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The Confederate Monument in Battle Grove Cemetery in Cynthiana, Kentucky is approximately 25 feet tall. It is an obelisk carved of white marble, resting on a base of limestone. The monument bears two inscriptions on raised plaques, one on the front (south) and the other on the rear (north) side of the monument. These plaques are carved portions of the monument. The front plaque reads: "Erected May 27, 1869 by the Cynthiana Confederate Memorial Association in Memory of the Confederate Dead who fell in defense of Constitutional Liberty." The plaque on the north face of the monument reads: "Their Names shall never be forgotten - While Fame her Record Keeps - And Glory Guards the Hallowed Spot Where Valor Proudly Sleeps." The top of the shaft is draped. The monument is in the center of a circle formed by the graves of 47 Confederate soldiers.

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The Confederate Monument in Battle Grove Cemetery in Cynithiana meets National register Criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This is the earliest documented Confederate monument in the state. It was erected by the Cynthiana Confederate Memorial Association, a group women fronted by men who initiated the effort to raise the funds to erect the monument. This monument was placed in a cemetery as a memorial to all Confederate dead. This is very typical of the early efforts by ladies memorial associations to honor the Confederate dead. As with this one nearly all of these monuments were placed in cemeteries. The main speaker at the dedication of the monument, W.P.C. Breckinridge, summed the monument's role when he began his remarks: "When I received the invitation to be present to-day and participate in

these solemn dedicatory services, there were many reasons that rendered me reluctant to decline; the affection I feel to various members of your association, the reverence -- profound and ineradicable -- I bear the knightly dead, the memories of the cause urged me to come and lay my tribute at the base of the monument you erected." 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Verbal Boundary Description - The Confederate Monument whose boundary forms a circle with a radius of 50 feet centered on the monument located in Battle Grove Cemetery and includes the 47 Confederate graves that surround the marble obelisk.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
