Built c. 1790 by John Blocker (grandson of Prussian emigré, Michael Blocker), Cedar Grove is a large two-story house with white clapboard exterior and high gable roof. Double-tiered portico features delicate Adamesque detail. First level portico has two, fluted engaged columns at rear and is supported by four slender columns crowned with square capitals and mounted on raised pedestals. Ornate balustrade encloses portico. Main entrance has double doors surmounted by semielliptical fanlight with geometric design and flanked on both sides by diamond-paned sidelights.

Second level portico has four square columns with Tuscan capitals which form a flat central arch with basket-handle arches on either side. Two engaged columns at rear. Pediment of delicate proportions, above second level portico, is decorated with dentil ornamentation. Portico shelters double doors with diamond-paned sidelights and is enclosed by balustrade identical to that of first level portico.

Both levels have a pair of nine-over-nine, shuttered windows on either side of porticos.

Interior features a barrel-vaulted ceiling in central hall, which runs full depth of house. Dining room walls covered with distinctive hand-painted French wall paper depicting courtship and marriage of two lovers. Hand-carved mantels and dentil moldings are also important architectural details of interior.

The grounds feature tall cedars brought from Prussia; many old English boxwoods; and traces of an original rose garden.

Servants' quarters and original kitchen still stand.

Cedar Grove is a fine -- and, in Edgefield, a unique -- example ot the Adam Style, which reached its apex in the early Federal period. Since Marcus Whiffen, in his American Architecture Since 1780, notes that the Adam Style was "dominant, except in the South Where Jeffersonian Classicism ruled," the architectural importance of Cedar Grove is even more significant. (The typical Edgefield architectural style is Greek Revival with various modifications, as is true of many Southern plantation communities.)

Historically, Cedar Grove is one of the oldest surviving homes in this area of South Carolina. Its sophisticated architecture attests to the wealth and culture of the rural Edgefield community in the 18th and the first half of the 19th century. Valuable collections include Indian artifacts, antique maps and documents, rare china, silver and portrait glass.
