Woodstock, an early nineteenth-century Federal-style country house, is located approximately 12 miles to the east of Lexington. Facing Todds Road and bounded on the south by Sulphur Well Road and to the west by Cleveland Road, the structure sits on a small knoll on a 75-acre farm enclosed by white fences. The house is constructed of brick and contains a central block, four bays in width, with later wings attached. A low wing on the east side slightly recessed from the main unit originally housed a pantry and kitchen that opened onto a broad porch. The wing has been enlarged, and a one and one-half story wing attached. The far end east wing is advanced in line with the main block and has one window on the facade. The west wing, which originally contained two chambers, is now one large room.

The exterior of the central unit features brick laid in Flemish bond and three windows with 12-over-12-pane glass. The doorway with transom is recessed. There are four external chimneys on the main block, not centered on the gables due to differences in room sizes. The chimney on the southwest corner is inscribed with the owner's initials and date of construction, "H 1812." The chimney at the end of the later west wing also includes a brick correspondingly marked "H 1820."

The interior of the central block contains a large drawing and dining room and two small chambers with a stairhall between on the first floor. The six-panel doors in the principal rooms are of normal proportions, but unusual in having panels flush with rails and muntins. All woodwork in the main block is original. In 1943 the mantels and other woodwork were restored, cornices added inside the rooms, and the wings were rebuilt on a modified plan.

"An old gate at Woodstock, equipped with wrought-iron strap hinges and hook, has orbiculated tops to the end posts and slender square upright bars, the peaks of which describe a low convex arc" (Lancaster, p. 42).

To the southeast, a few feet from the main house is a garage and, slightly to the east of the garage, a barn. The present owner keeps the property in excellent condition and the grounds are beautifully landscaped.

Although farms immediately surround Woodstock, Todds Road west of that area is fast becoming a suburb of Lexington with numerous residences constructed along the roadside.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Woodstock is an attractive example of an early country house in the Bluegrass area of the state. Its simple Federal lines typify many of the brick houses constructed during this first decade of the 19th century. Of some importance, too, was the Graves family, prominent Fayette County landowners, who were in possession of the property for more than a century.

Woodstock was built in 1812 by William Hayes whose family had migrated to Fayette County from Maryland "in the days of early pioneer effort," according to Robert Peter, "when the settler was of necessity a soldier, the farmer a fighter of Indians; when hearth and homes and crops and flocks were in constant hazard, and were only held as the hard-won reward of eternal vigilance, alike of women and men " (Peter, p. 762).

Hayes and his wife Lucy were apparently natives of Fayette County, making their home at Woodstock where they reared their children. The house was to stay in the Hayes family until 1837 when it was purchased by Joseph Graves, husband of Margaret Hayes, daughter of the builder.

The parents of Graves were from Virginia, where Joseph was born March 9, 1809. In 1815, he, his brother, and his father moved to Fayette County where Joseph spent his childhood and chose to settle. He became a farmer and was, at one time, a dealer in thoroughbred / horses. In 1831 he married Margaret Hayes and six years later purchased Woodstock.

Joseph Graves' brother, R. B., was also a successful farmer and stock-raiser and was said to have owned one of the finest farms in the county.

Woodstock remained in the Graves family until 1942 when it was purchased by Mrs. Elizabeth Holloway, during which period the more recent restoration was completed. The property again changed hands in 1957 when it was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Alex G. Campbell, Jr., and it has been their residence since that time.


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
