RINGGOLD COUNTY

The county judge, in the spring of 1856, ordered the erection of a hewed-log courthouse in Mount Ayr. It was built with a square base 14 feet on a side and was occupied by the county judge, clerk, recorder-treasurer, surveyor, and a physician. During a session of court on June 8, 1858, a cyclone blew down the courthouse. Many of the old county records were never recovered, while others were found on the prairie weeks afterwards. The logs were salvaged for use in a private residence.

For a cost of \$3,500, raised by the sale of town lots, a new frame courthouse was constructed. It was built of native lumber, was two stories high, and measured about 20 feet by 60 feet. The janitor slept in the treasurer's office and doubled as a watchman to guard the county's property. His bed raised out of the way during the day so that business could be conducted. This courthouse was burned to the ground on Thanksgiving Day, 1889.

The third courthouse was started in the Spring of 1883. The construction contract authorized the spending of \$36,455. By the spring of 1884, the brick and stone building had been completed. It was about 77 feet wide and 98 feet long. The top of the roof sat 50 feet above the ground and the tower reached up 102 feet. Unfortunately, no drain tiles had been placed around the foundation. Hydraulic pressure caused great cracks to propagate up the east and south walls. In 1921 the building was condemned and given, along with \$500 in cash, to a house wrecker to be torn down and moved away.

A bond issue was put to the voters three times for the construction of a new courthouse while the county business was conducted in a garage. Finally, in 1926, the voters approved the measure and the cornerstone was laid November 11, 1926. This present courthouse measures approximately 86 feet by 91 feet, is made of brick, three stories tall, and cost a total of \$132,533.
