of Huntsville. George Steele who also operated a brick kiln and a cotton factory in Huntsville lived in the house until his death in 1857. His family continued to live in the house until 1883 when it was sold to George W. Lane.

At the present time the structure is owned by the East Huntsville Baptist Church who use it as a church school building. They are considering demolishing it to make way for a new building.
