Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Winchester Repeating Arms Company Historic District is located in New Haven, Connecticut, a prominent New England port city situated on the northern shore of Long Island Sound approximately 80 miles northeast of New York City. Lying about a mile north of New Haven's historic green, the roughly 255-acre district embraces most of the southern and northern portions of the city's Newhallville and Dixwell neighborhoods, respectively. Its 867 individual properties encompass a total of 858 major structures and 131 notable outbuildings; 876 (88+ percent) of these buildings as a whole contribute to the area's historical and/or architectural significance. (For a detailed statistical summary of district resources see continuation sheet 7:3.)

Most of the land in the district assumes the form of an inclined plane which rises gently from southwest to east/northeast toward Prospect Hill, a prominent north/south ridge which runs the length of the district's eastern boundary. The district is roughly bisected on a southeast/northwest axis by a railroad trackbed originally laid out through the area in the mid 19th century. This railroad right-of-way marks the course of the earlier Farmington Canal, which had been cut through this portion of New Haven in the 1820s.

District streets are laid out in an irregular grid pattern. The area's principal north/south traffic arteries are Winchester Avenue and Dixwell Avenue. The latter thoroughfare's function as the principal access route into the district from downtown New Haven is visually reflected by its relatively oversized, 90-foot breadth. Other notable north/south district streets include Mansfield, Sheffield, Newhall, Townsend, and Orchard Streets, and Shelton Avenue. East/west roads include major traffic arteries such as Munson, Henry, and Division Streets, as well as Admiral, Woodland, Ivy, Starr, Ford, and a number of similar, smaller side streets. Division, Munson, and Orchard Streets all appear to have been laid out as boundary "highways" associated with major divisions of New Haven's 17th-century common lands. All other district streets date from the 19th century.

The heart of the district is dominated by a roughly rectangular, 75-acre manufacturing complex associated with the former Winchester Repeating Arms Company, one of the nation's leading late 19th- and early 20th-century armament manufacturers. This complex, which was determined eligible for listing on the National Register in 1985, continues to be dominated by many good, substantially intact examples of large late 19th- and early 20th-century industrial structures (see attached sketch map of complex).

Most of these structures have brick, stuccoed, reinforced concrete, or metal-clad exteriors featuring essentially functional lines, and generally range from three to six stories in height (photographs 7 and 8).

The remainder of the district is overwhelmingly dominated by small and moderately sized single- and multi-family houses ranging from one to three stories in height. Most of these houses are frame structures, although a handful executed in brick are also extant (photographs 1-5, 9, 12, 13, 16, 18, 20, and 22). However, principal district thoroughfares such as Winchester and Dixwell Avenues also include a number of relatively modest 1- to 3-story brick and/or frame commercial and religious buildings dating from this same era (photographs 16, 19, and 21), as well as a number of frame houses which were modified for mixed use during the early 20th century through the addition of 1- or 2-story front commercial wings. The most prominent of the few district structures originally designed and built for municipal use are the brick and stone 1878 Shelton Avenue School (photograph 6) and 1907 Ivy Street School. The latter of these two buildings was designed by the prominent turn-of-the-century New Haven architectural firm Brown and Von Beren (photograph 11). In general, the district's non-industrial buildings are sited relatively close to each other. Most of these buildings maintain essentially uniform set-backs from their respective streets ranging from 5 to 30 feet.

The four most dominant architectural styles represented in the district are the Italianate, Queen Anne, transitional Queen Anne/Colonial Revival, and Colonial Revival modes. However, the district also includes a handful of examples Gothic Revival-, Stick-, Second Empire-, and Tudor Revival-style structures. In most cases, each of these styles assumes the form of a vernacular interpretation, reflecting the fact that most of the district's buildings were "designed" as well as built by local contractors (photographs 1-5, 9, 10, 12-20, 22). The speculative contractor-designed heritage of much of the district's residential architecture is perhaps best reflected by rows of two or more adjacent houses on many streets which share virtually identical style/massing characteristics (photographs 2, 4, 9, 22).

The district retains its historical and architectural integrity to a substantial degree. Roughly 50% of the area's structures retain all or the bulk of their historic fabric and features. Significant exterior modifications to most of the remaining half of the district's buildings are

for the most part limited to the superimposition of modern materials over original sidings, alterations to original porch and/or window fabric, or the incorporation of early 20th-century additions, which often reflect important aspects of the the district's development during the period 1900-1930.

As a whole, the district has generally been spared the debilitating effects of extensive demolition and modern construction. The area currently contains only 63 open lots and roughly a dozen modern buildings. As a result of their relatively small size and/or scattered locations, the impact which most of these intrusions have on the visual continuity of the area's historic streetscapes is relatively minor.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Criteria A and C -

The district is historically significant for two reasons. First, its core encompasses the extensive surviving portions of the industrial complex developed by the former Winchester Repeating Arms Company, one of the nation's foremost late 19th- and early 20th-century armament manufacturers. Second, the district as a whole forms New Haven's most nearly intact and cohesive surviving example of the inherent relationship between the growth of modern industry and the emergence of large working-class residential neighborhoods, a relationship typically associated with the development of many of the nation's northeastern urban communities during the late 19th and early 20th centuries (Criterion A). The district is architecturally significant for three reasons. First, its core embraces numerous good examples of period industrial structures. Second, the majority of these structures were built for the Winchester Repeating Arms Company according to designs provided by Leoni W. Robinson, one of New Haven's premier late 19/early 20th-century architects. Finally, the district's predominantly residential perimeter areas encompass a host of relatively intact single- and multi-family workers' houses as well as several significant examples of commercial, religious, and municipal buildings dating from this same era. As a group, these perimeter-area buildings represent a variety of important and popular vernacular architectural styles of the era, including late Greek Revival, Italianate, Gothic Revival, Queen Anne and Colonial Revival (Criterion C).

Historical Background -

By the end of the first quarter of the 19th century, the district formed part of a large and relatively thinly settled farming area dominated by open fields punctuated with scattered trees and houses. Despite the construction of the ill-fated Farmington Canal through the area in the late 1820s, this traditional, rural character persisted throughout most of the district until the Civil War era. By the 1850s, however, a small portion of the district had begun to experience the first stirrings of significant development, which foreshadowed the area's postwar emergence as a major industrial/residential locus within New Haven. For example, by the early 1850s the conversion of the Farmington Canal into a railroad right-of-way had been completed, and George Newhall was manufacturing carriages in a small factory adjacent to the new trackbed near the junction of Division and Newhall Streets. Like all of the structures which comprised Newhall's Carriage Emporium, none of the factory buildings

Today, the only tangible references to the former presence, as well as the limited size, of these early district manufacturing enterprises are roughly one dozen modest Greek Revival- and Italianate-style workers' houses scattered near these former factory sites, and the boarding house built in 1860 to house George Newhall's unmarried male employees (photograph 10).

The perimeter areas of the district assumed their present character as large and densely populated working-class residential neighborhoods in the years between the end of the Civil War and the end of the First World War. The impetus for the residential development of these areas during this period was fostered almost entirely by the concurrent establishment and/or expansion of modern manufacturing firms in the district's core, adjacent to the extant railroad right-of-way. These firms included several small and medium-sized enterprises, such as the Kirchoff Wagon and Pflagar Hardware Specialty companies. However, the single most significant stimulus with respect to the emergence of these neighborhoods was the establishment and steady expansion of New Haven's Winchester Repeating Arms Company.

The full history of the origins and expansion of the Winchester Repeating Arms Company, nationally renowned for its development and production of the repeating rifle that "won the West," is well documented and need not be recounted here.¹ The firm's original plant was located on Union Street in New Haven's Wooster Square neighborhood. Having removed to Bridgeport in 1866, the company returned to New Haven in 1870, where it erected its first buildings (no longer extant) in the heart of the district on what proved to be the firm's permanent site.

Winchester prospered rapidly following its establishment in the district. As demand for the firm's products and the size of its complex swelled over the ensuing decades of the 19th and early 20th centuries, the size of Winchester's labor force also swelled. For example, by 1887 the company had a plant encompassing several blocks in the heart of the area, and more than 600 workers on its payroll. By the early 20th century, the firm ranked among the nation's largest and most successful armorers, boasting a plant covering more than six city blocks, and a still-growing workforce well in excess of 1,000.

Since this was an era when most of New Haven's industrial workers continued to rely on walking as the principal mode of transportation to and from the workplace, the steady expansion of Winchester's labor force over the late 19th and early 20th centuries created a substantial, ongoing demand for the construction of nearby housing for the company's employees. Throughout this period, the bulk of this demand was met primarily by local real estate investors, who acquired large and small tracts of the former farmland adjacent to and/or near the Winchester complex for development as residential subdivisions. While some of these investors simply sold lots as house sites, or built and sold houses on a speculative basis, many embarked upon the more ambitious practice of erecting individual and/or rows of two or more, one-, two-, and three-family tenements for the purpose of producing rental income on a long-term basis (photographs 2, 4, 5, 13, 16, and 20). For example, two speculators who profited greatly from a combination of all three practices were Joseph Sheldon and John W. Bishop. These men were the moving force behind the 19th-century development of virtually all of the properties which currently line both sides of Admiral and most of Henry Streets, as well as the construction of most of the houses along the southwestern side of Munson Street directly opposite the Winchester complex (photographs 12, 22, and 9).

An in-depth review of New Haven's city directories covering the period 1870 through 1920 provides a clear illustration of the close relationship between Winchester's development and growth and the emergence of the residential neighborhoods in the district's perimeter areas. These directories indicate that for most of this period, roughly 65 to 75 percent of the extant housing units in the district were occupied by families whose principal breadwinner(s) worked for Winchester in some capacity; approximately 5 to 8 percent more were employed by smaller manufacturing firms in the area which appear to have been functioning, at least in part, as Winchester subcontractors; and an additional 2 to 3 percent of the district's population were involved in providing the type of small-scale commercial support services (e.g., butchers, grocers, barbers, etc.) typically associated with urban working-class residential neighborhoods of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

The perimeter areas of the district are architecturally significant primarily because they encompass dense groups of buildings whose location, style, scale, massing, and siting characteristics combine to provide an important, tangible record of the architectural evolution of the district's industrial-spawned, urban residential neighborhoods over the course of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Streetscapes in these neighborhoods feature numerous relatively intact examples of modest, single- and multi-family period worker's houses. On many streets, house exteriors display virtually identical massing and detailing. Often sited on adjacent lots in rows of three or more, such structures provide a clear reflection of the important role played by speculative housing construction in the development of Winchester's perimeter neighborhoods during the district's period of significance (photographs 2, 4, 9, and 22). Major thoroughfares in district-perimeter areas also retain a number of good examples of the type of religious, commercial, and school buildings commonly found in urban residential neighborhoods of this type and period (photographs 6 and 11). On an individual basis, most of the district's perimeter-area buildings are also notable for their retention of significant exterior massing and/or detailing features which reflect the influence of one or more of the most locally prevalent, vernacular architectural styles of the era, such as late Greek Revival, Italianate, Gothic Revival, Queen Anne, and Colonial Revival (photographs 1-6 and 9-22).

The heart of the district embraces a large group of relatively well-preserved industrial buildings built between the 1880s and the 1930s. These buildings include the former McKesson and Robbins Company factory at 182 Winchester Avenue, a good surviving example of Depression-era reinforced-concrete construction (photograph 23). However, most of the district's core is dominated by the numerous, relatively intact structures which comprised a large portion of the manufacturing complex of the former Winchester Repeating Arms Company.

While Winchester's earliest factories do not survive, the enormous plant (which has already been determined eligible for National Register listing) retains many good examples of relatively intact, late 19th-century and World War I-era structures. The structures include a single-story timber-framed, brick-pier factory dating from 1883, and a single-story 1886 brick-pier factory with lattice-girder columns and riveted plate-girder roof beams. A 5-story 1895 brick-pier factory depicts the type of structure that housed machine operations for the manufacture of rifle parts. Winchester also made metallic cartridges for its firearms, and in 1883 began to roll its own brass for this product. The original brass mill is gone, but the tall one-story 1916 brass mill (423' x 170') continues to stand. Like the imposing 5-story factory currently standing along the north side of Munson Street, and a number of other surviving structures within the complex, this mill was constructed as part of a major expansion program effected by Winchester in 1914-16.² Despite notable demolitions, alterations, and reconstructions which have occurred since 1937, the complex's extant historic structures continue to convey an effective sense of the historic manufacturing environment of one of the nation's foremost late 19th/early 20th-century military and civilian arms producers (photographs 7, 8, and 24-28).

A review of Winchester-related early 20th-century construction permit records on file in the New Haven Building Department indicates that the majority of the major structures built for Winchester between 1908 and 1917 were designed by Leoni Robinson, one of New Haven's most noted and prolific architects of the era.³ As a group, these structures form the largest and most intact collection of Robinson-designed industrial architecture currently standing in New Haven.

Boundary Justification

The boundaries of the Winchester Repeating Arms Company Historic District were delineated on the basis of the following four general criteria:

- a) Thematic unity.
- b) Current physical characteristics of the district which visually distinguish the area from the surrounding portions of the city, including the historic architectural integrity of individual structures and/or streetscapes, and extant sight lines and terrain.
- c) Exclusion of properties which do not contribute to the historical and/or architectural significance of the district, wherever such exclusions were reasonable and practical.
- d) Conformance with the National Register Guideline that structures proposed for listing on the Register be a minimum of 50 years old.

The district's southern boundary is defined by a virtually immediate shift which takes place between the historic architecture of the district and the modern construction/vacant sites which dominate the area along Charles Street and to the south of Admiral and Sachem Streets.

The district's eastern boundary is generally defined by the transition which occurs between the historic houses of the district along Mansfield and Sheffield Streets and the more modern, high-style, and/or thematically incompatible architecture which dominates the land corridor which lay between Mansfield and Sheffield Streets and Prospect Street to the east.

The eastern portion of the northern boundary essentially reflects the farthest, contiguous northward extent of thematically compatible historic architecture which retains a reasonable level of historic integrity from

the standpoint of both individual structures and streetscapes. The delineation of the western portion of the northern boundary was made so as to exclude a large swath of predominantly modern construction on Shelton and Dixwell Avenues just north of Thompson and Ford Streets.

The northern portion of the district's western boundary was drawn to exclude the open land and predominantly modern houses found along Sherman Parkway north of Munson Street. The southern portion of this boundary was drawn primarily on the basis of extant road alignments and sight lines, and to reflect a notable decrease with respect to the level of historic architectural-integrity level of the structures found along both sides of Munson Street west of Dixwell Avenue.


