### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

The Episcopal Church of the Transfiguration is located on the east side of North Walnut Street near the corner of east Church Street in Belle Plaine. The building is situated on an entire block in a residential neighborhood northeast of Belle Plaine's principal business district. The church cemetery is located in back of the church.

The small white clapboard frame church was constructed in 1869. It has a steeply pitched roof of cedar shingles with the gable oriented to the street. Triple lancet windows with frosted glass are located in each gable end with pointed windows along the sides. Board and batten detailing is located above the windows in the gable and along the bottom of the windows. The church is basically rectangular. Off to the south side is an entrance tower with open-work stick construction and a small bell tower perched on top. The buttresses have been removed. The interior is mostly original.

The church is well-maintained and retains significant design integrity. It is currently owned by the city of Belle Plaine and leased by the Scott County Historical Society which has plans to preserve the building.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Epispical Church of the Transfiguration in Belle Plaine is significant for its notable stick style design features. The church was built in 1869 at a cost of \$3,500. Although the specific source of the design is unknown, it contrasts sharply with both other frame churches in the county and with the several more refined Gothic Epispical churches based on plans of Richard Upjohn which were constructed throughout Minnesota during the latter part of the nineteenth century. The church building was abandoned after World War II when the congregation joined the Epispical Church in St. Peter. It has since been purchased by the city of Belle Plaine and leased to the County Historical Society. Its unusual design is locally recognized and there is current interest in preserving and using the building.
